This being the first Regular Meeting for the ensuing
Year. The Council proceeded to organize, by electing
T. F. Mangan Temporary President, and W. J. Oldfield
Temporary Secretary. President Mangan announced
that the first Business in order would be the presentation
of the Certificates of Election, and Oath of Office of
the two Councilmen Elect. Henry Raspler, presented
Certificate of Election, and Oath of Office, and on
Motion the same were received, and ordered filed.
A. E. O'Connor, not having his Certificate of Election,
with him, was instructed to present the same at to
the Secretary, and not having taken the Oath of
Office, Burgess J. H. Thompson, administered the same.
President Mangan, asked the Secretary to call the

Question of Salary came up, there was quite a
little discussion, J. J. Oldfield was opposed to
paying \$10000 Salary. Unless, the High Constable
agreed to perform his Duties, as the Laws of the
State, and Ordinances of the Borough of Cawley
shall direct. On Motion, Res. Quinon, Seconded by
Henry Rafter, that if the High Constable
perform his duties as such, also, the duties of
Health Officer to the Board of Health, he
shall receive the sum of \$100.00 for the
ensuing year. Carried.

On Motion, Treasurer, William Schardt,
receive the same compensation, as last year
\$5000. Carried. Joseph W. Bear, presented
Certificate of Election, And Oath of Office,
Auditor Elect. And on Motion, the same were
accepted, and ordered filed. Auditor Elect
John Curran, did not present Certificate of
Election, or Oath of Office. President instructed
Secretary, to notify Mr Curran to present

Dear Sir:

I am in receipt of your
Communication propounding to me the following
Questions:-

First, Have the Overseers of the borough of
Hawley, and Council of said borough
any joint duty in fixing taxes? Second.
Can the Overseers buy land with tax
fund for the use of paupers of Borough? Third,
What is salary of Overseers and
their duties?

To the first question I answer that the
Overseers of a Borough incorporated under
the general borough act of Assembly of 1851
as Hawley, are subject to the same
provisions of law as township Overseers.
They are an independent body. Can lay
a tax of nine mills or less, after first getting

(will come in their hand) They also are required to enter their levy in book for that purpose and file the same with Secretary of Council, who in a borough, acts as Town Clerk, or, rather does a like service for the Borough. The Overseers of a Borough have no power to buy land for the use of paupers of the borough, nor for any use whatever. Overseers, like Supervisors, have a right to charge for the time necessarily spent in the faithful discharge of their duties. This is subject to examination and approval of the Auditors, and the daily pay is One Dollar.

Stone, Presented their Levy, (9) Mills on the Dollar, for Poor purposes. With the approval of two Justices, Council took no action on same. High Constable Charles Kelly was present. He stated to Council, he could not fill the duties of Health Officer, including extra Constable duty, for the amount of salary, \$100.00 for the year, and therefore tendered his resignation, as Health Officer.
