Neighborhood Watch

Reports from our weekly volunteers indicate that things have been quiet in the Mount Vernon Neighborhood. As the weather warms up, and to judge from two recent police warnings from the district station, this is not likely to continue. There has been a rise in daytime and noctural burglaries in the wider area in the past month.

Thus, as few reminders are in order.

Vehicles

The police report a surge in area thefts particularly from vehicles of car stereos, GPS units, and other easily portable valuables left in open sight.

- Always lock unoccupied cars, even for a few minutes.
- Park cars in well-lighted spots.
- Do not put valuables in glove compartment or under the seats: lock them in the trunk or take them indoors.
- When removing your GPS unit, wipe windscreen with a moist towelette to erase the mark of the suction cup.
- Write down the serial numbers of all valuable items to help in identification: many of these items show up in pawnshops or in the course of police searches.

Homes

- Inform neighbors if away from your home for even a few days.
- Do not allow newspapers or mail to accumulate.
- Trim trees or shrubs that might obscure front or read doors.
- Maintain outside lights or motionsensor lights.
- Check out any unfamiliar noises or unfamiliar vehicles.

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Education

Do You Have a Student Entering Sixth Grade Next Year?

If yes, he or she may need a booster dose of Tdap (tetanus, diphtheria, acellular pertussis). Sixth grade students cannot begin school in the fall without documentation of having had either the Tdap booster OR documentation of having had a tetanus containing vaccine within the past five years. If your child is still 10 years old, he or she may receive the Tdap vaccine, Boostrix, which is approved for 10vear-olds, or you may wait until the 11th birthday to receive the vaccine approved for 11-yearolds. Documentation that your student has received this immunization should be brought to the school registrar. Fairfax County Public Schools tracks compliance for this state requirement, and students who do not meet the requirement by the first day of school will be excluded from school. Students can receive immunizations required for school at no charge at any Fairfax County Health Department walk-in immunization clinic.

Public Safety

Drivers and other road users are advised that large tour buses often make U-turns (sometimes two or more buses in a row) at the corner of Cherry Tree Drive and Route 235 after they have discharged their passengers at Mount Vernon.

County budget cuts will include reductions in certain Public Safety services and programs. Fire Department Heavy Rescue, EMS/Ambulance and Police Services, and police helicopter patrol flight hours will probably be reduced. The highly trained and internationally acclaimed FC Fire Department Heavy Rescue units (building and bridge collapses, serious fires and severe auto accidents, elevator accidents, workplace accidents, overturned trucks, railroad accidents, etc.) that remain in service will have to cover larger areas with the potential for longer response times. The MVCCA Public Safety Committee under Dallas Shawkey's leadership is monitoring all of these developments.

Planning and Zoning

The Planning and Zoning Committee met on April 6, 2009. County officials updated the committee on the progress of the county's attempt to better control the height of houses in infill neighborhoods. The county refers to the issue as one of maintaining neighborhood compatibility. It is currently looking at two methods, a bulk of plane method and a set back ratio. The set back ratio method is currently being examined as a less complicated and less expensive method. At the risk of oversimplifying, the setback ratio would basically mean the higher a house is the further it will be required from the property line. The county is studying both methods but it does not look like a decision is near.

Currently, a maximum of 35 feet is permitted for all houses built in Fairfax County. A house is measured from the pregrade or postgrade level of ground, whichever is lower up to the "mean" of the roof. It is not measured from the ground up to the top of the house. One fact that should be noted is that the county does not send anyone out to measure new houses. The builder or architect certifies on the plans the house is not over 35 feet. No county inspection is done on this measurement. County inspections are done only to check safety features such as wiring, foundation footings, etc. County officials have become more vigilant about house heights since it was discovered in 2006 that hundreds of homes were over the limit because builders were measuring using various methods and were building houses on higher post grade fill dirt.

Another big issue at last month's meeting was the proposed installation of a AT&T / Cingular cell tower or "monopole" at the Masonic lodge on Fort Hunt Road. As many of you know, the lodge is a very old building and is in a neighborhood. Several neighbors came to the meeting and were concerned about aesthetics and the potential dangers of a cell tower near their house. Cingular has been proposed to place the tower on the property as a flagpole with an American flag. However, the proper care and lighting of the American flag was discussed and the neighbors seemed to prefer a simple brown or green colored pole. The bigger concern of neighbors was whether or not such cell towers have been proven safe. We were told by the Cingular representative they are safe and that the courts have


