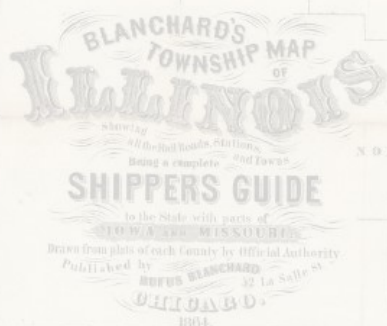
The Illinois Township Association of Senior Citizens' Service Committees (ITASCSC) has designated the month of September to celebrate **Illinois Township Day**.

History of Townships

HISTORICAL BACKGROUND

Township government, established in Providence, Rhode Island in 1636, is the oldest unit of government continuing to serve on the North American continent. Township government was in existence for 140 years prior to the signing of the Declaration of Independence in 1776. The wording of the Declaration of Independence reflects the facet that 38 of its 56 signers had experienced the benefits of township government.

The Declaration's statement that "government should derive its powers from the consent of the governed: is demonstrated at the Annual Town Meeting held on the second Tuesday of each April. The Annual Town Meeting is still an important function of our nation's 17,000 townships after more than 360 years. The Illinois Constitution of 1848 gave voters in each county the opportunity to adopt Township Government. By 1850, the first township government began operation. Today, 85 of Illinois's 102 counties operate under the township ofrm of government and the 1,431 townships serve more than eight million citizens.

FUNCTIONS OF ILLINOIS TOWNSHIPS

By law, Illinois townships are charged with three basic functions: 1) general assistance for the indigent; 2) the assessment of real property for the basis of local taxation; and, 3) maintenance of all roads and bridges outside of federal, state, or other local jurisdiction.

ROAD AND BRIDGE MAINTENANCE

Township government maintains over 71,000 miles of roads in Illinois—a full 53% of all thoroughfares in the state.

History of Townships

PROPERTY ASSESSMENT

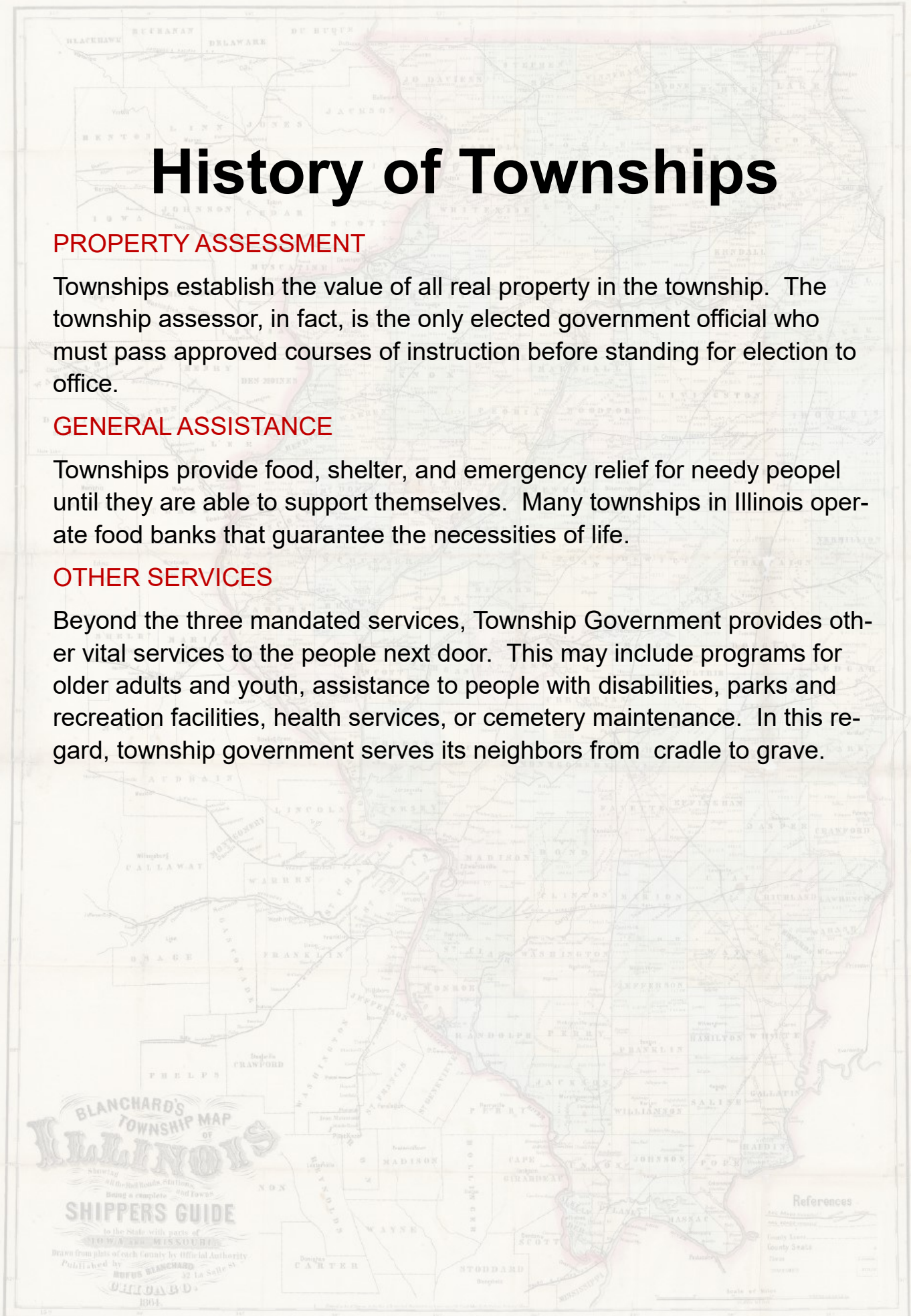
Townships establish the value of all real property in the township. The township assessor, in fact, is the only elected government official who must pass approved courses of instruction before standing for election to office.

