# It was meant to be...

My wife, two young boys and I moved into my grandfather's house in 1981. The house was built by my grandfather after he, my grandmother and their two girls moved to the USA from the UK. In fact, my mother was only six years old when they moved over here and became citizens. The house he built sits on two acres in the beautiful Town of Clarence. After my grandmother passed and my grandfather could not live alone anymore in the house he built and cherished is when we decided to purchase his home and sell our house in the City of Buffalo, NY.

Considering it was my grandfather's house there where a lot of things just left here. One of those things happened to be an old **1947 David Bradley 917.5751 Model 263** (Sears and Roebuck) two wheeled walk behind tractor. It had all the implements to work a garden, cut the grass and clear our long driveway of snow. As it worked out after we moved, I did use it for a little garden we had as well as clear the drive of snow.

However, when I was just a little boy somewhere between 10-12 my grandfather started to let me plow the driveway in the wintertime. I loved doing that except for one thing; sometimes I would slip on the ice and the David Bradley would drag me almost to the road before I could get up and stop it. I am not sure if my grandfather ever saw that happen but as I write this, he is probably having a good laugh about it. As

I got a little older that did not happen anymore.

After several years of trying to keep the wildlife from destroying our little garden we finally gave up and filled in the garden with topsoil and planted grass. I also bought my first Cub 129 which I used to cut the grass as well as plow the driveway of snow.

The David Bradley and its implements became a thing that I mostly tripped over and was in my way all the time in our small garage. After a few years of that I decided to sell it. A man that installed satellite dishes bought it figuring he could use the dirt plow to make a furrow in the grass to bury the cable and then use the snowplow to cover up the furrow. We struck up a decent deal on the machine if he took all the implements with it. So now the tractor and all the implements were out of my hair, and it felt good.

Now a few years down the road my two sons said I never should have sold it and the more I heard them say that the more I agreed with them. So, I went to the place where this man lived and inquired about it, but he no longer lived there, and he was out of business. That is where I left it figuring that was that...period!

A few years went by, and my younger son and I were in Hectors hardware on Main St. in the Town of Clarence. My son Jeff wanted to buy a new Carhart jacket so while he was looking at jackets and I was just wandering around the store. There was a for sale sign in the far corner of the store, so I walked over to see what it was. To my disbelieve it was the old David Bradley with a dirt plow on it. I had to look twice but that was it!

I asked the store owner what the story was behind the tractor, and he told me

that a man brought it in, and it needed some carburetor work. After the work was complete the man never came back for it, so Hectors was just trying to recoup the cost of repairs by selling it. Hectors wanted \$100 for it and the dirt plow.

I quickly reached in my wallet and all I had was \$50 cash. I told the store owner the whole story and he finally said if you can take it away now, I will sell it to you for \$50. Jeff and I loaded it onto my truck and home the David Bradley came again.

I could not believe that the Bradley was back home again. I said to my son Jeff it is his if you restore it, Great Grandpa would be proud to see it in a restored condition. So off to work Jeff went and this is what he accomplished.



You do not see many of these with the original knobby tires and after a lot of research he found how to make the color for the wheels. The wheel color is made up of one part John Deere green and one part John Deere yellow. Who would have ever thought of that combination to color the wheels?

After a few years Jeff decided to take it to the WNYG&SEA rally and use it to get around. So, with that thought in mind he created a little sulky for it.




The David Bradley now lives with my son Jeff and his family and is well taken care of.
