



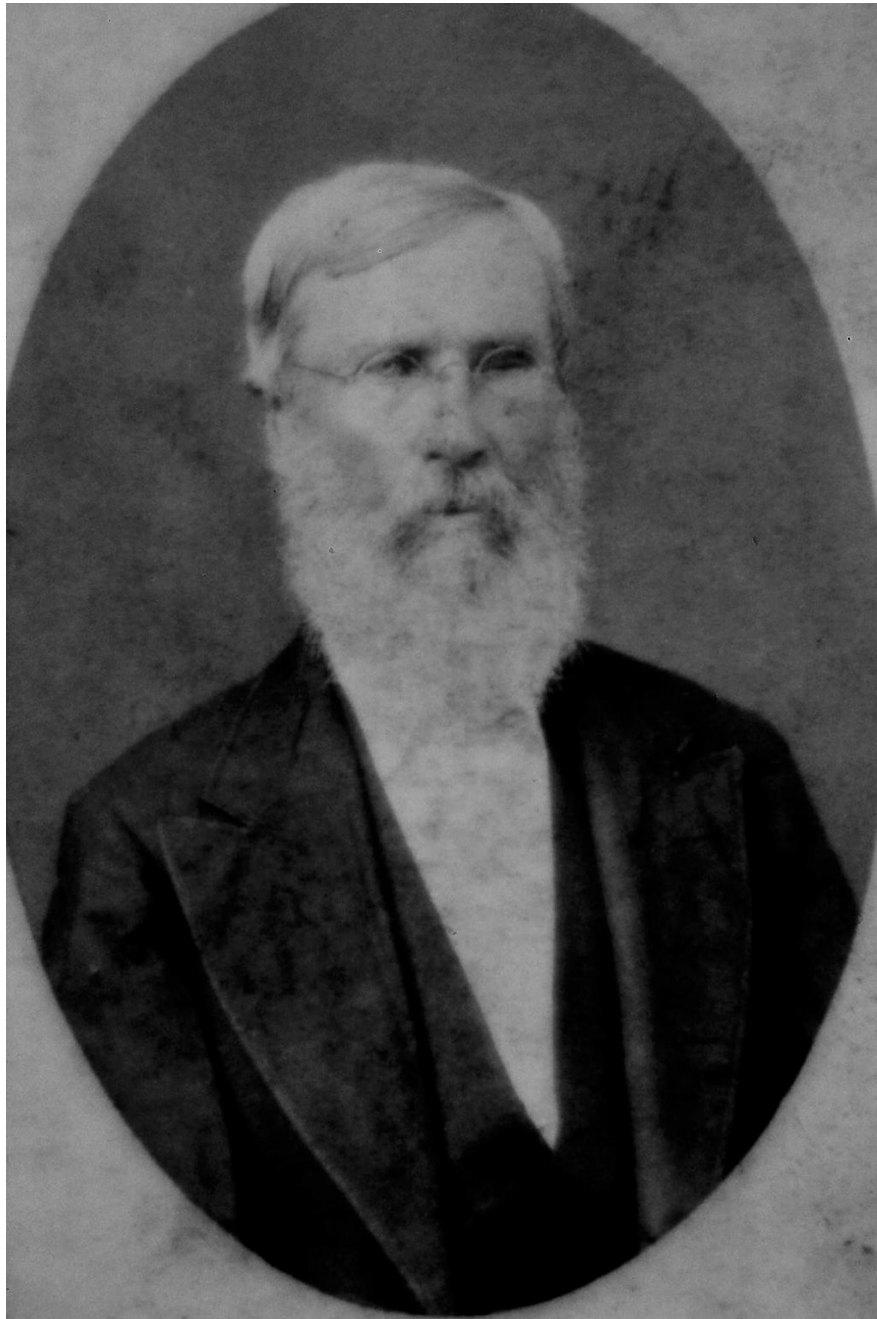

MARTIN, JAMES FISHER (1808–1888). James Fisher Martin, doctor, sheriff, and rancher, was born at Newcastle-on-Tyne, England, in 1808. He was educated at Edinburgh, Scotland, and then practiced medicine in Liverpool, England. He immigrated to Anderson County, South Carolina, in 1830, moved to Texas during the [Texas Revolution](#), and attended the wounded after the [battle of San Jacinto](#). Subsequently he opened a drugstore and doctor's office in Matagorda. He also invested in cattle and land in the area. Martin, an Episcopalian, married Julia Ann Eberly on May 28, 1840, at Christ Church in Matagorda. They had five children. Between August 1848 and December 1851, Martin served as sheriff of Matagorda County. He resigned his post after killing a suspected rustler, Francis Waldeman; the incident was complicated by the fact that Waldeman was allegedly stealing Martin's cattle. At his trial in Brazoria County, Martin was acquitted. He and his family moved to a site in Karnes County near Helena in the early 1850s and lived on land owned by Julia Eberly Martin's family. In the 1890s the deeds were transferred to the Martin children and grandchildren. Martin died on April 21, 1888, and was buried at the Escondido Cemetery near Kenedy.

