Starting in April through November First Tuesday of the Month

Sec. 28-3. - Curbside brush collection.

Brush to be placed on curb not more than 72 hours before the designated day of collection. No brush shall be placed between the sidewalk and the curb or at any residential section in the village for collection more than 72 hours before the designated day of collection.

Brush pick-up. Brush will be picked up on the first Tuesday of the month, April through November by the public works department. Limbs and branches should be no longer than ten feet in length and $3\frac{1}{2}$ inches in diameter, piled at the curbside with the cut ends pointed toward the center of the street.








Free Program Open to the Public Tuesday, April 25th, 2023 10:00 a.m. to 12:00 p.m. Village of Sharon Community Center

Arntzen Corporation continues to move ahead with their construction. Although there has been no definite date set for them to be fully operational, they are making progress. On Tuesday February 7,2023 I had the pleasure of attended a walkthrough of the new Arntzen Plant. What an amazing experience to have been a part of. What I truly enjoyed the most, was the Excitement in John Arntzen's voice as he explained the numerous locations within the buildings and plans of operation.

Mr. Arntzen is truly thankful and excited about the opportunity he has laid out with the Village of Sharon. It has been a long process, with much more to go, but it is an experience he had hoped for, for a very long time. Mr. Arntzen expressed how over the years he had always said "he could do this another way, a better way, but we do not have the space." But now having a building that is built to his specifications, he "Can now make it happen"



They are working on the start date for the Rail Spur to go in, as well as Alliant Energy on getting the Electrical Substation installed. Alliant Energy is hoping for around December of this year. Mr. Arntzen is anxiously looking forward to the day when they are in full operation.

We started our tour in the reception and office areas, which will consist of 10 working cubical spaces, 4 restrooms (3 unisex and 1 woman's), a walk-in kitchen area and break room, file room, server room, and a huge copy and print room that overlooks the plant. The windows within the Copy Room will be equipped with Fire Shutters on the plant side, but the room offers a great view into the plant.

We then headed out into the actual Plant. Where tons of progress has been accomplished there as well. All the operational Offices are roughed in and await finishing. There will be both men and woman's locker rooms, 3 bathrooms and wash areas, a lunchroom area equipped with tables - vending machines and microwaves. And an area set up for Secure Storage of maintenance equipment.

To continue on, the plant is set up with 3 Operation Bays all heated with 21 Radiant Heat Sources. Set up with Heavy Duty Cranes, able to lift 25 Ton's. All have a 25 foot under bridge which gives them the capacity to handle larger rolled steel. All Cranes are manufactured right here in Milwaukee, Wisconsin at Superior Cane Corporation. The Maintenance Department is located along side Bay #1, the area is large enough to be converted into an Operational Area if needed.

Bay #1, is where the Sheets of steel are brought in, after it arrives by Rail. They slide the sheets into the Bay using Forklifts that handle weights from 30,000 pounds up to 55,000 pounds, the forks are 3" thick and 6" wide. The forklifts slide the steel into the bay far enough to allow for the Crane to be able to pick them up. They are then placed onto the Messer Plasma Cutter, also made here in Menomonee Falls Wisconsin. The Plasma Cutter is equipped with a Downdraft system to exhaust smoke and dust particles out of the building. There are zoned chambers for the exhaust which are mechanically operated by damper doors that automatically open as the machine passes over a zone where the cutting is occurring. Bay #1 also handles a Plate Roller, right now it is just a hole in the ground, with a foundation to hold the actual roller. The Plate Roller sits onto the foundation you see in place, the area around it allows access to the equipment when needed. They are equipped to roll steel that is 20' wide or better and at least 1" thick, the Hardox 450 steel they use is an abrasion-resistant, for long lasting performance, with a nominal hardness which combines both bendability and weldability.

Bay #2 is set up additional Plate Rollers, very similar to Bay #2. Finally, we have Bay #3 that also allows for a smaller Plate Roller, that handles 14' of rolling. Bay #3 is also the home of the Welder, which can automatically weld up to a 14' diameter pipe. After going through all the stage of building the Pipes, they will then leave the plant via truck.

Now, I am sure I have left off plenty of information, but wanted to give everyone an insight on the progress being made to get Arntzen closer to full operation. Mr. Artzen is hoping to have another open house when they are further along in the process. The plant will be operating 3 full shifts and providing 40, and possibly more, employment opportunities. Of course, as with any business or operation they will be bringing some of their experienced staff into some of the positions. But as time goes on, they will be adding staff from around the area.

The Village of Sharon and Arntzen Corporation are looking forward to a long and prosperous partnership as we welcome him into our area.

HOSTAGE TAKEOVER ON THE AMAZON

For over 20 years I have been organizing bicycle tours to all corners of Peru. This year was our "Andes to the Amazon" tour and we had a group of 15 including support staff. Alessandra and her sister Samantha were members of the Peruvian woman's cycling team. They were the main organizer for this tour and the proceeds would go to pay for their team's travel expenses.

