

Duane Douglas Smith was born on March 16, 1956 in Queens, New York to Fannie Walters (Smith) Clark and Peter Smith. He passed away at his home in upstate New York on May 5, 2020.

Duane grew up in Queens. He attended Bryant Middle School. After high school he left New York to attend Central State University (CSU) in Ohio, earning his Bachelor of Science in Education with a minor in Art in June 1978.

During his time at CSU he was a defensive lineman on the football team (CSU Marauders). He also excelled in basketball, earning him the nickname the "rifleman" because he would not miss the jump shots. In addition to his studies and sport affiliations, Duane worked as a paramedic and a firefighter while pursuing his bachelor's degree.

After graduating from college, he began his teaching career in Ohio where he met his first wife Donna Fields. From that union Dorienne was born in 1984. He subsequently moved back to New York and began teaching at Castle Hill Middle School 127.

Duane returned to school to earn two Masters of Science degrees in Education in 1994 and 1998. He worked as a Special Education Teacher, Dean, and Assistant Principal during his tenure until his retirement from the Board of Education in November 2013, after 30 years of service.

He was focused and intellectually gifted. He was not afraid to try new things or live new experiences. Duane earned a number of certificates including his certification as a Phlebotomist (2010) and a Basic Life Saving (BLS) Instructor (2016). His gifts and talents know no boundaries. He was a gifted sculptor and his works can be found in the homes of many loved ones. He was also a calligrapher penning many documents for various organizations.

Duane loved to travel and especially loved to drive. He frequently drove to Ohio to connect with college and fraternity friends and always took time to drive to see his daughter Dorienne, wherever he was. It was on his trip to Ghana, West Africa (2005) where he met his current wife, Michelle Saunders. They married in October 2012. Anyone who knows Duane remembers hearing him reminisce about how he had to travel 5000 miles to meet the love of his life.

Duane belonged to several organizations. He was initiated into the Omega Psi Phi Fraternity on April 21, 1984. He was Que Dog for life. He was initiated into the brotherhood of Ancient Free and Accepted Masons (A.F.& A.M.) of the Hiram Grand Lodge 1989 where he served as a Grand Secretary, Treasurer, Past Master, and Potentate of Omar Temple. He was also recognized as Inspector General 33rd degree 2006 in New York. His home lodge, Fidelity Lodge #32, is located in Harlem New York.
