

#### **Neighborhood Watch**

With the approach of warm weather and school vacations, we will need increased alertness to keep our neighborhood safe and quiet.

During the recent heavy snows, we have not been able to get patrols out. Coincidentally or not, there was a serious break-in at the Mount Vernon Yacht Club. Several boats were broken into and valuable navigational and electronic equipment stolen. The perpetrators evidently gained access with a vehicle through the automatic gate which had been left open to accommodate the snow ploughs. The Yacht Club—Jack O'Malley is the Security Officer—is taking new measures to protect the area.

It is in everyone's interest to keep our neighborhood, park, club, school and church property safe. The best insurance we all have is what's known in the business as "eyes and ears": alertness to what's passing up and down our streets. Neighborhood Watch does occasionally come upon something suspicious. It reminds us to remain alert and report any violations of decorum or the law: speeding cars, persistently barking dogs, strange vehicles, late-night or early-morning

noise, unlicensed vendors, after-hours loiterers in parks, lots, or clubs.

It is not our business to intervene or interrogate anyone, but to note the license plate, the time and place of the offense, and call the police. Officer Clift tells us that the main complaint he has at the Mount Vernon station is the silence of his phone. We are not doing enough calling when we see something suspicious. A pro-active neighborhood is a safe one.


With our fifty volunteers, we are moving to a new scheduling arrangement. The entire Mount Vernon Civic Association area includes 800 households in the ten neighborhoods between Mount Vernon Highway and the river. To patrol the entire area takes 60 to 90 minutes. If this area were divided into northern and southern halves, each patrol would require much less investment of time. Volunteers would find themselves more engaged—being called upon approximately every 5 rather than 10 months.

Neighborhood Watch volunteers who are members of the MVYC will be assigned the southern half of

the neighborhood because they will have access keys to the Club's property. It would be helpful to have more volunteers who are Yacht Club members to help keep it safe.

#### The Life You Save May Be Your Own

With apologies to Flannery Connor, please make note of the fact that the life you save may be your own. And while in the words of T.S. Eliot April is the cruelest month, February and March are in general not very favorably disposed to wild animals or drivers. Wildlife in general and deer in particular are out on the town, so keep a weather eye out for four-footed hazards and a careful eye on your speedometer, allowing for adequate reaction time and braking distance. Also look out for hazardous windfall on our roadways as the March winds do their part to bring down the shattered remains of Old Man Winter's recent achievements.

While on the topic of automotive safety, please also keep an eye out for pedestrians. Now that the glaciers have largely receded, bikers, joggers, and jaywalkers can be expected to pop up at unexpected times and places. And since we're on the topic of jaywalkers, ever wonder what a couple of extra dollars can get you these days? For a reported \$235,000, you can have a South-County-style experiment: the shiny new overhead signs warning of random pedestrians that recently popped up on a nearby stretch of Route 1 which is considered a pilot project for more of the same in other parts of Fairfax, my fellow lab rats. No matter what you think of the concept and execution (our local Gazette has reported that documentation on the successful usage of overhead pedestrian warning signs with continuously flashing beacons at unmarked crossings is lacking), please be aware of your surroundings, and keep a sharp eye out for pedestrians. FYI, \$38 million will buy a new research library, to appear some time in the near future in the forest across from the Mount Vernon Estate with traffic patterns and impact to be determined.

I observed that the manner in which local and state government dealt with the aftermath of the recent storms was, at best, inadequate. If your street was not plowed or you also witnessed plowing and spreading sand and salt on roads that were already cleared, please send me an e-mail. plagued by potholes, ruts, or valleys (some snowplow operators that made the rounds after February 15 being seemingly obsessed with obliterating asphalt), call the Virginia Department of Transportation's (VDOT) Northern Virginia District Office at 703-383 -8368, TTY 711, to request maintenance.

Yes, it's a stretch in terms of a literary reference, but the movie was after all based on Heart of Darkness. Anyway, be aware of the fact that one of the key transportation projects impacting our immediate area is the impending widening of Route 1. The esteemed Fairfax County Board of Supervisors approved several million dollars for the design of an expanded section of L'Autoroute de Richmonde. While it's highly unlikely that we'll be on the receiving end of Autobahn-quality road, much less any reductions in visual blight, what awaits us are six gleaming lanes of asphalt, a median, and turnaround lanes for a two mile section of Route 1 beginning at Route 235 south to the Fairfax County Parkway. The point of all this is to address the surge in traffic associated with increased staffing and new patients at Fort Belvoir. Two miles. Wow! Does anyone remember a story about a little Dutch boy, his finger, and a leaky dike? You should know that our delegate in Richmond continues to advocate for revitalization and spurring [of] economic growth in our corridor. So take a look at his website and give him some feedback. I expect our elected officials to take note of our opinions, whether they are pro or con.

