A Message from the President - Cindy May

Some of us learn without trying.

What kind of a learner are you? If you are a visual learner, watch the video demos on You-Tube. Ask to sit up front in a class, so you can see everything better. Take advantage of live demos at shows or in quilt shops. You need to SEE in order to learn. You learn by watching.

If you are an aural learner, you need to HEAR every word spoken in a demonstration. Outside and background noises easily distract you. Ask the person behind you to please stop talking during a demonstration. Sit where you can hear every word spoken. Listen carefully as a demo is given. Your brain engages and you learn by what is said to you.

Or you could be a tactile learner. You have to actually do the demo yourself in order to ingrain it into your memory. Watch and listen, then DO it to learn. You probably also love to feel the fabric in a quilt shop, not just look at it! You are a tactile person, and touching connects you with your brain.

Quilting with Confidence is a great place to meet other guild members and make some new friends.



As I write this article the brilliant Super Moon is shining in the night sky reminding me that the **theme for our January Fabric Exchange is "Celestial."** Looking for inspiration? Look up...WAY UP. The sky's not even the limit! Of course sky fabric works, as does clouds, sun, moon, stars, planets, space, etc. Here are the "out of this world" people who signed up for this exchange:

Six people signed up, so each person will bring 12 (10-1/2") squares to the January meeting. The total amount of fabric needed for this exchange is 1 (one) yard.

Looking ahead, our February theme will be "Solids."

What To Do With Those 10-1/2" Squares?

Okay, let's get this out on the table first. We ask for 10-1/2" squares just to make sure everyone ends up with true 10" squares.

Ten-inch squares are among the most versatile pre-cuts. You can slice them into strips, or smaller squares (you will get 4 five-inch charms from one ten-inch square) or triangles to make all kinds of quilt designs. A packet of 10" squares made from an entire line of fabric is called a Layer Cake. Here at CAMEO we are making our own DIY Layer Cakes by using a theme instead of a fabric line.

Need some ideas for your 10" squares? Check out http://blog.keepsakequilting.com/2017/02/quilt-ideas-10-inch-squares-free-tutorial/ for some great ways to use ten-inch squares.

Another place to look for ideas and patterns is Missouri Star Quilt Company's website (https://www.missouriquilt-co.com/). Just click on Community at the top of the page, then click on Quilting Tutorials. I'm looking forward to trying the "Totally Tulips" quilt. Happy quilting with your 10-1/2" squares!

Research and Information I by Jan Recinos

Ten Rookie Quilter's Resolutions for the New Year

As a new member of CAMEO, I joined the Research and Information committee. I thought for weeks about topics to research, and came up with a good one. However, Resolution #3 is the result. I will have an article about "Made in USA" by the end of 2018, after doing the research. So, that left me with little time and no inspiration. So, I fell back on the old January saw of the New Year's Resolutions. Why I felt 10 were necessary, I can't say. But here are my 10 Quilter's Resolutions designed to bring more order, happiness and creativity in 2018.

