1 <u>I. Introduction</u>

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- 2 O1. PLEASE STATE YOUR NAME, OCCUPATION, AND BUSINESS ADDRESS.
- 3 A1. My name is Gregory Falkowski, and I am Crown Point's Economic Development Director.
- 4 My business address is 101 East St., Crown Point, Indiana.
- 5 Q2. PLEASE SUMMARIZE YOUR PROFESSIONAL AND EDUCATIONAL
- **6 QUALIFICATIONS AND EXPERIENCE.**
- 7 A2. I have a BA degree from Valparaiso University. Professionally I have served in several capacities:
 - I worked as Chief Operations Officer for the South Shore Convention and Visitors
 Authority from September 2022 through January 2024, where my responsibilities
 included operations, long-range planning, contracting, long-range planning capital
 projects and personnel. In this role, I built partnerships with five cities, eight
 towns, and Lake County Council.
 - I worked as the Crown Point Chief of Staff and Planning Administrator from July 2014 through September 2022. In that role, I determined City objectives and increased community value and social / quality of life for Crown Point residents and businesses. I also managed and coordinated city infrastructure projects and secured local, state and federal funding.
 - From 2009 through 2014, I worked as a Union Carpenter on various commercial and industrial projects. I coordinated scaffolding builds for multiple crafts during the BP Whiting Refinery Modernization Project.

1		• From 2008 to 2009, I was the Planning Administrator for Lake County Planning
2		Commission and prepared reports of staff recommendations for new development.
3		I also assisted with planning, zoning, and building permits and review.
4		• From 2002 through 2010, I was a United States Army Staff Sergeant assigned to
5		Eighth Army, Korea and European Command Intelligence Units. I was also a
6		Trained Imagery Analyst with AS in Intelligence Operations.
7	Q3.	PLEASE DESCRIBE YOUR POSITION AT THE CITY OF CROWN POINT,
8		INDIANA ("CROWN POINT") AND YOUR SPECIFIC EXPERIENCE WITH
9		CROWN POINT, AND ITS MUNICIPAL SEWER AND WATER UTILITIES.
10	A3.	I have been the Economic Development Director of Crown Point since 2024. In that role,
11		I and other staff work to promote business growth, retention, and employment attraction
12		and thereby secure a strong revenue base for the city. We actively identify opportunities
13		for development and redevelopment in our commercial, industrial, and residential areas of
14		the city. We look for ways to enhance quality of life elements for current and future
15		residents through employment, recreation, income creation, and housing opportunities.
16		Overall, the primary goal is to help Crown Point residents and businesses by growing
17		Crown Point's economic activity, increasing area employment and revenue streams, and
18		increasing public social, athletic, health and happiness opportunities. In short, we work to
19		make Crown Point an enjoyable, enriching, prosperous place to live and do business.

The above is not possible without regional collaboration. The city has strong

partnerships with our county government and the vast majority of surrounding

municipalities. I also work on a regular basis with many other regional and economic

development groups, such as the Northwest Indiana Regional Development Authority,

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1		Northwest Indiana Forum, Northwest Indiana Regional Planning Commission, One
2		Region, and the Lake County Economic Alliance – on which I have served on the board
3		of directors.
4		My experience with Crown Point sewer and water utilities started in 2014 when I
5		began working as the City Planning Administrator and later the Chief of Staff for Crown
6		Point. In both roles, I regularly worked with our utilities departments for current and
7		future improvements and economic developments.
8	Q4.	MR. FALKOWSKI, HAVE YOU PREVIOUSLY TESTIFIED BEFORE THE
9		INDIANA UTILITY REGULATORY COMMISSION ("COMMISSION")?
10	A4.	No, I have not.
11	Q5.	ARE YOU FAMILIAR WITH CROWN POINT'S ORDINANCE NO. 2025-02-08
12		AND THE TOWN OF WINFIELD, INDIANA'S ("WINFIELD") ORDINANCE NO
13		358?
14	A5.	I am familiar with Ordinance No. 2023-08-19, passed by the Crown Point Commor
15		Council on August 7, 2023, and the service territory identified therein. I am also familian
16		with the Crown Point Ordinance No. 2025-02-08 (the "Crown Point Ordinance"), passed
17		on March 3, 2025, which updates Ordinance No. 2023-08-19. The updates include a revised
18		territory map for what I will refer to as the "Crown Point Expansion Area," and a new
19		schedule of water and sewer rates and charges. I am additionally familiar with Ordinance
20		No. 358, passed by the Winfield Town Council on December 12, 2023 (the "Winfield
21		Ordinance") and the service territory identified therein. Further, I am familiar with the
22		overlapping area of service territory common to both the Crown Point Ordinance and the
23		Winfield Ordinance that is the subject of this dispute (the "Disputed Area"). I understand

1		that the Commission will decide in this Cause the issue of whether the Disputed Area will
2		be a part of Crown Point's proposed regulated territory or Winfield's proposed regulated
3		territory.
4	Q6.	HAVE YOU REVIEWED AND ARE YOU FAMILIAR WITH THE CROWN
5		POINT AMENDED PETITION ("PETITION") IN CAUSE NO. 46035 WHICH
6		SEEKS COMMISSION APPROVAL OF CROWN POINT'S ORDINANCE NO.
7		2025-02-08?
8	A6.	Yes. A copy of the Amended Petition in Cause No. 46035, with all attachments, is attached
9		hereto as Attachment A.
10	Q7.	DO YOU BELIEVE THE PETITION ACCURATELY REFLECTS CROWN
11		POINT'S INTENTIONS?
12	A7.	Yes, I do.
13	Q8.	WHAT IS THE PURPOSE OF YOUR DIRECT TESTIMONY IN THIS
14		PROCEEDING?
15	A8.	To explain and demonstrate Crown Point's ability to promote economic development in
16		the Crown Point Expansion Area created by the Crown Point Ordinance that is pending
17		approval by the Commission in this Cause and Cause No. 46035. The Disputed Area is
18		located within the southeast corner of the Crown Point Expansion Area. My testimony will
19		demonstrate that the inclusion of the Disputed Area in the Crown Point Expansion Area
20		will positively improve economic development in the Disputed Area.
21		I also describe the results of Crown Point's successful efforts to work with
22		neighboring municipalities to reach agreement on utility service boundary lines.
23	Q9.	WHO ELSE WILL TESTIFY FOR CROWN POINT AT THIS TIME?