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#### **Environment and Recreation**

#### Join the 7th Annual MVCA Spring Clean-up

We are planning to hold our annual neighborhood clean-up on Saturday, May 8 from 9AM to noon. This is an opportunity for residents to clean up trash along our streets and help beautify our community. Please volunteer to join your friends and neighbors and members of Washington Mill Cub Scout Troop 1503. We will meet at 9AM at the Mansion House parking lot. There will be free supplies of hats, safety vests, garbage bags and gloves. We will also provide water and cookies. #### **Invasive Species**

Many have noted with concern the proliferation of invasive vines/plants along the bike trail and in Ft. Hunt Park. These are slowly destroying our tree canopy. Now is your chance to do something about it! The National Park Service, which has jurisdiction over both the bike trail and the park, has a program to remove invasives from Theodore Roosevelt Island and the Dyke Marsh Wildlife area. Volunteers meet in the parking lot of Roosevelt Island every Thursday and Saturday and work from 10AM-2:30PM. They meet at the Belle Haven picnic area parking lot every Friday to work in the Dyke Marsh Wildlife area from

10AM to 2:30PM. If you are interested in volunteering to work on either of these projects contact Kevin Hull at <a href="MevinHull@nps.gov">KevinHull@nps.gov</a>.

Heretofore, there has been no program to remove invasives from our end of the bike trail. Now the National Park Service will train volunteers to work on their own to remove invasives, including on the southern end of the bike trail and Ft. Hunt Park – our neck of the woods. Volunteers must attend a one-day training program on Saturday, May 15.

Note: without this training, residents are prohibited from removing invasives in the National Park area. The training will likely take place at the National Park Service office at Turkey Run, run most of the day, and also include a field trip. Further details will be provided in April. The Park Service stresses that this training program is not an educational venture. Those who attend must be committed to actually working in the field to remove invasives. #### Planning and Zoning

In response to citizen concern about new houses being built taller and having a "looming" effect in older neighborhoods, a task force was created. The Residential Compatibility Task Force was comprised of citizens as well as builders and members of the planning commission. Numerous county staffers attended meetings as needed to provide their expertise regarding the current regulations and what they do and do not allow. They met for about two years and were not able to reach any definite solutions for how to solve the problem of newer houses "looming" over older, smaller homes.

While the task force considered many approaches for how to achieve compatibility of newer houses with older, existing homes, in the end they decided to try one new rule. In determining how tall a house is, all new houses will be measured from either pre-grade or post-grade dirt level, whichever is higher. The maximum any house can be is a mean of 35 feet from grade. The thoughts behind only going this far with new rules and laws is the complexity of the problem and trying to balance the concern of property rights of all—existing neighbors as well as new property owners who want to build new homes. It was decided to try this approach for a few years and see if it solves the problem.

Since that decision, the P&Z committee chairman has recently drafted compatibility guidelines and presented them to the committee for review. I thought the first draft was a bit overbroad in scope but he is going to present a new draft. I approach any new regulations with caution and will let you know what the proposed new solution is.

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#### **Education**

#### **Budget Update**

The Fairfax County School Board has voted to adopt the Fairfax County Public Schools (FCPS) FY 2011 advertised budget of \$2.3 billion, restoring some programs previously identified for elimination in the proposed budget. Restoration of these programs depends on whether or not FCPS receives adequate funding from the Fairfax County Board of Supervisors and the state.

The good news is the local composite index (LCI) would not be frozen, allowing FCPS to receive additional funding that the index entitles our school system to. The updated LCI calculation amounts to \$61.9 million in funding. However, the combination of Governor Kaine's budget and the house and senate proposed amendments reduce state funding in other ways. Continued monitoring of the budget is needed to determine the actual FCPS' revenue for next year.

#### Support Our Schools Through Fund Raisers

Given the budget cuts this year, it is even more important to our children that we support school fund raising activities. Mount Vernon High School will conduct their annual mulch sale this Spring as well as host several theater events. I also encourage you to support our young athletes who ask for a donation for football, crew, the school band, and such. These events are part of growing up and will create lasting memories for our children.

Washington Mill Elementary School (WMES) participates year round in the Box Tops 4 School program. Box Tops can be found on a variety of home products such as cereal



boxes, Kleenex boxes, packaged cake mixes, etc. Box Tops are worth 10 cents each and add up surprisingly fast.

In addition to the Box Tops 4 School program, WMES is collecting and recycling printer ink cartridges. Box Tops and cartridges can be dropped off in the school's front office or brought to the Mount Vernon Community Council Meeting.

Another way for our schools to receive funds is to shop through the Box Top Marketplace. Up to 8% of your purchase will be automatically donated back to our school, up to \$20,000 each year, with no additional cost to you.

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#### **Public Safety**

Spring is around the corner! This is probably a good time to review what went well or not-so-well in our personal and household emergency planning during the recent storms, blizzards, road closures and (for some) power outages. For at least a few hours and in some cases a few days, most MVCA residents were on their own. "Lessons Learned" included the need for:

- Spare sets of batteries of all types for flashlights/ radios/lanterns/detectors, etc,
- · Hand-cranked flashlights,
- Hand-cranked radios with weather channels,
- Battery-powered small 2-way radios (\$20-30 for a set of 2),
- One-time use chemical light sticks,
- Fully charged and operable fire extinguishers,
- Phone lists of neighbors,
- Battery-powered smoke detectors,
- NOT using candles, etc indoors for light or heat,

- Ensuring ventilation if using gasoline-powered generators,
- Keeping interior stairs and halls clear to avoid falls during power outages,
- Keeping adequate supplies of prescription and OTC drugs, bottled water, and food that does not require refrigeration nor cooking,
- Garbage bags,
- First-aid kits,
- NOT using ovens or stove-tops for house heating,
- Having a summary of medical records available in the event of need for EMS/ambulance pickup.

Consider signing up for CERT (Community Emergency Response Training). More info on that valuable program and the CERT training syllabus is on the MVCCA web site.
