## PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE

Dear MVCA neighbors:

Below are eight important notices. Please take the time to read all of them.

1st: Next MVCA Meeting, Wednesday, October 13 to Focus on Disaster Preparedness: What would happen if flood water rose to over 20 feet in our community? A few weeks ago, it happened in New Jersey. Or the Potomac overflows? Or a tornado strikes us, like the recent one in Maryland? To answer these questions, MVCA has invited Courtney Arroyo, Community Engagement Manager for the Fairfax County Office of Emergency Management (OEM) to speak at our next membership meeting. This will be a virtual meeting, accessed by Zoom # 634-598-1220 and pass code 743225, and we urge all of you to join us that evening. Courtney will tell us what disasters are most likely to occur, what the possible damage might be, and how we should prepare.

The following will help all of us meet the important goal of preparedness in our community:

- •Please check the Emergency Preparedness List on **Page 2** to see what you may be lacking.
- •On Saturday morning, October 16, we will place preparedness reminder signs in our neighborhoods. This would be a good deadline to set for your household to purchase and assemble any of the items you do not have on your list.
- •Later this month, MVCA will drop off an Emergency Preparedness Packet at your home. Please review and use the information and items in that packet.

2<sup>nd</sup>: Our MVCA 2021-2022 MVCA Membership Directory delivery is delayed. After the hard work of Luigi, Lisa, Jeannine, Jori and the Block Captains to put our new edition together, I was surprised to learn that printers are struggling to complete orders and we will have to wait before we can deliver them to your home mid-October. My apologies.

**3rd:** While all 951 residents in the Mount Vernon Civic Association community receive our newsletters, only those of you who are members and have paid the annual \$25 membership fee, will receive the **MVCA Directory**. If you are not yet a member and want a copy of our 112-page Directory, go to mountvernoncivicassociation.org and join.

4th: Street Parking is not storage. County regulations approved in 2008 for the Mount Vernon Community Parking District restrict vehicles, boats, trailers, etc. from being parked long-term on roads. Temporary parking is allowed for up to 48 hours. If you must leave a vehicle longer or have one on the street now, please move it onto your property, driveway or garage. Further, the most frequent complaint I have received in recent months is about street-parked vehicles that hinder access to driveways and crosswalks. Please remember to be considerate of neighbors.

5th: If you have storm water run-off problems on your property, contact Leo Milanowski at the Mount Vernon Council of Civic Associations at: <a href="mailto:specialcommittee@mvcca.org">specialcommittee@mvcca.org</a>. Leo has been asked to determine the extent of the run-off in the Mount Vernon District and what might be done about it.

## **HEALTH & HUMAN SERVICES**

You may have heard news of booster vaccines and breakthrough infections, but you may be less familiar with the changes in COVID-19 related hospitalizations and new cost to patients. Here, I'll give a 30,000-foot view to update you on these important pandemic topics.

Pfizer booster vaccines were approved by the Centers for Disease Control (CDC) on September 24<sup>th</sup>. The Virginia and Fairfax County Health

Departments (VDH) began administering booster doses to eligible residents on September 28. Check the CDC website or chat with your primary care doctor to learn if you are eligible. In general, those that *should* receive the



booster include: individuals older than 65, those living in long-term care settings, and those 50-64 with complex medical conditions. Individuals under 50, and those that work in hospitals or similar settings, *may* receive the booster. We anticipate an updated recommendation for Moderna, J&J, as well as vaccines for children 5-12 soon.

As of September 18, over 5 million Virginians have been fully vaccinated against Covid19. Breakthrough infections, defined by a SARS-CoV-2 infection that develops despite completing the initial vaccine series, have occurred in approximately 0.5% of Virginians. Of those, 0.021% (1,053) have been hospitalized and 0.0054% (254) have died. These cases are largely due to viral variants, commonly delta.

Breakthrough infections, while rare, are most frequently mild. Symptoms including headache, cough, low-grade fever, and muscle aches. Vaccination has proven to be the most effective method to prevent new variants, serious illness, and the spread of COVID-19. VDH has implemented a QR code for vaccine status- check out vaccinate.virginia.gov to download yours.

