2 entries in each class allowed, must be different varieties.

Stems (calyx) and/or roots to be trimmed to ½”.

Plates will be provided for display.

Exhibits to be placed between 6pm - 6:45pm

SECTION A - VEGETABLES/ FRUIT

ALLIUMS(leeks, chives, shallots, scallions, mugwort)

Class 1 - GARLIC - 3 bulbs, necks trimmed to 1 in

Class 2 - ONIONS - 3

Class 3 - ONIONS, green - 5

Class 4 - ONIONS, pickling - 5

APIACEAE or UMBELLIFERS(celery, parsley, dill, chervil, cilantro, parsnip)

Class 5 - CARROTS - 3, any variety, trimmed

BETA vulgaris(chard, sugar beets)

Class 6 - BEETS - 3, trim stem, washed but not scrubbed

BRASSICA(bok choy, brussel sprouts, collards, kale, rape, rutabaga, turnip, horseradish, radish, cress, allysum, mustards)

Class 7 - BROCCOLI -1 head, remove outer leaves

Class 8 - CAULIFLOWER - 1 head, remove outer leaves

Class 9 - CABBAGE - 1 head, remove outer leaves

CUCURBITACEAE

Class 10 - CUCUMBER, slicing - 3 of any one variety

Class 11 - CUCUMBER, pickling - 5

Class 12 - MELONS - 1

Class 13 - SQUASH, summer - 3

Class 14 - SQUASH, winter - 1

LEGUMES (peas, beans, lentils)

Class 15 - BEANS - 5, with calyx

MALLOWS(hibiscus, hollyhocks)

Class 16 - OKRA - 5

***NIGHTSHADES- (tobacco,petunias, ground cherry, datura,chili peppers)
contain solanine which can aggravate arthritis and inflammation***

Class 17- EGGPLANT - 1, wiped not washed

Class 18 - PEPPERS -3, with 1/2 in. stems

Class 19 - POTATOES - 3, brushed

Class 20 - TOMATILLOS, 3 with husk pulled back to show fruit

Class 21 - TOMATOES, cherry - 1 spray, with calyx

Class 22 - TOMATOES, slicing - 3, with calyx

ZEA mays

Class 23 - CORN - 3, 1/3 husk and silk removed from tip to bottom

Class 24 - RASPBERRIES - 5

Class 25 - ANY OTHER FRUIT - 3

Class 26 - ANY OTHER VEGETABLE - 3

SECTION B - HERBS

plants with aromatic or savoury properties, one entry per class

Class 27 - HERB IN POT - 1, named

Class 28 - HERB PLANTER - 3 or more herbs grown in a single container, named

Class 29 - HERB BOUQUET - a collection of cut herbs(minimum 3 different varieties) in a container with water, named

SECTION C - COLLECTIONS

grown by exhibitor, one entry per class

**Class 30 - COLLECTION of VEGETABLES - 3 minimum, named, in a
suitable container**

Class 31 - COLLECTION of FRUITS - 3 minimum, named, in a suitable container

SECTION D - DESIGN

Items may be purchased for the designs, one entry per class.

Class 32 - MAKE US LAUGH - Fruit and/or Vegetable creature

Class 33 - EDIBLE BOUQUET - displayed in a jar

Class 34 - BOWL ME OVER - local, seasonal fruits and vegetables displayed in a bowl

Class 35 - POT o' HERBS - a Pot-et- Fleur created with Edible flowers and/or berries on a vine with herbs as the foliage

SECTION E - BOTTLED PRESERVES

The following classes are to be processed, named and dated and presented in ½ pt, pint, or quart size canning jars. They will be opened and sampled by the judge. (spicy or hot MUST be stated on the jars) Two entries per class, must be different recipes.

Class 36 - Jams and Jellies..any variety

Class 37 - Pickled Vegetables..any variety

Class 38 - Relish or Chutneys ...any variety

Class 39 - any other processed fruit or vegetable

SECTION F - JUNIOR COMPETITORS (16 years of age and under)

Class - SUNFLOWERS - grow in average to poor soil, *plant 3 seeds*, 12 in. apart, 1/2” deep, in full sun. *These plants may grow to 4 feet tall.*

**** Cut your biggest flower with a stem about 10” long and put it in a container of water and bring it in to win your prize!! ****

Let the birds eat the seeds on the tall stalks.

Class - BEETS - *plant a row of seeds, ½” deep and ¼” apart.* Keep them watered if there is no rain. beets like the cooler weather so you can plant them right now. Eat the small ones, with the leaves(steam them) to make room for a few to grow big.

****Bring in your biggest beet to win a prize!!****

Class - SCARLET RUNNER (pole beans) - *plant 3 seeds(these are the big speckled seeds in your packet), 1” deep and 3” apart* close to a pole or chain link fence or even some tall stalks or branches (anything their tendrils can twist around to climb up) They will have beautiful flowers that attract hummingbirds and butterflies, and you can also eat the young bean pods that grow after the flower drops off. *They will grow 7’ tall and bloom well into August.*

****Bring in some flowers in a vase and/or pods to win your prize!!****
