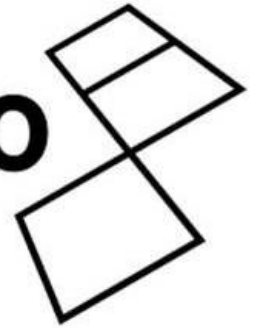

## April Acts of Remembrance

**17-24-30** represents the combined dates of the three London Nail Bomb attacks targeted at the **Black, Asian and LGBT+** Communities of **Brixton, Brick Lane** and **Soho** on the **17<sup>th</sup>, 24<sup>th</sup> and 30<sup>th</sup> April 1999**.

The organisation was set up in March 2009 – to mark the 10<sup>th</sup> anniversary of the attacks.

## October National Hate Crime Awareness Week

In October 2009, after the death of Ian Baynham, 17-24-30 organised the first **London Vigil against Hate Crime** – attended by over 10,000 people.



In 2012 the London Vigils evolved into **National Hate Crime Awareness Week** which we coordinate between **the 2<sup>nd</sup> to 3<sup>rd</sup> Saturday in October** each year.