GENERAL ASSISTANCE

Townships provide food, shelter, and emergency relief for needy people until they are able to support themselves. Many townships in Illinois operate food banks that guarantee the necessities of life.

OTHER SERVICES

Beyond the three mandated services, Township Government provides other vital services to the people next door. This may include programs for older adults and youth, assistance to people with disabilities, parks and recreation facilities, health services, or cemetery maintenance. In this regard, township government serves its neighbors from cradle to grave.

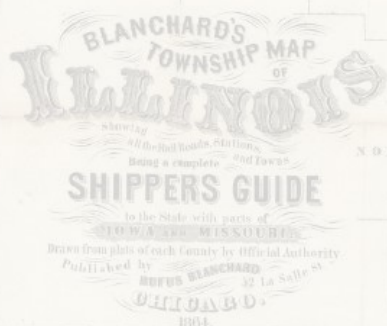
WHAT DOES YOUR TOWNSHIP DO?

Five questions to perfect your elevator pitch:

1. Who do you do it for?
2. What's in it for the people you serve?
3. What does your organization do? (Services, not departments here)
4. Why are you different than my...city, village, park district, library, etc.?
5. What is your organization? (We are a township...)

FOR EXAMPLE:

ITASCSC is the Illinois Township Association of Senior Citizens' Service Committees. We provide professionals who work with older adults opportunities for education, collaboration, networking, and resources within the framework of township government.

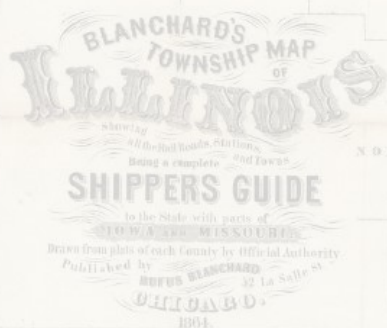

Township Day Planning

1. Find a few key people to involve in the planning of your event. A good place to start may be people who know about your township services and/or use the services.
2. Ask the potential group members if they would be willing to help put on a small event to inform other residents about what the township does.
3. Meet with the group to brainstorm different ideas to bring people to the event. Some ideas:
 - Bake sale
 - Yard or trunk sale (people selling goods out of their car trunks)
 - Music festival: local talent from the high school, community bands, or other local acts
 - Car wash
 - Pie judging contest
 - **The possibilities are endless....**
4. Divide tasks amongst the “troops.” Assign jobs such as
 - Press release/poster maker
 - Food
 - Logistics of the event
 - Volunteer Coordinator (this person should be a strong influence in the community who knows everyone and can place people in different activities.)
5. Follow our timeline for a successful event.