On our sixth day of cycling, we reached the river port where we boarded a barge-type riverboat to start a 400-mile journey to the city of Iquitos on the Amazon River. Iquitos is one of the most secluded large cities in the world only accessible by airplane or riverboat. Along the way, the riverboat would stop at a few remote villages. I've traveled this way over ten times and it's always been a relaxing trip between challenging cycling days.





Our boat was over 100 feet long and the decks were filled with cargo and passengers. The boat was packed with luggage, families, and hammocks. It was a giant slumber party and everyone got to know their neighbors. The captain predicted we would arrive in the town of Nauta 30 hours later.




Our first evening on the boat was relaxing as we watched the sunset highlight the silhouette of the trees lining the shore. The river was as wide as the Mississippi River near St. Louis. Watching the jungle float by is one of my favorite pastimes. Our group of riders were exceptional travelers with a great attitudes, and they could make the best of any situation, which would be useful in the days ahead.





Before we boarded the boat we bought several bundles of school supplies, intending to deliver them to some village schools where the boat stopped. The captain said there was a village ahead where he planned to meet with the village leaders for an hour, giving us plenty of time to deliver the donations.





As we neared the village, three small boats approached, full of men with spears and flying Peruvian flags. Some of them were dressed as warriors, in traditional colorful robes and decorated with warpaint and headdresses. I assumed it was a welcoming party to greet us as we docked the boat. The three boats of village warriors boarded our larger vessel through the rear doorway near the propeller. We heard yelling on the lower deck in the engine room where a fight with the crew ensued. After a few minutes, the yelling, along with the roar of the Caterpillar engine, fell silent. We realized the warriors were not a welcoming party and had in fact stabbed one of the crew members and seized our boat's battery, disabling our engine.

The captain along with his crew were quickly captured and taken back to the village. We were ordered to remain on the boat and told we would be held here for five to six days. Many of the local passengers were angry, but Alessandra kept everyone calm. She spoke with the warriors and encouraged the rest of the passengers not to start a fight.

I immediately started to inventory our water and cookies and determine if we had enough to ration. The boat kitchen was closed so we could not access any supplies. By mid-afternoon, a few warriors ordered everyone to leave their luggage, exit the boat, and assemble on the island for a meeting. They assisted everyone off of the boat and helped us walk along the narrow wooden plank to the shore. They even carried a fellow in a wheelchair down the stairs and up the shore bank.





The village leaders spoke in Spanish, but we understood they were talking about their village's problems with the oil pipeline that crossed their land. For several years, oil leakage polluted the river and caused health problems. The village did not think they were receiving any benefit from the oil companies drilling on their land.

The passengers were allowed to return to the boat, but Alessandra, Samantha, and I stayed behind with the chief. Alessandra said he must have had some education because he knew the legal terms of taking prisoners. The warriors had been careful not to threaten anyone with the guns they used for hunting only using spears, clubs, and machetes.

Alessandra asked the chief what they needed to improve their lives, he answered: The oil company must stop polluting the river. They needed medical attention for the villagers with cancer or other problems from the contaminated water, as well as a clean water source. They needed more economic opportunities to sell produce or grow food, and lastly, better education opportunities.

Samantha had a job working with the government for economic development in rural jungle villages. The chief was impressed she had contacts with the government. We told the chief about the work we had done building schools and installing water purification systems in the area, as well as educational supplies we regularly donated to other villages. The chief was thankful for our understanding and although we were hostages, we felt the village had reasonable requests.

We had limited cell phone coverage, but managed a few calls to the American Embassy and received many different reports of what would happen. Some said a rescue boat was on the way, and others said the police were coming but even the fastest motorboat would take 10 hours to reach our remote location.

During the night, a large boat similar to ours had docked across the river. Unfortunately, it wasn't for us. Alessandra was on the phone with the Amazon Navy trying to find out why we couldn't use the recently arrived boat. Finally, after a long negotiation, our original captain agreed to pay everyone's fair, including the local travelers, for the new boat to bring us to Nauta.

The new boat pulled alongside ours, and everyone started climbing from one boat to the other. We soon found out that the new boat was narrower and shorter. All the hammocks that barely fit on the original boat were even more tightly crammed together. Luckily, everyone on the boat were friends by now, and could put up with some discomfort. The village warriors helped transfer bags of rice, bundles of bananas, and other cargo from the lower deck of our old boat. Before we left the village, Alessandra and gave the chief the school supplies we had been carrying. It was a small token of support for their village compared to what they needed, but they were pleased.





Our boat left the riverbank in late afternoon, and we finally headed toward Nauta. We were relieved to be moving. We made good progress on the river that night but we were still over 30 hours behind our schedule, but eventually made it to Iquitos safe.

We were fortunate that everything worked out. We had a fantastic group on our tour who pulled together to make the best of a bad situation. Everyone was impressed with how Alessandra negotiated with the village and the other boat passengers to keep everything under control. It is not an experience we want to repeat, but it was an adventure we will all remember.

Samantha and Alessandra will be coming to Sharon this summer for 3 months and traveling with our tours in the United States. In October we will be returning to the hostage village to install a water well pump and filter system in their village.

We have done over 25 tours in Peru and Africa and they always have some good adventures.





Last year, Christ Lutheran Church hosted a book giveaway in the spring.
