CAMEO Quilters Guild will be offering "Quilting with Confidence" again this guild year.



Hower Pounding cindy May

CLASS DESCRIPTION AND MATERIALS LIST

It's a simple technique that requires some aggressive attitude with a hammer, so I will leave your motivation for pounding up to you. No questions asked!

- A piece of white cotton or plain muslin that has been washed and pressed. No sizing or starch, please. It hinders the dyes from transferring. Fabric should be no larger than 18" x 24".
- A scrap of muslin to test certain blooms on before using on your final piece is also recommended. A stack of newspaper about the thickness of a Sunday edition will be your working mat.
- A **flat headed metal hammer**, that you can lift. Seriously, you don't need a sledge hammer. We are not breaking concrete here! Doesn't matter if it's a claw or a ballpein (bet you didn't know that I even knew the difference, did you?!?). Your husband's regular hammer for nails will do. Don't even tell him till you bring your art work home!
- Some flower petals and stems with leaves. Bring what your garden can spare, and some to share. My thumb is not very green, lol! And I don't want to make the church's garden look like the deer and rabbits just had dinner, if you know what I mean! You don't need to uproot anything. Just prune some blossoms whole. Place them in a Ziploc bag or wrap in damp paper toweling. Clip a variety of leaf sizes and shapes. And just a couple thin stems. Do it all that morning. Freshness counts.
- If you want to try your hand at detailing a few flowers, bring an extrafine thinline Black Sharpie marker size .5 or .05.

The afternoon session will include a demo on suggestions on how to finish your floral arrangement later at home.

Have fun with others while turning the Classic Four Patch loose! Joe can guide you through this simple and variable process to make enough Fantasy Four Patch blocks for a crib-size quilt top. Supplies: This is a two-color quilt needing two contrasting fabrics. Bring 2 yards each of 2 fabrics, and a few pieces of a 3rd color for accent. Bring a standard sewing machine, extension cord, pins, rotary cutter, iron, mat and rulers, including 6 or 6 1/2"

square ruler. Parking: street access & in lot behind GFAC (front & back door access).

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From Jan Recinos....

Remember writing that infamous "How I spent my summer vacation" paper in school? The butt of all teacher and student jokes, right? Well, it can be a conversation and an article starter to this day. Who knew? So, after hearing someone talk about the National Quilt Museum (NQM) and the Quilter's Hall of Fame (QHF) at a Guild meeting, I decided to go on a Quilter's Pilgrimage with the woman who encouraged my new interest in quilting, Bonny Heintzel.

We decided to make the NQM, in Paducah, Kentucky and QHF, in Marion, Indiana our destinations, while meandering from Ohio's Amish country near Berlin (pronounced BURR lin), and stopping at as many quilt shops as we could find open, on our route. Bonny prepared in advance by finding shops offering Row by Row patterns along the way. I realized quickly that by the start of our trip in July, winning a Row by Row (RBR) competition was not going to happen for me. Apparently, aficionados of RBRs rush around from shop to shop and get the patterns when they are available June 21st, and then rush home and quickly put them together. The first to present a quilt of 8 RBRs to a participating shop wins a prize. We had started way too late.

We arrived at the QHOF in Marion on day three of our journey. It is in a modest neighborhood, and is the restored home of the woman who made the first patterns for Ladies' Home Journal in 1905-Marie Webster. Her quilts were published and led to so many requests for her patterns that she and her husband developed a way of mass producing patterns for sale.

The Marie Webster Quilt Guild votes for a new Hall of Famer every year and then exhibits her/his quilts. There are also special exhibits such as the one we saw by Linda Koenig. The most fascinating quilt in the exhibit for me (and maybe for Cindy May) was made with mini rectangular sampler quilt blocks. Ms. Koenig has published a book with the patterns she used called <u>The 4" x 5" Quilt Block Anthology</u>. Other quilts on display included the first quilt of Marie Webster which was a crazy quilt, and several of her original appliques. I was allowed to photograph everything in the museum, so I have many photos to share.

