## **NOISE POLLUTION**

#### Air Traffic

There does not appear to be general agreement that aircraft noise is a serious problem in our neighborhood. However, our upstream neighbors in the Villamay and Hollin Hall Associations have begun a door-to-door campaign to have departing and arriving planes make their turn 10 miles south of Reagan National Airport. That means us!

Potential response: the formation of a "South Flow Alliance" with other affected neighborhoods, including Marlan Forest, Westgrove, and Mason Neck to seek a fair and equitable distribution of this noise. This could function within the purview of the Reagan National Community Noise Working Group (see online reports), and the office of Mount Vernon Supervisor, Dan Storck (www.danstorck.org).

#### Lawn Power Equipment

The revised Noise Ordinance for Fairfax County (effective 2/17/16) restricts the use of lawn equipment, leaf blowers, chainsaws, and power washers between 9 p.m. and 7 a.m.

#### Loudspeakers, Instruments

The same ordinance restricts the use of amplification between 10 p.m. and 7 a.m.

#### Dogs

Similarly, it is a violation of the ordinance to permit barking dogs for more than 5 minutes in any 10-minute period so as to be heard across property boundaries at any time of the day or night, and not at all between the hours of 10 p.m. and 7 a.m.

## PREVENT AND PROTECT AGAINST MOSQUITOES

Reduce the number of mosquitoes around your home and neighborhood and protect yourself from their bites by taking the following steps this spring, summer and fall

#### Control mosquitoes in your yard

Eliminate standing water. Check your yard weekly for containers that are holding water.

Treat standing water with a larvicide\* if it cannot be eliminated.

If mosquitoes are biting you may want to spray your yard with an insecticide\*, particularly the places where mosquitoes like to hide, such as bushy green plants, ivy, other ground-covering plants and bamboo.

# Protect yourself and your family from mosquito bites

Wear insect repellent\* containing DEET, picaridin, oil of lemon eucalyptus or IR 3535.

Wear loose-fitting, light-colored long-sleeved shirts and pants.

Keep doors and windows closed and make sure screens are in good repair.

# Watch for symptoms of mosquito-borne diseases

Symptoms of Zika include fever, rash, joint pain, muscle pain, headache and conjunctivitis (red eyes). Symptoms of West Nile virus range from mild (fever, headache, body aches or a skin rash on the upper body) to serious (high fever, headache, neck stiffness, stupor, disorientation, tremors, convulsions, weakness, paralysis or coma).

If you think you have a mosquito-borne disease, consult your physician.

\*Use EPA-registered insecticides, larvicides and repellents. Follow label instructions.



# **PUBLIC SAFETY**

As summer approaches, consider joining the Neighborhood Watch. Contact Neighborhood Watch Chair Coilin Owens for information.

Consider taking a free series of classes such as the CITIZEN's POLICE ACADEMY and/or CERT—Fairfax County Community Emergency Response Team (CERT). CERT is a joint partnership between the Federal Government and Fairfax County. The CERT objective is to help YOU fill the gap (up to 72 hours) in YOUR neighborhood between an extremely major area-wide incident and arrival of first responders. Classes are free and open to anyone 16 or over who lives or works in the County. There usually are 7 sessions of 3 hours each-

### BUDGET AND FINANCE COMMITTEE REPORT

#### 2017 Budget

The 2017 Fairfax County (FC), fiscal year, budget mark-up was released on April 19th. Chairman Bulova has referred to the budget mark-up as a "Booster Shot to Ensure our Quality of Life."

The property tax rate will be increased from \$1.09 to \$1.13 per \$100 of assessed value. On average, this will amount to about a \$304 increase in our tax bills. The tax increase will go towards "environmental, public safety and human services arena." In addition, County employees will receive a pay raise of about 3.3-3.6%.

The school budget has also increased by \$33.6 million. This increase includes extra money from the state, carry over from the 2016 budget and the remaining advertised balance in the 2017 budget. This amounts to a total increase in the school transfer of about 4.84% or \$88.4 million over last year.