- 10. Only buy fabric you love. According to Feng Shui, a philosophical system of harmony, if you look at something and you have a bad feeling or reaction, it should be out of your life. If a fabric reminds you of someone you don't like, you shouldn't keep it. Bad vibes! If it isn't a color scheme you can look at, donate it to the Fabulous Finds!
- 9. Learn something new. I feel proud of the quilts and art I have made when it involved growing and learning. I have enjoyed the CAMEO presenters and have made something new at each class. I also am in a sewing club where we learn about our machines. That also leads to new techniques and expands my understanding of the potential of my machine.
- 8. Finish a UFO or WIP. That feeling of accomplishment that comes from ticking a project off your list is good for your soul. However, if you look at the project and it gives you a bad vibe, maybe you should consider bringing it to CAMEO and trading it with another member. We could start a new swap table called projects we can't love. (Or, not). Sometime finishing needs inspiration. This book was recommended on a blog i read:: Quilt Sashings & Settings The basics & beyond author Jean Ann Wright.
- 7. Keep a design book. I have so many of these all around my house that MY New Year's Resolution is to organize my design books! I have doodling, cut outs from magazines and catalogs and, now that I've joined the guild, the pictures of everyone's quilts and our presenters' trunk shows to add. A design book can be like a list of projects. I get a good sense of accomplishment when I can incorporate 2-3 ideas from the book in one project, because then I can tick them off my design list!
- 6. Slow down and sew more often. I follow a blogger called Mark Lipinski and he says he's a member of the Slow Stitchin' movement. I didn't understand why this was a movement, until I began quilting. That was when I realized that quilts are projects that can't be done in a day, so I should get a beverage and an audiobook and enjoy the process. And, sew more! Sewing is fun. Have more fun!
- 5. Organize and destash. My friend Bonny says I can buy 2 new pieces of fabric, if I use one. That's my destash method. (not too sure how successful I will be!) To organize my stash, I read a book whose author recommended keeping fabric by size, then by color. So, I have small boxes for strings and squares, and big bins for each color. Organization has always been a task no matter which of my collections I was organizing. I think it's a worthy goal, but I also know perfection will never be mine.
- 4. Sew for others. One of the best parts of CAMEO is that we sew for others through the charity committee and on Charity Day. We give part of our abundance and joy to comfort others.
- 3. Buy local or Made in USA. I thought about writing my January article about the products used in quilting and trying to source them totally locally. I think this is the research I will take on for 2018. I like supporting quilt shops and last year I visited 20. WOW did they get my support! When I started to list the products that are used in quilting, I started looking at their locations of production. In the Ann Arbor Sewing Center, where I am in a Bernina Club, their patterns are printed in the USA. Some authors now self-publish, like Michelle May-also in the USA. Fabrics, however, are not always local. Our machines and their companies may be made in USA but not owned by USers. I think part of the Buy Local movement is anti-import. This can be tricky though, because silk comes from China and cotton from Turkey, India and other far-away places. Further exploration of this topic to come.
- 2. Label your work and journal. In the future, those who love your quilts will want to know about you and your inspiration. Give them a little history about your time and place in the world. I have the Shutterfly app on my smart phone, and they print my photos for free (not free shipping, though.) I try to remember to take a picture of every creation. I print the picture and have begun a journal with the picture and my thoughts about the project.
- 1. Upcycle. I am aware of and concerned by the abundance in our society. Americans have so much, that many of us keep storage units to hold it. Non-quilters I know accuse me of keeping clutter. Of course, I educate them about my stash. I keep clothing which my family no longer wears in order to upcycle it. I have knits for mittens and scarves (and more), I have t-shirts for memory quilts, and I have clothing I bought, usually in thrift stores, because I liked the fabric and which I intended to add to my stash. I have acknowledged my fabric intentions, and therefore I am...a Quilter! That being said, I have to use what I have, and not hoard it forever.

As a newbie quilter, my 2018 resolutions are unique from years past. Next year will be a Quilting year! And, I have resolved to surround myself with beauty, charity and the joy of creating! Happy New Year!

2018 MYSTERY QUILT English Enchantment

CLUE #1 - FABRIC AND CUTTING

Below is the Fabric list & first Cutting Directions for this year's Mystery Quilt (English Enchantment):

(If you need any clarification, please contact Tina Rink)

Think of a misty morning in an English garden where dewy fresh blossoms drape over an old-fashioned, latticework trellis. While the overall design of the finished quilt is sophisticated and intricate, blocks for ENGLISH ENCHANTMENT are surprising easy to piece.

Start with a beautiful, multicolored print. Then select blender fabrics to complement your focus fabric, such as tone-on-tone, marbles or small scale prints. Rule of thumb - if your fabrics have good contrast and look great when you line them up, they will look great in your quilt.

Wash & dry your fabrics. Press using spray starch or sizing which makes your fabrics "behave". It also makes your fabrics slightly cling together and prevents bias edges from stretching.

Fabric #1: 2-1/8 yards Multicolor print

Fabric #2: 2-1/8 yards Light
Fabric #3: 1/2 yard Light

Fabric #4: 1-1/2 yards Medium Fabric #5: 1-1/8 yards Medium

Fabric #6: 1-1/4 yards Dark Fabric #7: 1 yard Medium

Backing Fabric: 5-1/2 yards

Batting: 76" x 94" Binding: 3/4 yards

TRELLIS BLOCK Rotary Cutting directions

(Cut from selvage to selvage)

Cut Print #1: Two 3-1/2" strips, subcut into

seventeen 3-1/2" squares

Cut Fabric #2 Light: Four 3-7/8" strips, subcut into thirty-four 3-7/8" squares. Cut Six 2" strips of Fabric

Cut Fabric #3 Light: Six - 2" STRIPS

Cut Fabric #7 Medium: Four 3-7/8" strips, subcut

into thirty-four 3-7/8" squares

I was there just before Christmas and found 8 shelves of books about quilting from history to How-to pattern books. This is a used book store so the books are priced more comfortably than online. I didn't find very recent publications but I found a book on thread painting, one on using diamonds and a Libby Lehman book. The real find had appliqué snowflakes! Actually, it is called Sewflakes by Kathy K. Wylie and she teaches papercut applique techniques. (Mine will be snowflakes!) The books ranged from \$6.50 to \$14. I had to ask to find the quilting section though. It wasn't on the map. I was told that there is another section but my budget was maxed out so that exploration remains for another day. I encourage a trip to John L. King, if you want to hunt for quilting treasure!