When we left Marion, home of James Dean, it was on to Paducah. Muggy and hot, the NQM was a cool place to spend the day. It is adorned with beautiful stained glass windows, on the walk to the entrance. Inside, we talked to the Yo-Yo Quilt Guild members who were demonstrating hand quilting on a frame in the lobby. Their quilts are auctioned twice a year to raise money for the NQM. Then, on into the exhibit. My favorite part were the mini quilts displayed in one corner. They are my new "next projects". I wish I could talk about all the quilts from those which were "painted" to those including mirrors. However, space doesn't allow. Inside the museum there no photography was allowed, but the website of NQM https://quiltmuseum.org/visit/current-exhibits has many photos of the exhibits. A flat picture can't do justice to a beautiful work of fiber art, but if you go to the website, the quilt of the eclipse which passed over Paducah is a colorful rendering of that historic event.

So, while Bonny and I shop-hopped to many beautiful places with fabulous quilts and I spent my birth-day money on SWAG (stuff we all get), we hope you all stayed cool and had a memorable summer!





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Active members will have an opportunity to sign up for committee(s) during the September meeting (if you have not turned in a completed membership form). In order to save time, here is a condensed description of our committees. If you need more detail, please consult your by-laws.

- STANDING COMMITTEES These committees are required to function during the guild year.
- **AUDIT COMMITTEE**: audit the Treasurer's records after June 30 and prior to September 1.
- **CHARITY COMMITTEE:** research, propose, and implement charity projects for the Guild and provide supplies for these projects. Record keeping is involved. The Charity table is staffed on a rotating basis.
- **FUND-RAISING COMMITTEE**: responsible for planning and coordinating all fund-raising activities for the Guild, including door prizes, raffles, internal product sales, and quilt show.
- **HOSPITALITY COMMITTEE**: coordinate all refreshments, including potlucks, for the Guild. Staffed on a rotating basis.
- **EDUCATION COMMITTEE**: responsible for inventory of all library/resource materials, sharing educational information and displays or sponsoring field trips.

 - 2. Displays
- **MEMBERSHIP COMMITTEE**: **Sign-In** responsible for taking attendance at all meetings and collecting guest fees. Staffed on a rotating basis.
- **COMMUNICATIONS COMMITTEE** consists of newsletter and social media.
 - 1. Newsletter-Editorial (filled)
 - 2. Newsletter-Calendar
 - 3. Newsletter-Slip of the Keyboard
 - 4. Social Media: website & Facebook (filled)
- **NOMINATIONS AND ELECTIONS COMMITTEE**: solicit and coordinate nominations from the membership for elected positions on the Executive Board.

PROGRAM COMMITTEE:

- 1. Help set up and take down each meeting program and workshop during the Guild year. Staffed on a rotating basis.
- 2. Charity Day in February
- 3. National Quilt Day in March
- **PROPERTY COMMITTEE**: responsible for all Guild property.

SPECIAL COMMITTEES are optional depending on need and member interest.

- **DOOR PRIZES** purchase prizes and sell tickets during guild meetings. Table is staffed on a rotating basis.
- **FABULOUS FINDS** an "exchange" table of gently used quilting notions, books, magazines, notions and fabric.
- **HEARTS & HUGS** mail quilt blocks to members as a form of support.
- **RESEARCH & INFO** research quilt history, blocks, techniques, tools or other quilt-related topics. Write articles for the newsletter or mount displays using the research.
- **PRESIDENT'S QUILT** work on a quilt made as a gift for the current guild president.
- **RAFFLE QUILT -** work on a quilt made for fundraising.
- **PUBLICITY** publicize CAMEO events in print or social media.
- **QUILT RETREAT** Planning and implementing retreat weekend which takes place each guild year.

ACTIVITIES are also optional. These are informal and voluntary groups. Participation in an Activity will not fulfill an active member's committee requirement. The formation of an Activity needs to be approved by the Executive Board first so as not to create conflict with another group pursuing the same goal or interest.