1	A9.	Mr. Al Stong from Commonwealth Engineering describes Crown Point's detailed plans for
2		serving the Disputed Area in the Crown Point Expansion Area and Crown Point's ability
3		to provide wastewater utility service to the Disputed Area. Mr. Gregory Guerrettaz from
4		Financial Services Group testifies regarding Crown Point's financial ability to provide
5		sewer service to the Disputed Area in the Crown Point Expansion Area.
6	Q10.	PLEASE DESCRIBE WAS IS MEANT BY THE TERM "ECONOMIC
7		DEVELOPMENT."
8	A10.	Economic development is a multi-faceted process aimed at improving the economic well-
9		being and quality of life of a community or region encompassing job creation, business
10		growth, increased commerce, increased revenues for business and government, and overall
11		societal improvements and progress. Economic development encompasses broader
12		improvements in economic and social conditions, including poverty reduction, human
13		capital development, and environmental sustainability.
14		Creating a favorable business environment, promoting tourism, developing
15		infrastructure such as roads, utility services and government support systems are all
16		reasonable components of economic development.
17	Q11.	WHY IS ECONOMIC DEVELOPMENT IMPORTANT TO A COMMUNITY?
18	A11.	A community that pursues and achieves economic development is a community where
19		people have sufficient incomes, adequate recreational opportunities, adequate safety and
20		health support systems. An area that pursues and achieves smart economic development is
21		a great place to work and live. Crown Point is such an area.
22	Q12.	IS THERE A RELATIONSHIP BETWEEN ECONOMIC DEVELOPMENT AND
23		THE AVAILABILITY OF UTILITY SERVICES?

1	A12.	Yes, absolutely. Economic Development basically cannot occur without the availability of
2		a full array of reliable, adequate and well operated utility services.
3	Q13.	CAN YOU OFFER AN EXAMPLE TO ILLUSTRATE YOUR STATEMENT?
4	A13.	Yes. Currently there is little to no economic development in the Crown Point Expansion
5		Area, which includes the Disputed Area, in large part because of a lack of reliable, adequate
6		and well-operated water and sewer services. Crown Point is prepared to fill that void.
7 8		OWN POINT'S ECONOMIC DEVELOPMENT AND RESULTING QUALITY OF LIFE EVEMENTS AND DISTINCTIONS
9	Q14.	COMPARED TO ITS PEER COMMUNITIES, HOW HAS CROWN POINT
10		FARED IN PROVIDING A SUPERIOR PLACE TO LOCATE BUSINESSES,
11		WORK AND LIVE?
12	A14.	Very well. Crown Point has been awarded the Best Place to Live in Northwest Indiana over
13		10 times since 2010 and the Best Downtown in Northwest Indiana every year since 2010.
14		Crown Point has excelled at creating recreational, athletic, and social opportunities in a
15		safe, fun, and welcoming atmosphere and the economic benefits that flow there from it.
16		This promotes further economic development by making Crown Point a very attractive,
17		economically vibrant place for new businesses, business commerce and a very desirable
18		place to live. Crown Point's sewer and water infrastructure is a critical component to these
19		achievements.
20	Q15.	DESCRIBE SOME OF THE ECONOMIC DEVELOPMENT ACHIEVEMENTS
21		CROWN POINT HAS CREATED IN THE PAST.
22	A15.	Crown Point has a time-proven track record of economic growth and business attracting
23		social achievements that make it the make it the best venue and promoter of economic

development in the Crown Point Expansion Area. People want to be here. Crown Point's population has nearly doubled in the past 20 years – going from 19,000 in 2000 to over 34,000 in the 2020 census – and more growth is underway.

Crown Point's downtown area is an energized attraction of many shops, restaurants, businesses, live music and nightlife. The City has invested in making the downtown square Americans with Disabilities Act ("ADA") and pedestrian compatible, with the construction of bump outs, ADA ramps and outdoor seating areas for restaurants. In addition to the physical improvements, the City has created, through the State and the Indiana Alcohol & Tobacco Commission ("ATC"), a "Historic Downtown Liquor License" that is an innovation available to new dining establishments in Crown Point, which can later be sold and used elsewhere in Crown Point. This has created new economic development business which creates opportunities for additional dining and entertainment options throughout the City. It is my understanding that only Crown Point and Valparaiso meet the criteria to for offering Historic Downtown Liquor Licenses.

Some examples of socially and economically enriching facilities Crown Point has previously invested in include:

Bulldog Park – a two-plus acre community facility which includes a 16,000 square foot building that houses senior activities, not for profit meetings, parties, and office space. Bulldog Park also features a full NHL-sized hockey rink under a covered pavilion, an open space and splash pad area, and a fully outfitted amphitheater with turf seating for concerts, plays, and performances.

Crown Point Sportsplex – a 95-acre sports campus with two turf
football/soccer/lacrosse fields, 10 baseball/softball fields (seven turf), a 120,000
square foot indoor dome, and a 12,000 square foot concrete skate park. This
complex brings in hundreds of thousands of visitors per year, which supports our
local economy.

As the Lake County seat, Crown Point is home to the Lake County Government
 Center – employing and assisting thousands of people per day. Also within the
 city, we have the Lake County Fair Grounds that offers the annual Lake County
 Fair activities, ongoing business activities, expositions, area meetings, and
 outdoor activities.

Crown Point has worked to attract new businesses and help existing businesses to grow. In the past 20 years, the City has experienced unprecedented growth in both the commercial and industrial sectors. The state road and interstate access available to Crown Point and to the Disputed Area bolster new business opportunities. Having three state highways (U.S. 55, U.S. 53, and U.S. 231), and two I-65 interchanges (109th Avenue and U.S. 231) in the Cty, Crown Point is experienced at attracting transportation focused economic development opportunities. Crown Point is planned, prepared, and situated to support and grow new economic development in the full Crown Point Expansion Area, including the Disputed Area.

