Description of Hosting Organization

Friendship Force Knoxville is a chapter of Friendship Force International (FFI). The mission of FFI is: To promote global understanding across the barriers that separate people. FFI is a non-profit organization dedicated to the principle that each person can make a contribution to global goodwill. Home hospitality—the heart of a Friendship Force exchange—provides the opportunity for people of different countries and cultures to connect at a personal level, enriching their lives and leading to a better understanding of other cultures. The ever-widening Friendship Force global network represents a powerful and growing force that can overcome differences between people and nations. The motto, as established when the organization was formed in 1977 through the help of President Jimmy Carter and his wife Rosalyn, is "A world of friends is a world of peace."

The Friendship Force of Knoxville was chartered in 1981. Club members have hosted exchanges of visitors from around the world and have traveled with Friendship Force on meaningful exchanges to make friends in other countries.

About the region: Knoxville is located in the Tennessee River Valley of East Tennessee between the Cumberland Mountains to the northwest and the Great Smoky Mountains to the southeast. These two mountain ranges help provide a moderate climate with four distinct seasons. Temperatures range from 20 degrees Fahrenheit in January to 88 degrees Fahrenheit in July. Knoxville is a community of festivals with each season having its own unique events, including craft shows, concerts, sports events, and more than sixty miles of dogwood-lined trails. Knoxville is the home of the University of Tennessee, which is well known for its many academic and scientific departments as well as its national championship football and women's basketball teams. The 107,000 seat Neyland Stadium and the 25,000 seat Thompson-Boling Arena on campus host intercollegiate games, concerts, and other activities. Our city has a variety of local historical sites and museums including The Museum of Art where works of nationally and locally prominent artists are shown and the Women's Basketball Hall of Fame. Knoxville's historical downtown district, the Old City, offers dining, dancing, shopping and entertainment. The nearby Great Smoky Mountains National Park is the most visited national park in the nation. Included in this park is Cades Cove with its renowned replicas of pioneer homes, churches and businesses, plus many miles of hiking trails bordered by magnificent displays of wild flowers, waterfalls and rushing streams. Also located in the park is a Cherokee Indian reservation with a living Indian village and a modern gambling casino. Another attraction of the area is Pigeon Forge, home of Dollywood, a major amusement park of the southeast, featuring rides, crafts and musical shows. Also here are several country music theaters starring nationally and internationally-known country music celebrities. Other highlights of the area are the Tennessee Valley Authority (TVA), which is world famous for its electrical power making expertise. TVA's many dams have provided the area with numerous lakes for recreational boating, fishing and swimming. Oak Ridge, home to the Oak Ridge National Laboratory, features the American Museum of Science and Energy and a large Friendship Bell cast in Japan and presented to Oak Ridge by its Japanese Sister City.