Finally, it may be of interest that the billing for

COVID-19 testing and treatment has changed. Previously, federal rules ensured that testing and treatment were free to patients. However, as we move forward, tests for monitoring (ie: pre-travel tests) are

unlikely to be covered. You may receive a bill for \$10-200. It has been reported that COVID-19 hospitalizations are not likely to be fully covered for patients, both vaccinated and unvaccinated, as federal rules loosen and health plans change coverage. Patients may have a typical co-pay and deductible as well as additional costs for testing and hospitalization. The average total cost for a COVID-19 inpatient stay is \$40,000. Early research suggests that patients pay about \$3,800 out of pocket for hospitalizations with insurance covering the remainder.

#### **EDUCATION REPORT**

MVCA is very thankful for the Fairfax County taxpayers, Supervisors, School Board and Administrators who have made it possible for the \$20,000,000 renovation of Washington Mill Elementary School.

We are also very grateful for the residents that live near the school – especially on Cherrytree and Continental Drives – who have endured construction demolition noise, dump trucks, sand and rocks in the streets, huge machines that shake homes, overflow parking from construction workers and the noise of building - sometimes occurring seven days a week, starting at 6 a.m. going to 8 p.m.. We are also very grateful for WMES Principal Brad Bennink and FCPS Construction Supervisor Jack McClanahan who have worked closely with us to mitigate any issues and keep us informed of their progress.

As a way of thanking MVCA residents, on Tuesday, September 14 from 7:45 a.m. to 8:15 a.m., Mr. Bennink held a Principal's Coffee and Donuts gathering where he and Mr. McClanahan took 10 of

our MVCA residents on a tour of the new school construction and answered questions. A lot of progress has been made but a lot of construction must continue well into 2022.

Tom then met with our residents who are very concerned with the speeds at which individuals drive vehicles down both Cherrytree and Continental Drives and spoke of why the effort to get speed humps approved in the past had failed. In order for Fairfax County to consider speed humps, residents along those two roads must first approve of the traffic calming, then there must be a speed limit of 25 miles per hour, a traffic volume of between 500-6,000 vehicles in a 24 hour period and 85% of the cars are traveling at least 35 MPH in at least one direction.

Current Mount Vernon District Development Projects in or near MVCA:

<u>Original Mount Vernon High School</u>, located at 8333 Richmond Hwy, 22309

<u>**Purpose**</u>: Adaptive re-use of historic building for educational and community use.

Status: Schematic design phase is complete. A coordination meeting was held on 6/9/2021 between County, FCPS, and NOVA leadership to further discuss the educational programming. The contract was approved on 6/21/2021 and coordination for early related activities is underway. Community update meetings were held on 6/24/2021 and 6/28/2021. Projected completion date: Fall 2024

Penn Daw Fire Station/Emergency Shelter/ Supportive Housing, 2801 Beacon Hill Rd, 22306

**Purpose:** New construction of the Fire Station located at 6624 Hulvey Terrace, Alexandria, and potential co-location with replacement for Eleanor Kennedy shelter.

<u>Status</u>: The Penn Daw Fire Station and Supportive Housing Advisory Committee continues to meet

monthly to evaluate potential collocated uses on the Beacon Hill site. Virtual Community meetings were held on 4/24/21 and 4/26/21 and 6/7/21. An inperson Community meeting was held on 6/29/21. Advisory Committee Meeting held on September 17th. Completion date: TBD

Woodlawn Fire Station, 8701 Lukens Lane, 22309

Purpose: Construction of a new 15,082 SF fire station on the existing site located at 8701 Lukens Lane, with associated site improvements.

**Status**: The new Building was completed and occupied by Fire and Rescue staff on 5/18/2021.

**Mount Vernon RECenter**, 2017 Belle View Blvd, 22307

The project includes renovation of the existing facility, upgrades to existing building systems, and expansion of the fitness area. Completion date: Summer 2022.

We are pleased with this news and will keep you apprised as we learn more.

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

Fairfax County recommends every household keep three to five day's worth of food, water, and supplies in their shelterin-place kits for each member of the household