The City supports multiple developments and seven Tax Increment Financing TIF Allocation Areas, including the I-65/109th allocation area. These seven TIF allocation areas allow property tax revenue to be spent on investments that promote economic development in the West 109th/Broadway allocation area, Delaware & Mississippi

allocation areas, U.S. 231 allocation area, Sportsplex allocation area, and Main Street allocation area. Crown Point has direct economic growth and is prepared to support continued economic growth expansion.

Some of the specific projects that have created jobs and raised Crown Point's valuation to over 2 billion dollars are: Franciscan Hospital campus, University of Chicago Micro Hospital, Lakeshore Bone & Joint hospital and headquarters, Community Stroke & Rehabilitation Center, Point 65 Business Tech Park (including the recently opened CoreX Cold Storage, 300,000 square foot and under construction Arcadia Cold Storage, 240,000 square foot), Crown East Industrial Park (95% built out), Millenium Industrial Park (Summit Street), and Beacon Hill Commercial (multiple national chain restaurants, shops, and hotels continue to develop). We continue working to attract new economic development opportunities.

Crown Point has also had success in attracting suitable industry. We have an industrial/manufacturing business park, Point 65 Business Tech Park, where two cold storage distribution centers have recently located. There are over 200 acres within the business park shovel-ready for development. Our targets for that business park are companies that do not diminish quality of life and offer good-paying jobs. The jobs and tax revenues from those businesses support the local economy.

These and other Crown Point achievements have made Crown Point a great place to locate businesses, work, and live. Crown Point's proven social and commerce enhancing economic development abilities and utility support systems will be used promote new commerce and quality of life in the Crown Point Expansion Area including the Disputed Area as it develops.

1		None of the above would have been possible without the availability of reliable,
2		adequate well-operated water and sewer utilities.
3	Q16.	FURTHER DESCRIBE SOME OF CROWN POINT'S EFFORTS TO ATTRACT
4		ECONOMIC DEVELOPMENT WHILE DIRECTLY PROMOTING QUALITY OF
5		LIFE FOR ITS BUSINESSES AND RESIDENTS.
6	A16.	Crown Point strives to be a wise governing planner and administrator and a strong regional
7		neighbor. We plan and work to improve our utilities. We support the local business and
8		hometown feeling while growing new economic opportunities. We have not pursued big
9		box stores and retailers like those in both Merrillville and Hobart to our north.
10		We have attracted, and will continue to attract, substantial growth in the medical
11		and professional service sector to land in our commercial areas to create both access to
12		top-level care and the ability to provide high-paying and quality jobs within our own
13		community. We also have attracted businesses to our industrial area. I will later further
14		describe these businesses.
15		Crown Point did make the use of the "big box store" paradigm in the design and
16		many uses of our Sportsplex facility. Therein the vast array of sports activities facilities
17		nationally and locally attracts amateur athletes in many sports and promotes additional
18		economic activity in Crown Point. The Sportsplex complex is in addition to our Cal
19		Ripkin, five-field Little League complex located just outside the downtown square, and
20		our Center Ross, two-field full size baseball complex located adjacent to the current
21		wastewater treatment facility. These state-of-the-art complexes provide our community
22		endless possibilities for recreational activities during the week and on most weekends

turn into a tournament complex drawing visitors and competitors from throughout the

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Midwest, improving the local and Crown Point economies. The Little League complex hosted the Cal Ripken 10u World Series in 2023 and 2024 bringing teams from as far away as Australia, Europe, Asia, and Hawaii. The Sportsplex has been the home to the NSA Northern World Series over the last 10 years and regularly brings in over 200 teams from throughout the Midwest for an entire week to Crown Point. In addition to our local teams, the full-size baseball complex is also home to the Lake County Corndogs, a semi-professional baseball team. All of these athletic complexes not only create opportunities for our residents, but support our business community with the thousands of guests who come into the city and spend their disposable income at our shops, restaurants, hotels, and gas stations.

Crown Point's successful hard work in achievements such as these and the economic and social benefits that they create demonstrate our ability to grow economic development, promoting public benefits and improved quality of life for those who live and work here.

Bulldog Park is another Crown Point economic development and quality of life amenity. Bulldog Park is also adjacent to the historic downtown square, located on an over two-acre parcel of land, which contains a 16,000 square foot building with multiple community rooms, hosting our local non-for-profit meetings and events, senior activities, youth groups, and city offices. Adjacent to the building is a community splash pad, 120 x 240 open air pavilion, and bandshell with open turf seating. During the spring, summer, and fall months this location hosts a variety of community events such as local farmers markets, concert series, and festivals. During the winter months the facility turns into a NHL-sized (80x200) ice rink under the pavilion. We provide open skating, lessons, and

in-house hockey leagues in addition to multiple high school and collegiate hockey games. Currently under construction, in partnership with the Crown Point Community School Corporation is a 8,000 sq ft. building which will host four locker rooms, storage space and a new concession stand – this building will be utilized by both the school corporation and events at Bulldog Park. Bulldog Park brings residents and visitors to our downtown which will support the local economy.

Finally, another quality of life economy enhancing project was the over 80,000 square foot expansion of the Crown Point YMCA – this expansion created one of the largest YMCAs in the Midwest, featuring two indoor pools, outside pool and water recreation areas, multiple outdoor athletic fields, and countless community programs; the Crown Point YMCA now has over 40,000 members. With this success, the Crown Point YMCA has just broken ground on a 100,000 square foot facility that will have multiple basketball, volleyball, and pickleball courts.

The money spent by those who use and those who spectate at these athletic, sports and healthy exercise facilities ripples through and improves the entire area's economy.

All of these projects have been possible with the utilization of TIF funds because of Crown Point's intelligent, well-managed growth and development in our commercial and industrial areas.

Q17. WHAT DO THESE PAST CROWN POINT ECONOMIC DEVELOPMENT AND QUALITY OF LIFE ACHIEVEMENTS MEAN FOR THE DISPUTED AREA REQUESTED BY CROWN POINT IN THIS CAUSE?

