Christian Behavior - Morals and Values

Is our behavior learned behavior or genetic? Is this a nature vs. nurture debate?

This is a controversial subject and can be considerably in depth. However, if a teacher can be a positive role model in the life of young people (regardless of the above mentioned) then I'm in! Considering the fact that we all live in the real world, our behavior can be influenced by our environment meaning our families, friends, life events etc.

Therefore, in hopes of planting seeds of kindness and consideration, our first graders may be able to share moments of thoughtfulness to others.

Recently we have been reading books and having classroom discussions on behaviors. There is always room for improvement, no matter how old we are or how educated. We've taken to the streets to locate positive behavior and pinpoint ways to improve actions.

We started a classroom bin of "caught you caring" deposit tickets. When someone has noticed another person (in school or outside of school) the student announces to the class the action then puts a red heart of paper in the basket. If students report an unkind gesture they notice, a black slip gets put into the basket. At the end on one month we will make a graph of gestures whether kind or unkind, and create a list of what we notice.

Whether we are conducting ourselves at home or in public let your actions speak louder than words. For example, let us be aware of our church behavior. When our youth see others being kind and considerate in church, they in turn may repeat this one day. If you can allow someone to sit in your pew (and make room for them pleasantly) this shows kindness and living the words "all are welcome". Positive church behavior can make a positive impact in someone's day or leave a negative note. Let us all sow some seeds of kindness!
