JAR INGREDIENTS

Bring 3 cups of water plus jar contents to a simmer over low heat, uncovered, in a small pot. Check the water periodically and add more if it starts to get low.

November 2023 Meeting Highlights

__Guest speaker Lacie Weaver, HRSD Communications, spoke about the SWIFT program (Sustainable Water Initiative For Tomorrow). HRSD handles water demand and treatment for 20 cities in southeastern Virginia and the Eastern Shore, operating eight large and six small plants to handle a daily average of 125 million gallons of waste water daily. The system has a daily capacity of 225 million gallons. Weaver noted HRSD uses an eight step cleaning process, and reminded those present to only flush the "three P's" (pee, poop and paper). She said medications and many other items should NOT be disposed of in the sewer system. Weaver also noted that they daily pump a million gallons of purified water back into the Potomac Aguifer, which is our fresh water ground source. She noted prior to 1940, sewage was discharged directly into the Chesapeake Bay.

__Erica Cooper, Windsor Woods Library Manager, said Giving Tuesday is Nov. 28. She asked that those who participate consider a \$25 donation which would add four books to the library's Summer Reading Challenge inventory.

__Public Work Engineer Michael Mundy provided stormwater project updates and tidal runs. He noted the crane at Mt. Trashmore is being used to place 110' piles that will support the tidal gate and numerous walls/sheets being driven into th ground. He reminded everyone that we have an extremely high tide once a month (+1.8') and a "King" tide (+2.8 to 3.2') once a year, but tides have been running an average of 1' higher in the last 40 to 50 years. We can expect a 3' projected rise of tidal height over the next 80 years. Water ways with League boundaries drain both west and east with Rosemont Road being the figurative dividing line.

Presidental Boulevard will remain blocked for the next six months although Silina Drive is now open. Estimated project completion dates are as follows: tidal gates - March 2025, S. Plaza/Presidential May 2025, Old Forge/Red Lion – March 2024. Public Works keeps VB Fired Dept. Station 16 and the Plaza Volunteer Rescue Squad up to date on the status of projects to ensure public safety is maintained. Mundy noted interim trails are currently open at the stormwater park with the entrance near the playground on the NW side of the rec center. During the Q&A session, Mundy advised the project contractor has it's own street sweeper for debris, but one resident noted there are still a lot of large granite rocks along Rosemont and Old Forge Roads. __Flood Committee Chair Bob Jennings said a recent U.S. Supreme Court ruling requires the EPA to remove federal protection for a majority of the country's wetlands. A final rule amended the definition of protected "waters of the United State, or WOTUS, narrowed the scopy of the Clean Water Act and the agency's power to regulate waterways and wetlands. The SCOTUS decision now says the law includes only streams, oceans, rivers and lakes, and wetlands with a continuous surface connection to those bodies. Jennings says this means communities, especially those below the green line, will now be vulnerable to pollution and flooding as these areas are buffers against extreme storms and floodwaters as there will be no more review process by the Planning Commission or City Council. There has already been a push by developers to

rezone and develop without oversight. It should be noted water flows in many ways: above ground, below ground, and through cleansing filters of reeds, soils and grasses that make up a wetland.

Fight Freezing Pipes in the Winter



Winter weather is upon us! Some prognosticators say it will be a colder – and likely snowy – the next few months.

Take steps now to avoid burst pipes with a few simple steps.

- -Disconnect garden hoses and drain outdoor pipes. Cover exposed pipes and faucets with insulation.
- -Seal leaks near exposed pipes that allow cold air inside your house.
- -Insulate exposed pipes in your home's crawl spaces, attics and outside walls.
- -Moving water generally will not freeze, so allow a steady drip of cold water to flow from the highest or furthest faucet in your house. Open cabinet doors to allow heat to reach exposed pipes under sinks. Moving water can freeze when there's extreme cold, such as 20 degree temps.
- -Keep your thermostat the same temperature both day and night so pipes stay warm as outside temps dip overnight.

 -If your pipes freeze, turn off the private water shut-off valve in the house. Valve locations could be on the wall in the garage, near your water heater, or close to an outside hose bib where the water supply enters the house. Know where the valve is *before* you have a problem.
- -Don't thaw frozen pipes with an open flame or electrical appliance, it's dangerous and could damage the pipes.
- -Be prepared for possible leaks as the pipes thaw.