#### 2018 Budget

Moving forward, there is a projected shortfall of \$75 million for the 2018 budget. County Executive (CE) Long has advised that the real estate market continues to show "sluggish growth." At the May 3rd budget meeting, CE Long directed staff to review a proposed meals tax. In addition to a meals tax, they will also look at raising revenue through increasing BPOL, alcohol and cigarette and personal property taxes. It is clear that the needs in the County appear to be out growing our revenue.

#### Meals Tax and FCPS

I'd like to thank everyone who attended our last meeting. I appreciate everyone's feedback on the proposed meals tax and support of the Fairfax County Public Schools. The attendees of the last MVCA meeting support funding the needs of the Fairfax County Public Schools. Although, many of us would consider approval of a meals tax if it came with specific guarantees, there are concerns about how this money is earmarked for use.

There seems to be strong support for the meals tax to be allocated to the aging infrastructure and capital improvements in the school system if it were to be put on the ballot. We are all concerned about how money is spent in FCPS.

Transparency in the budgeting and spending process continues to be a concern along with the potential expense of the changing demographics in our school system. At the MVCCA, we will continue to push our elected officials for more transparency. We will also continue to push for our fair share of tax revenue from the State and Federal government.

#### PLANNING AND ZONING

#### Starbucks Drive Through?

Starbucks, at former Checkers Restaurant location, has requested a Special Exception Amendment. It seeks to use the drive-through window on the building and modify its hours of operation from 5:00 a.m. to 12:00 a.m. (from 2:00 a.m.), on Friday and Saturday nights. Additionally, the amendment was to allow a change from an eating establishment to a fast food restaurant. The vote to allow this amendment was 17 (in favor) to 0.

#### Martial Arts Studio May Expand

We received a briefing, for information only, from owners from the martial arts studio/ educational facility at 6321 Richmond Highway. They're interested in the property close to the intersection of Fordson Road and Richmond Highway. The property is presently undeveloped. The studio/facility will have to move because the owner of the current building is seeking other uses for that land.

Discussion included the following comments: a) The two lots 79A and 79B are zoned, respectively, R-2 and C-8. b). The owner and Jane Kelsey, her representative, have sought to obtain access to these two lots from Fordson Road, but those owners on Fordson Road were unwilling to do so. c) Are these two lots within the Community Business Center (CBC) for the Revitalization Area? The owner's representative will double-check this issue.

It does appear that these two lots are within the Gum Springs Conservation District. The Comprehensive Plan states that these lots are to be high-density residential. The representative, Jane Kelsey, said that she had sent in a request to change the Comprehensive Plan for these two lots. The committee has not seen this proposed change to the Comprehensive Plan.

#### Extenet DAS Update

Documentation has been approved for the area east of Little Hunting Creek, including Wellington. Construction of the small antennae on top of 70 existing telephone poles will take approximately 9-12 months to be on-line. Commissioner Earl Flanagan complimented the sub-committee of P & Z that worked so hard to make this happen.

#### Embark Update

Earl Flanagan provided information about the new process to be used to calculate density needed at proposed Metro stops. Presently, Floor Area Ratio (FAR) is used. For Embark. the expectation is that within a one-mile radius of a proposed Metro stop, population plus jobs will be used to determine whether the site will support a Metro stop. A one-mile radius comprises 514 acres. If the population plus jobs available is large enough, then dividing 514 into the total population plus jobs should be greater than 35. For example, the Eisenhower Ave. stop is 37 at present, which is sufficient population plus jobs to support the location of the Metro stop. In contrast, Beacon Hill has a score of approximately 19, which is far short of what would be needed to justify a Metro stop at the present time.

#### Storage Facility

Lastly, we had a short discussion about the proposed storage facility to replace the Brookside Motel at 6001 Richmond Highway. Co-Chair Donley sent a letter on behalf of P & Z to Supervisor Storck suggesting that the Supervisor meet with the developers. Nothing more has happened on this matter.