Participation Tips

Illinois Township Day is an opportunity to educate residents and showcase to the community the services, programs and resources your township provides. Townships may offer a wide range of benefits including youth and family services, social services, social services, Assessor's offices, recreational programs, and road and bridge maintenance, and more.

All townships are asked to participate in **Illinois Township Day** by hosting an open house. Invite residents to stop by your offices/departments, meet elected officials and staff, ask questions, and collect information. This is a great opportunity to hand out your literature (brochures, resident guide, resource directory, etc.) and inform residents of your many programs and services.

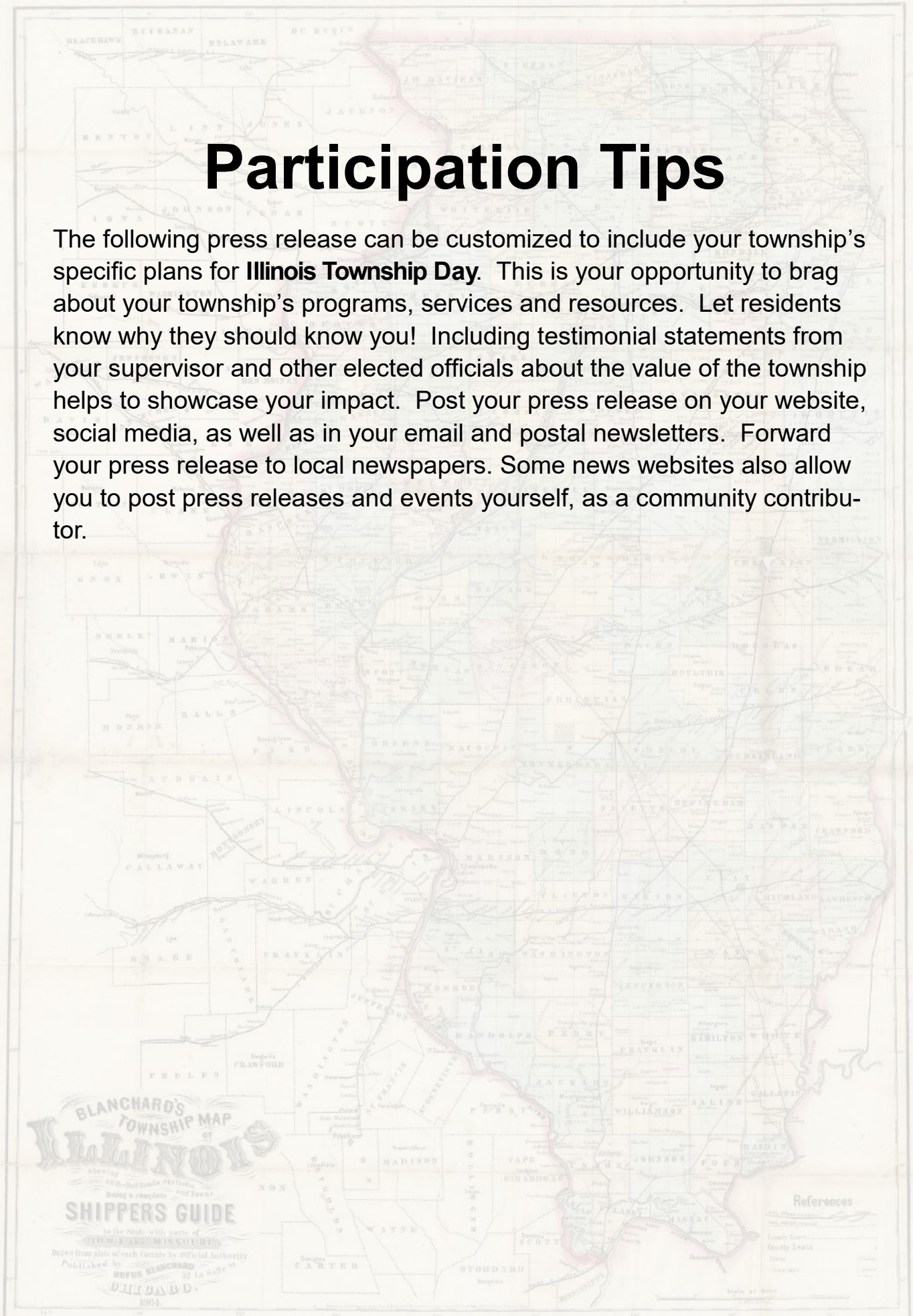
In addition to having an open house, consider a secondary activity or event to attract residents, such as a community blood drive, ice cream social or even a chili cook-off at your town hall. You can even make it a charitable event by encouraging attendees to bring donations of non-perishable food items for a local pantry or school supplies for those in need.