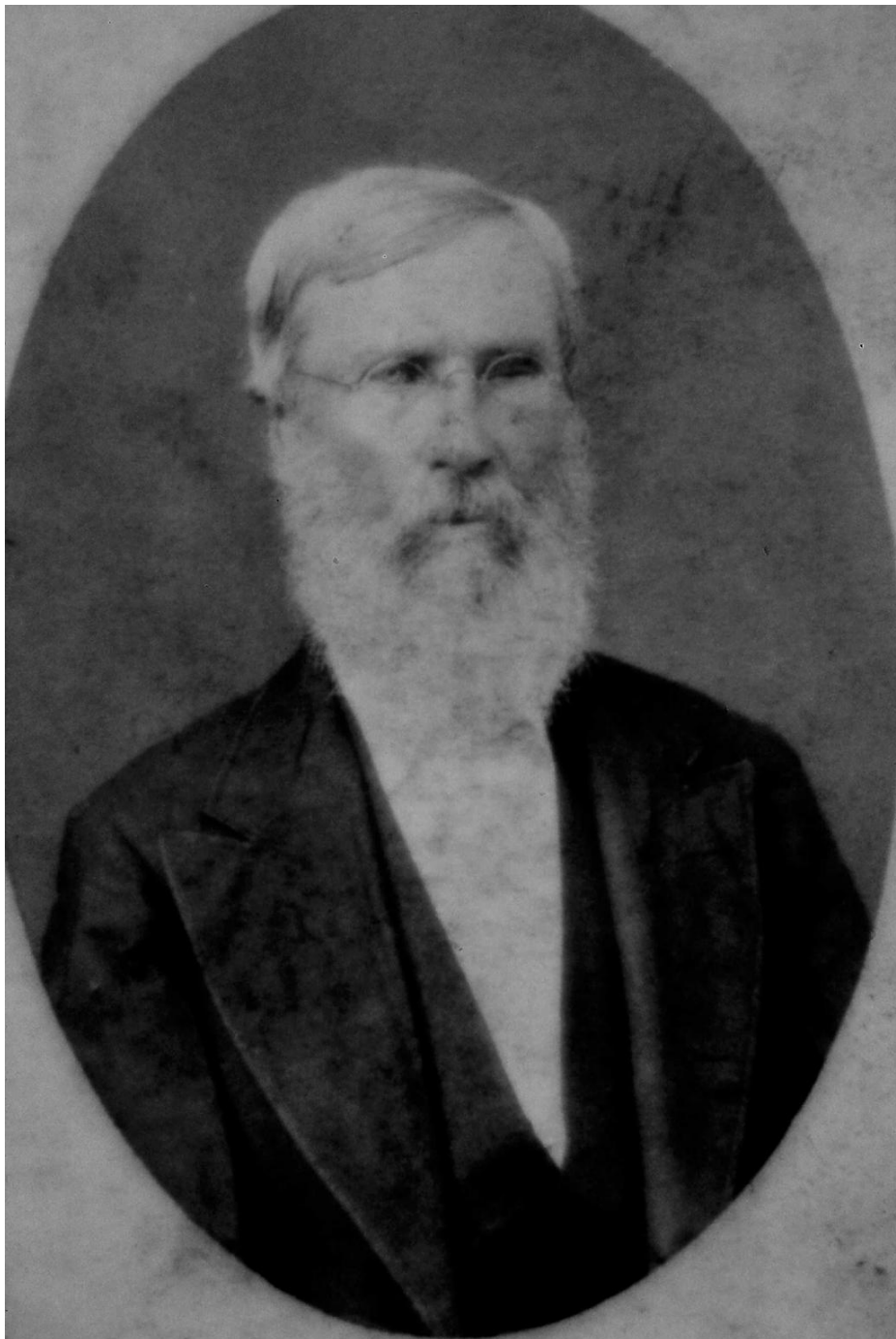

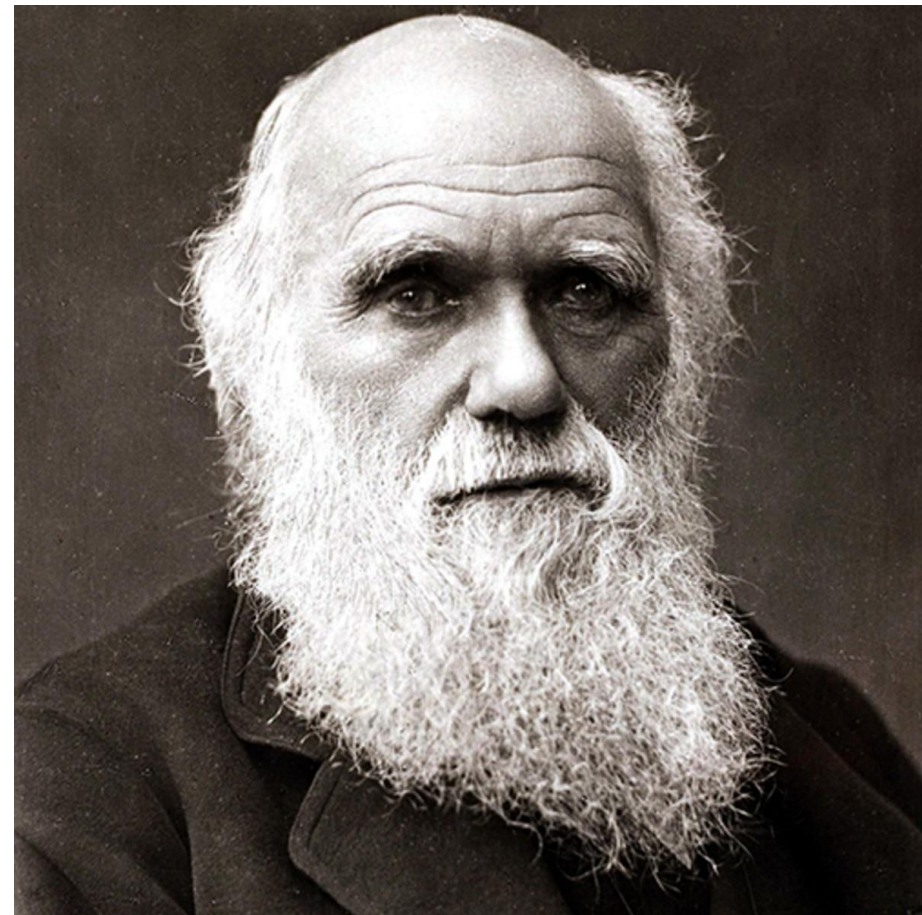

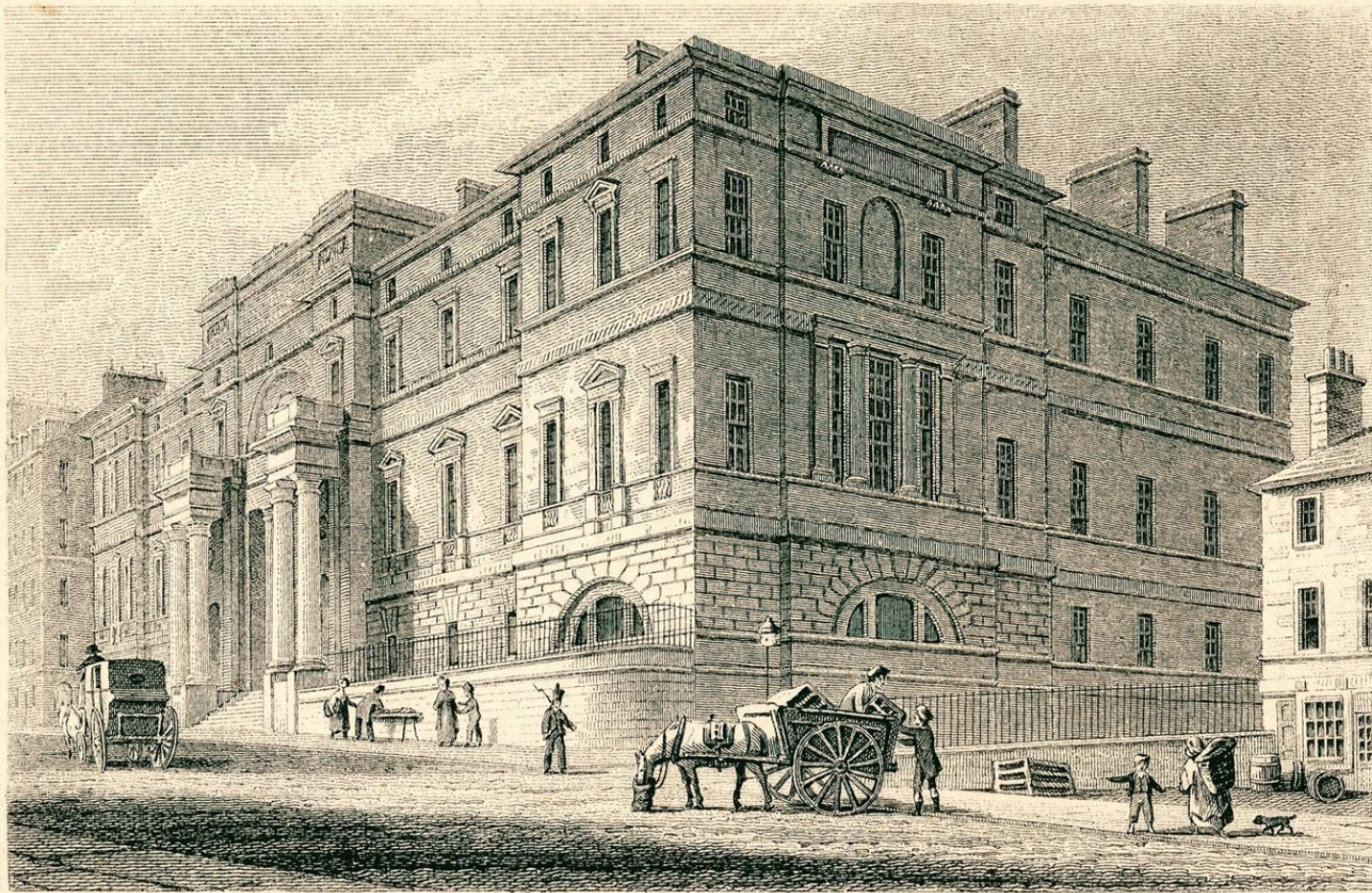

THE UNIVERSITY.

Depicts the Old College, University of Edinburgh. The foundation stone of the building now known as Old College was laid in 1789, but construction work was hindered by the Napoleonic Wars, and only a small part of Robert Adam's original design was built. The building was completed between 1817 and 1840 following an amended design by William Playfair. A dome by Robert Rowand Anderson was added in 1877. Scott attended the University of Edinburgh between 1783 and 1786 and between 1789 and 1792. The Old College faces College Wynd, Scott's birthplace.

Two students and a teacher can use this microscope while the teacher carries out a dissection or explains a slide. Microscopes had ever expanding uses in the 19th century, for example in botany, geology, metallurgy, histology and the new