## **Operation Resolve to Read Mission Levels:**

- Level 1- Get your Advocacy Chairperson to present this to your Executive Board. Create a program/plan to keep the momentum going thru to the end of the year
  - Create a plan to rollout to parents and students using World Read Aloud Day (February 5<sup>th</sup>) as a "kick-off" day and moving toward Read Across America Day (March 2<sup>nd</sup>) as a celebration day
  - Engage your administration and teachers and build on your plan encouraging parents and students to include READING AND READING ALOUD in their daily, weekly, and monthly family schedules
  - How can your plan support and supplement what your school already has planned?
  - Post to your FB page
- Level 2- Create a "Reader's Oath" or "Reading Pledge" and get that out to your parents and students AND get them back
  - Create a display of the signed pledges
  - Post to your FB page
  - Could you offer a Scholastic dollars to teachers who get the pledges back from their parents/teachers?
  - Could you offer a Scholastic family night basket to give away in an opportunity drawing for pledges returned?
- Level 2-(second options) Create a "Where do you read" program/contest
  - Families can take pictures of where they read and get caught reading!
  - Can they post to your FB page?
- Level 3-Plan and host a "reading event"
  - Plan and host a family engagement event that focuses on reading, literacy, and books
  - Engage your students, parents, teachers, and admin team to promote the event and ensure its success.

## **RAISING A READER**

Everyday activities are a perfect setting for children to develop language skills and become lifelong readers.

When you make reading and writing a natural part of your day as a family, students acquire strong literacy skills and a bigger vocabulary to help them achieve academically. To build these skill sets at home:

**Encourage Literacy** – Encourage your child to help make shopping lists, draw and write thank-you notes, write grocery lists and create menus for meals.

Tap Into Your Community - Check out materials such as toys, CDs and books from libraries. Participate in activities held by libraries and bookstores, such as story time, writing contests and summer reading programs.

Make It Easy – Keep reading and writing materials such as books, magazines, newspapers, paper, markers, crayons, scissors, glue and stickers accessible at home.

Read Together – Read books and rhymes and play language games such as tongue twisters and puzzles with your child. Point out the letter-sound relationships your child is learning on labels, boxes, magazines and signs.

Share Stories – Keep a notebook and write down stories your child tells you so that the child may see the connection between oral language and text.

Be a Reader – Children observe and learn from people around them. Let your child know you are proud of his or her reading.

When reading and writing are part of your family routine, your child will enhance the skills needed to better prepare him or her to do well in school.

#### **Boost Literacy Skills:**

Student success in school depends heavily on an ability to read and write at grade level from pre-school to high school.

Yet the starting line for many children is different, depending on their ZIP code. By age 3, there is a 30-million "word gap" between children from well-off and lowincome families.

As studies show, this "word gap" can lead to disparities not just in vocabulary size, but also in school readiness. It can even affect long-term educational and health outcomes, earnings and family stability decades later.

By talking, reading and singing more to children, the "word gap" is reduced and their chances for later success in school and beyond improved.

You can give your child a strong start to build pre-literacy skills for school readiness. Whether at home, on a walk or doing errands, help him or her from an early age to become a successful reader by:

Playing simple name games by asking "what is this?"

Labeling things at home such as a door or a cup and reading the labels together Showing the ingredients as you cook and naming them together Reading aloud the words on signs and in stores.



### **Did you know** PTA resolutions act as touchstones for our advocacy. Resolution on Homework: Quality Over Quantity

**Whereas**, When appropriately utilized, homework has the potential to be a valuable aid to help students maximize their learning experience; and

Whereas, Homework assignments vary in quality and purpose; evidence-based research has identified that quality homework assignments state clear objectives, are relevant to students, and are grade and age appropriate in terms of ability and time required; and Whereas, Homework has the potential to negatively impact family and child interactions, and high quantities of homework not only add to stress, but do not necessarily lead to higher achievement outcomes; additionally research has proven that students who spend more than the recommended grade appropriate time on homework can experience no increase or a decrease in academic achievement; and Whereas, Homework that relies heavily on parental input and supervision has the potential to further increase the achievement gap in our schools and create inequity when it fails to take into account the diversity of parents' or caregivers' academic ability, time availability, and resources to adequately support learning at home; now therefore be it

**Resolved**, That National PTA and its constituent associations support teachers, schools, and districts in promoting the design of meaningful homework that will advance a spirit of learning with a focus on quality assignments to motivate students based on grade and ability; and be it further

**Resolved**, That National PTA and its constituent associations advocate that teachers, schools, and districts follow evidence-based guidelines regarding the use of homework assignments and its impact on children's lives and family interactions; and be it further **Resolved**, That National PTA encourages its constituent associations to advocate for school districts, boards and administrators to review and/or implement homework policies and appropriate resources to address quality, quantity and equity concerns reflective of their local community; and be it further

**Resolved**, That National PTA collaborates with appropriate national organizations to create or revise model homework policies that take into account all facets and considerations that impact children's successful completion of homework in every local community.