Share your plans for **Illinois Township Day** on social media. Create fliers to post around the community, including village halls, park districts, churches and local businesses. Create a graphic flier that can be published in electronic newsletters (yours and your community partners).



Participation Tips

The following press release can be customized to include your township's specific plans for **Illinois Township Day**. This is your opportunity to brag about your township's programs, services and resources. Let residents know why they should know you! Including testimonial statements from your supervisor and other elected officials about the value of the township helps to showcase your impact. Post your press release on your website, social media, as well as in your email and postal newsletters. Forward your press release to local newspapers. Some news websites also allow you to post press releases and events yourself, as a community contributor.



Planning Timeline

- ASAP** Initial team meeting, gather troops, and assign duties.
- May 5** Brainstorming session, bring in support for a discussion on progress.
- June 4** Planning session; bring in willing bodies to commit to 4th of July promotion for residents to “save the date.” Start looking for more recruits.
- July 4** Promotional flyer to hand out at local parades or outreach events.
- August 4** Meet with group. Circle back on preparedness for event. Troubleshoot any issues.
- Complete BY September 1**
1. Use press release for local media outlets
 2. Determine which contacts will personally invite others.
 3. Contact local papers and request coverage
 4. Schedule and create social media posts
 5. Create a flyer and post widely
 6. Spread word with phone calls or word of mouth
- September 1** Group meeting: ensure all the details are covered. Disperse all promotional materials.
- Five days before event**
1. Last minute push!
 2. Confirm any people who are participating/performing
 3. Remind staff and residents to spread the word.
- Day Of** Enjoy your event; Volunteer Coordinator to assign helpers
- Day After** Send thank you notes to any special guests, volunteers; send letter to editor for a successful event.
- Two weeks after** Host post-event wrap up meeting and gather feedback for next year's event!

Tips to Divide and Conquer

1. Form a small committee to formulate a plan for your township. The committee could include
 - Board Members
 - Community Members
 - Business Leaders
 - Scout Leaders
 - Volunteer Group Leaders
 - Township Supporters
2. Decide how BIG or small your Township Day will be.
3. Play to people's strengths; you will be surprised the talents that lie within your volunteers.
4. Make certain that every volunteer has a meaningful job.
5. Always, always, always THANK your volunteers.

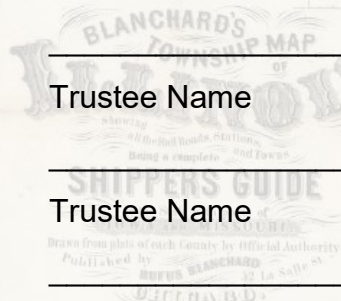

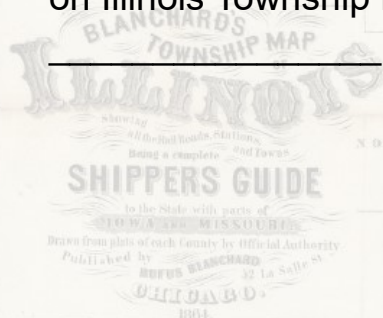

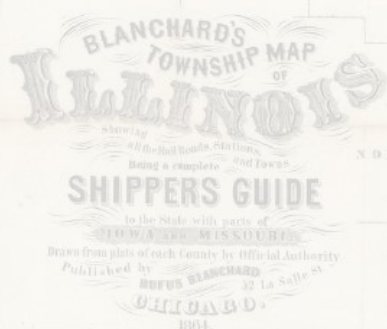