A17. The same Crown Point economic development and social benefit efforts and experience that created these past achievements will be deployed in the Disputed Area. Crown Point's

provision of wastewater in the Disputed Area will allow economic development of the area 1 that is similar to all of the Crown Point development I have described in my testimony. 2 HOW RESPONSIVE IS CROWN POINT TO THE SEWER INQUIRIES AND 3 SERVICE NEEDS OF ITS RESIDENTS AND BUSINESSES? 4 5 A18. To provide quality reliable sewage service, Crown Point continues to invest in, maintain and upgrade our current utility facilities. We directly address the inquires of each individual 6 7 customer. Our utility customers receive prompt local phone or in-person service from a utility employee. We also work directly with local businesses and developers to reach 8 mutually beneficial economic development results. 9 10 Our engineering witness Mr. Stong will describe how Crown Point has carefully and fully planned for service to existing customers and for customer growth in Crown 11 12 Point and in the Crown Point Expansion Area, including the Disputed Area. HOW IS THE PRESENT AND FUTURE ECONOMIC DEVELOPMENT IN THE 13 Q19. DISPUTED AREA IMPACTED BY CROWN POINT'S PROPOSED SEWER 14 SERVICE TO THE DISPUTED AREA? 15 Approval of Crown Point's request to provide sewer service to the Disputed Area will A19. 16 promote new economic development by application of Crown Point's economic 17 development abilities in the Disputed Area. Crown Point's construction of the large new 18 South East Waste Water treatment Plant ("SE WWTP") will accommodate new 19 development growth and new customers in the Disputed Area for many years. As Mr. 20 Stong testifies, Crown Point's current wastewater treatment plant has the capacity to timely 21 meet initial development needs in the Disputed Area. Then the new South East Waste 22 Water Treatment Plant will support even broader economic development for many 23

1		decades. Crown Point will also promote economic development by providing quality
2		potable water in the Disputed Area where it is currently is not available. Adequate and well
3		operated water and sewer services are both essential requirements for economic
4		development
5	Q20.	WHY SHOULD CROWN POINT BE THE EXCLUSIVE WASTEWATER
6		UTILITY SERVICE PROVIDER IN THE DISPUTED AREA?
7	A20.	For many reason. It would be wasteful to have two different utilities install duplicate lines
8		and other appurtenances to serve the same area. Intervenor LBL Development LLC
9		("LBL") owns or controls the bulk of the Disputed Area. LBL's desire for service from
10		Crown Point is so strong that it donated 44 acres of land to be used as the location of the
11		new SE WWTP. In exchange for the 44-acre land donation from LBL, Crown Point has
12		committed to offer wastewater utility service to LBL's real estate near the 44-acre donated
13		parcel, where Crown Point will build its new wastewater treatment plant.
14		Crown Point's economic development experience and record of success will
15		result in enhanced economic development in the Disputed Area. Crown Point's economic
16		successes and goals of quality jobs and quality of life will best serve the new area. Crown
17		Point has successfully operated its water and sewage utility for many years.
18		
19		Crown Point cannot deploy its full array of economic development resources in the
20		Disputed Area without the assurance that reliable and timely water and sewer service will
21		be available. The only way Crown Point can be certain of the availability and timing of
22		sewer deployment in the Disputed Area is to be the exclusive provider of sewer service.
23		The provision of essential utility services, like water and sewer service, go hand-in-hand

with economic development services. Both services can only be practically provided by a 1 single, exclusive, provider. As I latter detail Crown reached out to all neighboring 2 municipalities to agree to the borders of the Crown Point Expansion Area their municipal 3 borders and reached agreement with 5 out of 6. Only Crown Point can provide both high 4 quality economic development services and water and sewer service to the Disputed Area. 5 As Mr. Stong explains, the Crown Point Expansion Area is part of Crown Point's 6 7 comprehensive planning. The financial, technical and managerial abilities of Crown Point to serve the Crown Point Expansion Area are absolute, as Mr. Guerrettaz and Mr. Stong 8 explain in further detail. 9 As Mr. Guerrettaz testifies, new customers in the Crown Point Expansion Area 10 will allow Crown Point's utility fixed costs to be spread over a larger customer base, 11 12 promoting rate stability. It will also provide revenue needed to support the costs of providing service in the Expansion Area. 13 FROM THE PERSPECTIVE OF ECONOMIC DEVELOPMENT AND QUALITY 14 OF LIFE FOR DISPUTED AREA RESIDENTS AND BUSINESSES, WHO 15 SHOULD PROVIDE SEWER SERVICE TO THAT AREA? 16 Crown Point has proven itself to be a superior provider of economic development through A21. 17 both its ability to attract and retain economic development and its provision of reliable 18 sewer service. 19 20 III. CROWN POINT'S AGREEMENTS TO UTILITY SERVICE BOUNDARY LINES WITH 21 NEIGHBORING MUNICIPALITIES AND UTILITIES 22

- 1 O22. DID CROWN POINT CONTACT ALL OF THE WASTEWATER AND WATER
- 2 UTILITIES OPERATING NEAR ITS REGULATED TERRITORY TO DISCUSS
- 3 IF THERE WERE ANY CONCERNS REGARDING CROWN POINT'S AUGUST
- 4 **8, 2023 REGULATORY ORDINANCE?**
- 5 A22. Yes, it is my understanding that on or about August 28, 2023, Crown Point's attorney sent
- 6 copies of its Regulatory Ordinance to counsel for area water and wastewater utilities,
- 7 including: Winfield, Schererville, St. John, Cedar Lake, Lowell, Merrillville Conservancy
- 8 District and Indiana American Water (collectively, the "Affected Utilities").
- 9 Q23. DID CROWN POINT SUBSEQUENTLY HAVE BOUNDARY DISCUSSIONS
- 10 WITH THE AREA UTILITIES?
- 11 A23. Yes.
- 12 Q24. ARE YOU AWARE OF THE RESULTS OF THE DISCUSSIONS?
- 13 A24. Yes. Crown Point entered into separate agreements with Town Of St. John, Town Of
- Lowell and Merrillville Conservancy District. In the agreements, with St. John and Lowell
- 15 Crown Point agreed to reduce its then-proposed adjacent Crown Point Regulated Territory.
- Each of those two Towns agreed to support final approval of Crown Point's Amended
- 17 Regulated Territory and Crown Point's provision of service therein. Merrillville
- Conservancy District agreed that it has no objections to Crown Point's request for approval
- of its Regulatory Ordnance. Similarly; Crown Point also reduced its requested regulated
- area near Cedar Lake to accommodate Cedar Lake's requested boundary change. A
- 21 subsequent agreement to reduce Crown Point's requested area near Schererville was
- reached with Schererville as described in the prefiled testimony in Schererville's case in
- Cause No. 46126. All those reductions in the Crown Point Expansion Area were reflected

- in the map attached to the Amended Crown Point Ordinance No. 2025-02-08. That change in the Crown Point Expansion Area. No agreement with Winfield was reached.
- 3 Q25. DO YOU BELIEVE THOSE AGREEMENTS ARE REASONABLE?
- 4 A25. Yes. Those service area adjustments are reflected in the map of Crown Point's Amended
- 5 Regulatory Ordinance. Crown Point believes neighboring utilities should, when possible,
- 6 work together to reach agreement on utility service area boundaries. This accommodates
- 7 each other, and promotes good working relationships between neighboring utilities and
- 8 municipalities.
 - Q26. DOES THIS CONCLUDE YOUR DIRECT TESTIMONY?
- 10 A26. Yes, it does at this time. However, Crown Point's First Set of Data Requests to Winfield
- 11 remains unanswered at this time. When received, I may need to provide additional
- testimony.

AMENDED VERIFIED PETITION

The City of Crown Point, Indiana, ("Crown Point" or "City") and its Crown Point City Utilities ("CPU") (collectively "Petitioner"), by counsel, respectfully petitions the Indiana Utility Regulatory Commission ("Commission") for approval of a regulatory ordinance establishing a service territory for Petitioner's municipal water and wastewater systems in accordance with Ind. Code § 8-1.5-6 *et seq.*. In support, Petitioner states as follows:

I.

Commission Jurisdiction

- 1. The City is an Indiana municipality located in Lake County, Indiana, which by and through CPU, owns and operates a municipal water utility and a wastewater (sewer) utility.
- 2. CPU provides water and wastewater utility service to customers in the City's corporate boundaries.
 - 3. The water and wastewater utilities are *municipal utilities* as defined in Ind. Code § 8-1.5-6-1.
- 4. As discussed in Part II below, the Common Council of the City of Crown Point, Indiana, ("Common Council") adopted, and the Mayor of the City approved, a

regulatory ordinance as that term is defined in Ind. Code § 8-1.5-6-3. The regulatory ordinance establishes a water and wastewater *Regulated Territory* as that term is defined in Ind. Code § 8-1-5-6-2 for CPU.

- 5. Petitioner is not filing a *wholesale sewage petition* as that term is defined in Ind. Code § 8-1.5-6-5.
- 6. Because Petitioner requests that the Commission approve the Regulatory Ordinance adopted by the Common Council, the Commission has jurisdiction over the subject matter of this request pursuant to Ind. Code § 8-1.5-6-6 and Ind. Code § 8-1.5-6-9.

II.

Approval of Regulatory Ordinance

- 7. On August 7, 2023, Petitioner's Common Council adopted Ordinance No. 2023-08-19, which was a *regulatory ordinance* (as defined in Ind. Code § 8-1.5-6-3) that established an exclusive service area for CPU's water and wastewater utility services, and regulated the furnishing of water and wastewater sewage services therein. On March 3, 2025, Petitioner's Common Council adopted Ordinance No. 2025-02-08 which amended Ordinance No. 2023-08-19 by revising CPU's exclusive water and sewer service area established by Ordinance No. 2023-08-19. Ordinance No. 2025-02-08 is a *regulatory ordinance* (as defined in Ind. Code § 8-1.5-6-3) establishing an exclusive service area for CPU's water and wastewater utility services, and regulating the furnishing of water and wastewater services therein (the "Regulatory Ordinance"). Petitioner seeks Commission approval of Regulatory Ordinance No. 2025-02-08 and the described water and wastewater service area ("Regulated Territory"). A copy of the Regulatory Ordinance is attached as Exhibit 1.
- 8. The Regulated Territory is defined as those specific areas within four (4) miles outside the City's boundaries, as shown on the map attached to Ordinance No. 2025-02-08. The Regulated Territory excludes any customer(s) that may be connected to another water or wastewater utility, and any area within the exclusive, authorized service area of another sewage

utility, including but limited to, a municipal sewage utility, as of the date Ordinance No. 2023-08-19 was passed, August 7, 2023.

- 9. The boundaries of the water and wastewater Regulated Territory established by the Regulatory Ordinance are outlined on the map attached to Exhibit 1.
- 10. The enforceability of the Regulatory Ordinance is subject to the approval of the Commission pursuant to Ind. Code §§ 8-1.5-6-6 and 8-1.5-6-9.
- 11. The rates and charges for water and sewer service for all customers located in the Regulated Territory will be the same rates and charges that CPU charges to its customers. Ordinance No. 2025-01-03 and Ordinance No. 2025-01-02 enacted on March 3, 2025, respectively, establish the current rates and charges for CPU's water and sewer utility service and are attached hereto as Exhibit 2 and Exhibit 3. Ordinance No. 2024-02-07 is for seasonal sewer rates. Ordinance No. 2020-11-21 and Ordinance No. 2020-11-20 are for water and sewer system development charges. Those Ordinances are attached hereto as Exhibit 4, Exhibit 5 and Exhibit 6, respectively.
- 12. The Regulatory Ordinance is the subject of an administrative proceeding to the extent the Town of Winfield has, in IURC Cause No, 45992, requested approval of a regulatory ordinance that creates a disputed area overlap at the southeast corner of Crown Point's requested Regulated Territory.
- 13. Upon information and belief, the sewer utilities that may be near the Regulated Territory are as follows:
 - a. Merrillville Conservancy District
 - b. Winfield Municipal Sewer Utility;
 - c. Cedar Lake Municipal Sewer Utility;
 - d. St John Municipal Sewer Utility; and
 - e. Schererville Municipal Sewer Utility.

