Lucky Dog Humane Education Lesson 6 –Adoptable Animals Display

OBJECTIVE: To inspire children to feel empathy and compassion for animals and all living creatures through a follow up research project. Children will develop research skills, vocabulary and writing skills while they critically think of ways to help network shelter animals to find forever homes.

PREPARATION: Presenters will read the story Buddy Unchained by Daisy Bix and lead an interactive session on being kind, helping others, and speaking out when we see cruelty. This gives students basic knowledge of being a responsible citizen and doing their part in stopping cruelty and neglect.

METHOD:

- Lucky Dog H.E. presenters will use a PowerPoint Storybook presentation, accompanied by posters, puppets, and props – After listening to the story of Buddy Unchained the teacher will lead a discussion on ways the students can make a difference. The teacher will guide the students to create an "Animal Adoption Center" by creating a display of adoptable animals with profiles highlighting each animal's strengths and needs. This display can be placed in the front office or other highly trafficked area of the school. (or at a local pet store or veterinarian office)

IMPLEMENTATION:

- · Look up your local animal shelter website
- Print pictures of adoptable shelter dogs (and other pets)
- Instruct students to choose a pet and research that pet's needs
- Guide students to write an adoption biography for their chosen pet (each student may choose 1 pet or the class can discuss and collaborate on the write-ups)
- (See sample write ups below)
- Stress to students that when adopting a pet that a family needs to do research and make sure that they can meet
 that pet's needs for life. Also make sure students know that if their family is not ready for the commitment that they
 need to respect their parent/guardian's decision, and even thank them for waiting which is the responsible choice to
 make.
- Make an Animal shelter poster with all the pet pictures and profiles. Display it your school office or at your local pet store

Materials: Computer (shelter website, animal pictures, shelter biographies and further research of breed needs and/or medical needs) printer, poster paper or trifold display

Concepts: Building Character, empowering children to become civically engaged and to make a difference.

CONCLUSION: Have children decide the best place to display their shelter where more potential adopters will see it. Save display for the school wide "Kindnessfest" at the conclusion of the Lucky Dog Humane Education program.

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Sample Animal Profile:
