Musings from the Mountain . . .

During June, the camps which were held at Baptist Vista had 90 professions of aith. Over fifty of those salvation commitments have come from the Boy's and Girl's Mission camps and CCBA's Main Camp. God is still at work, and we should be rejoicing with the angels in heaven.

Lest we forget, there is more that needs to be done. While seeing children and teens come to Jesus as their Savior is primary, the Great Commission commands us to make disciples. That means more than salvation. We are to "disciple" those who are saved.

- Each child and teen should be interviewed again about their salvation experience before baptism.
- Each one needs to understand the meaning and purpose of baptism.
- They should be given instruction about reading the Bible, about prayer, as well as the importance of church attendance.
- They should be encouraged to be involved in the life of the church.
- The church should celebrate with them over their salvation.
- The church must not dip them in water and forget about them. They are your spiritual responsibility.

In the last church I served as pastor, I had a conversation with a boy who wanted to be baptized. He had gone to camp with our children's group, and he had gone forward during an invitation. As I guizzed him about being saved, I began to think something was not right. As his story unfolded, the camp our group attended had a bell affixed to a tall pole. To ring the bell, you pulled on a rope. The camp had a policy to allow those who were saved to ring the bell. Through our talk, I discovered he had not been saved at all. He went forward and said whatever he needed to say because he simply wanted to ring the bell. Fortunately, we were able to sort it all out, he was saved, and then I baptized him. My point is that when dealing with children and teens, there are many motives and emotions that urge them to make decisions. We must be sure, to the best of our ability, that they have been drawn by the Holy Spirit.

I do rejoice over the many that have responded in an affirmative way at camp this summer, whether it be at Baptist Vista or another camp.

Vacation Bible Schools are under way and many children hear the gospel and are saved through this and similar efforts. I praise God that so many churches and the adult members give the effort that is necessary to host VBS or similar evangelistic activities. Reaching children and teens is vital. Statistics indicate that the older one gets, the less likely they will be saved. That is not to say, God cannot save any person. He most certainly can. But the reality is that as a person ages, they may be drawn further and further away from hearing the gospel. The opportunities become less frequent.

I praise the Lord for camps, VBS, children and youth workers, and churches that take the time, money, and effort to share the good news of Jesus with those who are young. To God be the glory.