- 14. Upon information and belief, the water utilities that may be near the Regulated Territory are as follows:
 - a. Winfield Municipal Water Utility;
 - b. Cedar Lake Municipal Water Utility;
 - c. St John Municipal Water Utility;
 - d. Schererville; Municipal Water Utility and
 - e. Indiana American Water Co.
- 15. Any customers of record receiving service from the utilities referenced in Paragraph 13 and 14 above as of August 7, 2023 are excluded from the Regulated Territory.
- 16. The Petitioner has in writing made the entities listed in paragraphs 13 and 14 above, or their counsel, aware of this Amended Petition and the Regulatory Ordinance.
- 17. The Petitioner is not aware of any neighboring utility that objects to the requested Regulated Territory at this time, other than as described in Paragraph 12, above.

III.

Conclusion

18. Consistent with Ind. Code § 8-1.5-6 *et seq.*, the Crown Point respectfully requests that the Commission approve Regulatory Ordinance No. 2025-02-08.

CITY OF CROWN POINT ORDINANCE NO. 2025-02-08

AN ORDINANCE AMENDING ORDINANCE 2023-08-19 ESTABLISHING THE CITY OF CROWN POINT WATER AND WASTEWATER SERVICE AREAS AND REGULATING THE FURNISHING OF SERVICES THEREIN

WHEREAS, the City of Crown Point, Indiana (the "City") owns and operates the City of Crown Point Water and Wastewater Utility; and

WHEREAS, Ind. Code§ 36-9-2-16 permits a municipality to regulate the furnishing of the water and wastewater service to the public; and

WHEREAS, Ind. Code § 36-9-2-18 permits a municipality to exercise powers granted by Ind. Code § 36-9-2-16 in areas within four (4) miles outside its corporate boundaries; and

WHEREAS, Ind. Code § 8-1.5-6, et seq, permits the City to adopt a regulatory ordinance creating a "Regulated Territory" which is then submitted to the Indiana Utility Regulatory Commission for review and approval and said regulatory ordinance allows the municipality to regulate the furnishing of water and wastewater utility service in the Regulated Territory within four (4) miles outside the City's corporate boundaries; and

WHEREAS, the City has made a determination as to the establishment of a certain defined exclusive water and wastewater service Regulated Territory for the City within four (4) miles of the City's corporate limits; and

WHEREAS, it is the intent of this Ordinance to amend Ordinance 2023-08-19 and prior Ordinance 2023-05-15, Ordinance 2022-11-21 and Ordinance 2022-11-22 related to the subject matter to more accurately define the water and wastewater service Regulated Territory; and

WHEREAS, the City has planned to accommodate beneficial area growth through capital improvements to, and service from, its Water and Wastewater utilities;

WHEREAS, the City wishes to establish a specific water and wastewater service territory as a Regulated Territory area that is within four (4) miles of its corporation boundaries as permitted by Indiana law.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED BY THE COMMON COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF CROWN POINT, INDIANA, that:

<u>Section 1</u>. That this Ordinance shall not, in any way, prevent the City from: (i) later seeking and obtaining from the nearby municipalities or others the right to provide water and or wastewater service in any area; (ii) retaining any and all rights to acquire any or all of other's assets used in providing water or wastewater services in any service area; or (iii) exercising any power it has under Indiana law including Indiana Code§§ 8-1.5-1 et. seq. or 36-9-23 et seq.



- <u>Section 2.</u> The City of Crown Point Water and Wastewater Service Areas are hereby defined and established as those areas within the corporate boundaries of the City, as well as certain "Regulated Territory" within four (4) miles outside the City's boundaries as shown on the attached map marked as Exhibit "A".
- <u>Section 3.</u> Upon adoption of this Ordinance and its approval by the Indiana Utility Regulatory Commission, the City shall hold an exclusive license to furnish water and wastewater service to and shall be the exclusive provider of water and wastewater service to the public within the Regulated Territory.
- <u>Section 4.</u> As a matter of law the City is and shall remain the exclusive provider of water and wastewater service within its corporate boundaries.
- Section-5. Upon adoption of this Ordinance and its approval by the Indiana Utility Regulatory Commission, no other utilities are permitted to provide water and wastewater service within the Regulated Territory, except for those customers located in Regulated Territory that are connected to another water or wastewater service provider on the date this Ordinance is approved by the City. This Ordinance does not mandate the City to extend service to areas where technically or financially not feasible, rather, this Ordinance expressly prohibits other utilities from furnishing water or wastewater service to customers within the City or within the City of Crown Point Water and Wastewater Regulated Territory. Nothing in this Ordinance shall be construed to prohibit the City from authorizing other water and/or wastewater service providers to assist the City in providing service in the City of Crown Point Regulated Territory.
- Section 6. No end service user shall permit a connection to water or wastewater service within the City of Crown Point Water or Wastewater Regulated Territory by any other water or wastewater service provider without the consent of the City.
- Section 7. This Ordinance shall not be construed to prohibit an individual property owner in the City of Crown Point Regulated Territory from providing his or her own private water service and/or septic service to such property owner's lot through the installation of lawfully approved facilities on such property so long as such private wells and/or private septic facilities are permissible under all applicable laws, rules, orders and regulations.
- Section 8, Any person, firm or corporation who violates this Ordinance may be subject to a civil action and any penalty fines imposed under the City's Municipal Code or other applicable law.
- <u>Section 2.</u> The City's existing rules and regulations, and rates and charges for water and wastewater service as amended from time to time shall apply to and within the City of Crown Point Water and Wastewater Regulated Territory.