disciplines of bacteriology and embryology. This instrument was ordered for the Edinburgh medical students by Professor John Hughes Bennett (1812-1875) who had trained as a doctor on the Continent where all medical students learned to use microscopes. He was instrumental in making such training universal in Britain. By his own microscopic studies Hughes Bennett discovered leukaemia, showing that the blood, like other organs, was subject to disease. Formerly in the Department of Physiology, University of Edinburgh; now in the National Museums of Scotland.

Depicts Loch Leven Castle on Castle Island, Loch Leven, Fife. Sir Walter Scott's *The Abbot* (1820) centres around the imprisonment and escape from Loch Leven Castle of Mary, Queen of Scots. The thirteenth-century castle, built on the largest island in the Loch, also figures repeatedly in *Tales of a Grandfather, First Series* (1828).

1825

Engraved portrait of Walter Scott (aged forty-seven or forty-eight), surrounded by a Gothic border with vignettes taken from his poems. The original portrait by Andrew Geddes began life as a study for his *The Discovery of the Regalia of Scotland* (1821). The sitting took place some time between 4 February 1818, the date of the discovery of the Regalia, and the beginning of 1819 when Scott fell seriously ill. The portrait suggests that Scott's health is already deteriorating. Originally purchased by the collector Sir James Stuart, 7th Baronet of Allanbank, the picture now hangs in the Scottish National Portrait Gallery. Woolnoth's engraving is after a drawing by Geddes himself, or possibly after an earlier engraving by F.C. Lewis (1824). The ornamental frieze by Hawkesworth features scenes from Scott's poems, some based on illustrations by Richard Westall. Scott had not yet publicly acknowledged authorship of the *Waverley Novels* (he would do so in 1827).
