Report on 40th Anniversary Cruise Friendship Force International

March 30 – April 13 2017

The 40th Anniversary cruise of the Friendship Force International was an exceptional way to celebrate. Over 60 members from around the world came together to share experiences on our way to Rome. We left from Ft Lauderdale under blue skies and warm weather. It remained the same until after we left Rome to come home or to explore further. Members came from Australia, Brazil, Canada, New Zealand and the US, and most had traveled extensively with Friendship Force. For a handful of us, this was our first trip. The CEO Jeremi Snook and Laura Romero from FFI led the discussions, assisted by Bob Duncan, Chairman of the Board. If there were questions to be asked, there were many people around to answer them.

We met for an hour each morning we were at sea and discussed various topics, including the future of FFI, what it means to be a global citizen, the importance of our mission in today's world, what future FFI cruises might look like, what countries we should seek to build friendship opportunities, and the role of FFI in promoting cultural understanding around the world. To get to know each other better, we played some icebreaker games, had two cocktail parties and met informally for happy hour most days. As we would soon be stopping in 3 Spanish ports, Laura taught us some polite phrases and words in Spanish. At the end of the crossing, about half of us also joined a Rome extension tour to see the highlights on Easter weekend.

Overall, the cruise was quite a success. Everyone agreed that FFI should do more cruises because it is such a great opportunity to get to know other members. As one of the newer members of FFI, I learned a tremendous amount about FFI, journeys, and what it means to be an ambassador.

What is Friendship Force?

I had been struggling with a pat answer when people ask me who we are and what we do. One morning, we divided into small groups and came up with some good answers:

We had plenty of opportunity to try out our new statements. We wore lanyards and nametags so you couldn't miss us. Every meal we had the opportunity to tell others about FFI. Most were quite interested and would check it out when they got home.

Journeys

There were two discussions about journeys (formerly exchanges). Although the terminology has changed because journey translates better in some languages, the word exchanges can still be used, especially domestically. Some highlighted suggestions were:

Journey Coordinator should do an inbound journey before planning an outbound Committee should divide up the duties: transportation, matching hosts and ambassadors, day trips, preparing schedule book with members & pictures There are different types of exchanges: homestay, language learning, active & outdoors, professional, humanitarian & environmental, food & drink, teachers & students. Any member can join another club's exchange if space is available. You don't have to wait for your club to have an exchange. Don't schedule every minute, leave time to enjoy families, but be sure that entire journey is considered Meet with home hosts and days hosts to go over expectations If 2 clubs are partnering, one should designate a JC and the other is the contact Complete evaluation at end of journey from both sides Study language of journey partner

There is a manual, read it!

Future of FFI

There is much work to be done in the world. Friendship Force can play a large role in peace and understanding. To move forward, there will be three new logos and programs this year: 1. The 40th Anniversary; 2. The 40th Anniversary World Conference; and 3. The 40th Anniversary Campaign. Yes, there will be a campaign asking for donations. But it is an ambitious campaign, so FFI is going for corporate sponsors, not just asking for donations from members. Of course, it's nice to say to a corporation that 100% of our members have already donated or pledged. Clubs still play an important part, and ideas for recruitment will be forthcoming. There are two videos now that we can use, and they are translated into several languages. Also, a new flyer/summary of FFI. Word of mouth has been the norm for recruitment, and clubs are talking to service organizations, senior centers, and universities. In Knoxville, we have a wonderful International House where we could meet with students from other countries or with Americans who have studied abroad and want to share that experience. Many of you belong to other organizations where you could encourage members to join FFK.

Suggested locations for exchanges were the Arabian Peninsula, China, Vietnam, the Muslim world, former Soviet bloc, combining two countries going to a third. Reach out to our own community of indigenous people, people of color, people of different faiths, remembering that FFI is non-political, non-denominational, and nonracial. Our membership should reflect our beliefs.