Section 10. If any one or more of the terms, provisions, or sentences of this Ordinance, or portions of this Ordinance, shall be deemed by a court or a tribunal of competent jurisdiction to be contrary to law, then such term or provision shall be deemed severable from the remaining terms and shall in no way affect the validity of the other provisions of this Ordinance



WHEREAS, Financial Solutions Group, Inc. was retained to review and recommend changes in the Crown Point Water Utility's ("Utility") rates and charges necessary to fund the proposed construction of additions and improvements to its waterworks system; and

WHEREAS, Financial Solutions Group, Inc. has delivered to the City the Rate Consultant's Report dated September 26, 2024 ("Rate Study"); and

WHEREAS, the Rate Study recommends an increase in the water rates and charges with such increase to be implemented in three phases; and

WHEREAS, based upon the Rate Study, the Common Council has determined that it is in the best interests of the Utility and necessary to amend Ordinance 1845, Ordinance 2003-07-19, Ordinance 2018-07-20, Ordinance 2010-07-09, Ordinance 2012-09-24 and Ordinance 2022-06-08 as found in Municipal Code §50.02 (A), (B), (D) and (E).

NOW, THEREFORE, IT IS ORDAINED BY THE CROWN POINT COMMON COUNCIL, THAT:

Section 1. Ordinance 1845, Ordinance 2003-07-19, Ordinance 2008-07-20, Ordinance 2010-07-09, Ordinance 2012-09-24 and Ordinance 2022-06-08, as amended and adopted to date and as found in Crown Point Municipal Code §50.02 (A), (B), (D), & (E), are hereby amended to reflect the rates recommended in the Rate Study as follows:

ORDINANCE NO. 2025-01-02

AN ORDINANCE AMENDING MONTHLY RATES AND CHARGES FOR THE USE OF AND SERVICES RENDERED BY THE SEWAGE WORKS OF THE CITY OF CROWN POINT, INDIANA

WHEREAS, the Common Council of the City of Crown Point, Indiana ("City") has previously established its sewer rates and charges pursuant to ordinance which sewer rates and charges are promulgated in the City's Municipal Code ("Code"), for the use and services rendered by the sewage works system of the City; and

WHEREAS, the City has caused a financial study of the City's municipal sewage works ("Rate Study") to be made by Financial Solutions Group, Inc. in connection with a proposed project for the construction of additions and improvements to the sewage works to be financed by the issuance of sewage works revenue bonds; and

WHEREAS, based upon such Rate Study, the Common Council of the City finds that the existing sewer rates and charges established by the Code are insufficient to enable the City to properly operate its sewage works plant, service its bonds and finance additions and improvements to its sewage works system and should be increased;

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED BY THE COMMON COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF CROWN POINT, INDIANA, AS FOLLOWS:

Section 1. Section 51.27 (B) (1), (2) and-(3) of the Code, as previously set forth in Ordinance 2022-12-29, is hereby amended and restated as follows:

ORDINANCE NO. 2024-02-07

AN ORDINANCE AMENDING THE SEWER RATE ORDINANCE TO REDUCE AND CLARIFY SEASONAL RATE REDUCTION

WHEREAS, a part of Ordinance 2009-03-11, codified in the Code of Ordinances of Crown Point in Title V, Chapter 51, Sections 51.27(G) and (H), addresses seasonal and extraordinary sewer rates, commonly referred to as a "summer sewer credit"; and

WHEREAS, a clearer understanding of Code Sections 51.27(G) and (H) would be achieved by amendment of those sections to clarify the intentions of the City of Crown Point;

NOW THEREFORE BE IT ORDAINED by the Common Council of the City of Crown Point, Indiana that Crown Point Municipal Code Section 51.27(H) is DELETED in its entirety, and Section 51.27(G) is amended in its entirety to read as follows:

- (G) <u>Seasonal Sewer Rates</u>. A reduced seasonal usage rate is hereby established for single-family residential dwelling users for water used during the months of June through September, inclusive, (as billed in August through November), which are months in which it has been established that much of the water used does not pass through the sanitary sewage system of the user, and shall be applied as follows:
- (1) If the monthly water consumption by a single-family residential dwelling user during any of the months of June through September, inclusive, is greater than the average monthly water consumption for the preceding three months of January, February and March for water used on the property or premises subject to all other rates and charges; then the billing for that month shall be based upon the average metered water usage for the months of January, February and March; and the water consumption subject to such rates and charges so determined shall constitute the basis for monthly sewage service charges for water used during the months of June through September, inclusive.
- (2) If the monthly water consumption by a single-family residential dwelling user during any of the months of June through September, inclusive, is less than or equal to the user's average monthly water consumption for the preceding three months of January, February and March, then the seasonal sewer reduction shall not apply.
- (3) In the event that no sewage service bill was rendered for a property during all or a portion of the months of January, February and March, the city shall use a calculation of 4800 gallons of metered water entering the sewage system per month for each of those 3 months in which no sewage service bill was rendered for the entire month, as a basis for the monthly sewage service charges during the months of June through September, inclusive.

The foregoing Ordinance shall be in full force and effect upon its passage and adoption.

ORDINANCE NO.2020-11-21 AN ORDINANCE AMENDING ORDINANCE NO. 2020-09-16, CLARIFYING THE UTILITY SYSTEM DEVELOPMENT CHARGE COLLECTION FEE IN SECTION (D).

Ordinance No. 2020-09-16 An Ordinance Amending Ord. Nos. 722 and 1748-4 and 1871-A CONCERNING SEWER CONNECTION CHARGES and a SYSTEM DEVELOPMENT CHARGE

WHEREAS, the Board of Public Works and Safety retained Municipal Consultants of Indianapolis, Indiana to perform a study of the existing sewer connection charges as required by Ordinance 1734; and

WHEREAS, FSG Inc. the City's consultants completed a study entitled "CROWN POINT MUNICIPAL WASTEWATER UTILITY, System Development Charge" (hereinafter The Study") on September 2, 2020 which is attached hereto and is approved, adopted, and incorporated herein by reference.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED by the Common Council of the City of Crown Point, Lake County, Indiana:

Section 1. The Common Council now finds that it is in the best interests of the City of Crown Point to amend Ordinances 772 and 1748-A, as found in §51.13 of the Crown Point Municipal Code, are hereby amended to read as follows:

A) Definitions:

<u>Base Unit</u>: shall be equal to or mean each single family house and each individual apartment, condominium or other single family living unit in any multiunit building, structure or complex, or any other facility, that supplies not in excess of 300 gallons per day to the sanitary sewer system, in accordance with 327 I.A.C. Article 3 Construction Permit Sanitary Sewer Designed Summary Form, as amended from time to time, which is incorporated herein by reference.

