Description of host organization: The Friendship Force of Knoxville (FFK) was founded in 1981 under the umbrella organization, Friendship Force International. We have hosted hundreds of citizens from around the world in our homes and have visited and been hosted by Friendship Force clubs worldwide and throughout the United States. We hosted Open World delegations in previous years and are welcoming delegates from the Republic of Georgia to our homes and our city for the 2019 Open World program.

The mission of Friendship Force is to promote global understanding across the barriers that separate people. FFI is a non-profit organization dedicated to the principle that each person can make a contribution to global goodwill. We are volunteers and are throughout the world – in over 60 countries. The motto, as first established when the organization was formed in 1977, through the help of President Jimmy Carter and his wife Rosalyn, was "A world of friends is a world of peace." Our mission is to build goodwill through personal friendship. We are ambassadors for peace.

About the region: Knoxville is located in the Tennessee River Valley of East Tennessee between the Cumberland Mountains to the northwest and the Great Smoky Mountains to the southeast. These two mountain ranges help provide a moderate climate with four distinct seasons. Temperatures range from 20 degrees Fahrenheit in January to 95 degrees Fahrenheit in July. Knoxville is a community of festivals with each season having its own unique events, including craft shows, concerts, sports events, and more than sixty miles of dogwood-lined trails. Knoxville is the home of the University of Tennessee, which is well-known for its many academic and scientific departments as well as its national championship football and women's basketball teams. The 107,000 seat Neyland Stadium and the 25,000 seat Thompson-Boling Arena on campus host intercollegiate games, concerts, and other activities. Our city has a variety of local historical sites and museums, including The Museum of Art where works of nationally and locally prominent artists are shown. Knoxville's historical downtown district, the Old City, and its popular Market Square district offer dining, dancing, shopping and entertainment. The nearby Great Smoky Mountains National Park is the most visited national park in the nation. Included in this park is Cades Cove with its renowned replicas of pioneer homes, churches, and businesses, plus many miles of hiking trails bordered by magnificent displays of wild flowers, waterfalls, and rushing streams. Hiking and biking trails abound in and around Knoxville. The Legacy Parks Foundation, an East Tennessee non-profit organization, works to ensure the community enjoys exceptional recreational opportunities, natural beauty, and open spaces. Founded in 2007, the foundation helped conserve 1,000 acres of forest and farmland, and added over 600 acres of park land in Knox County. Other highlights of the area are the Tennessee Valley Authority (TVA), which is world-famous for its electrical power-making expertise. TVA's many dams provide the area with numerous lakes for recreational boating, fishing, and swimming. Oak Ridge is home to the Oak Ridge National Laboratory, an American multiprogram science and technology national laboratory sponsored by the U.S. Department of Energy and administered, managed, and operated by UT-Battelle as a federally funded research and development center.