B) A charge is hereby established in the amount of \$3590.00 per Base Unit for each permit issued pursuant to this ordinance. For any commercial, governmental, industrial, institutional or other facility applying for a permit the total charge under this ordinance shall be equal to the number of Base Units, plus the fractions thereof as determined by the City Engineering Department, times the charge per Base Unit as established in this ordinance.



- C) A permit shall not be validly issued until the \$3,590.00 connection fee per Base Unit, and fractions thereof if applicable, plus any applicable surcharges or other been each paid in full. Said charge, plus any surcharges as hereinafter or otherwise provided, shall be paid to the Clerk-Treasurer by the person securing the permit at the time of the issuance of the permit. Said connection fee shall be reviewed on a biannual basis after its initial enactment and implementation to ensure that said connection fee is cost-based, fair and equitable to all users.
- D) The study by FSG, Inc. dated September 2, 2020, and entitled CROWN POINT MUNICIPAL WASTEWATER UTILITY "UTILITY SYSTEM DEVELOPMENT CHARGE" attached hereto as Exhibit "A", the fee schedule listed below, and referenced in ORDINANCE 2020-11-20 are hereby incorporated by reference as part of this ordinance:

AN ORDINANCE AMENDING ORDINANCE NO. 2020-09-14, CLARIFYING THE UTILITY SYSTEM CHARGE COLLECTION FEE IN SECTION 1.

ORDINANCE NUMBER 2020-09-14

AN ORDINANCE AMENDING ORDINANCE 2007-03-10 AND COMBINING/REPLACING PORTIONS OF SAID ORDINANCE WITH PORTIONS OF ORDINANCE NO. 16-09-24

WHEREAS, The Common Council has from time to time passed Ordinances regarding the establishment of new fee structures such as in Ordinance 2007-03-10 and the following Ordinance whose title has been quoted in the formulation of Ordinance 2007-03-10, as amended, and the Ordinance listed below;

AN ORDINANCE AMENDING THE CITY OF CROWN POINT CODE OF ORDINANCES §50.02(F), §50.02(1), AND §50.14 REGARDING CERTAIN WATER METER CONNECTION AND INSPECTION FEES

WHEREAS The Common council is aware of the growth of the City and the City's need to provide adequate infrastructure for the new residents purchasing and building within the City, and

WHEREAS, The City Council also realizes that the need for new infrastructure to service new residents is a financial burden that should not fall upon existing residents who have by and through the payment of property taxes paid for the existing infrastructure, primarily Water, Sewer and Stormwater, and

WHEREAS, The City's Financial Advisor, FSG, has been directed to evaluate the existing fee payment rate structure and also determine the anticipated growth under current economic conditions to determine a fair and equitable manner in which to insure the City's continued ability to serve both its existing customer base and it's anticipated new customers, and

WHEREAS, certain fees for the installation and providing of water meters throughout the City need to be revised periodically to reflect increased costs and the actual costs of the service; and

WHEREAS, certain inspection fees for the installation of water service throughout the City need to be revised periodically to reflect increased costs and the actual costs of the service; and

WHEREAS, the continued growth call for the establishment of a new Connection Fee, Meter Fee, and new Utility System Development Charge to be assessed as of the date of the passage and adoption of this said Ordinance, and

WHEREAS, within all systems, existing or newly established, certain inspections need to be performed and enforced for the continued safety and function of the City water system;



NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED by the Common Council of the City of Crown Point that:

Section 1. The City of Crown Point Code of Ordinances §50.02(F) shall be amended to read as follows:

(F) Customers shall be charged a fee prior to connection to the water system which shall include the cost of a suitable water meter along with a Connection Fee and a System Development Charge; all as listed below. For any meter larger than 1", the customer shall be charged the actual cost of the meter, plus 10% for shipping and handling, plus tax each time such a meter is installed. For any meter larger than 1", the installation and maintenance of such meter shall be performed by a licensed plumber at the customer's expense.

- Section 2. The City of Crown Point Code of Ordinances §50.02(1)(1),(2),(5), (6), and (7) shall be amended to read as follows:
 - (I)(1) A fee of \$75 is established for each water service shut-off, disconnection, or re connection due to nonpayment.
 - (2) A fee of \$75 is established for each water tap or service line inspection and final inspection performed by the City of Crown Point. There will be a \$75 charge for each re-inspection.
 - (5) A fee of \$75 is established for each time a water meter is removed from service at the request of the customer to terminate water service; and a fee of \$75 is established for each time a meter is installed or reinstalled at the request of a customer to start water service.
 - (6) A fee of \$75 is established for each customer who requests three (3) consecutive service calls for suspected water leaks within any 12-month period where the Water Department finds no evidence of a water leak on three (3) consecutive service calls.
 - (7) A fee of \$75 is established for every customer who schedules a service call time and date with the Water Department and the customer, or their agent, fails to be present on the scheduled time and date to allow the Water Department employees to enter upon the customer's premises to perform the scheduled service call.
- Section 3. The City of Crown Point Code of Ordinances §50.14 shall be amended to read as follows:

§50.14 Inspection.

The customer's water system shall be open for inspection at all reasonable times to authorized representatives of the Water Department. These inspections may include, but are not limited to, inspections for cross-connections, structural or sanitary hazards, violations of this sub-chapter or regulations which are adopted through this sub-chapter, or meter function. In the event that access to the customer's premises for the purpose of any such inspection is not granted within five (5) business days of a request by the Water Department, water service shall be shut off until such time as the inspection is completed and any necessary repairs are completed.

Section 4. This Ordinance shall be in full force and effect upon the date of its passage and adoption and all other ordinances or resolutions in conflict therewith are hereby amended by reference
