



The point of this story (there actually is one), is that you never know how you affect others. If Pat and Sandy hadn't been so nice, I may not have had the guts to come back.

Program News - *Linda Watkins, VP Facilitator*





Which is your favorite season in Michigan?

Do you have just one or do you enjoy all four seasons?

**What do you envision when you think of summer
(or fall, spring or winter) in Michigan?**

**Your challenge is to depict your favorite season in Michigan
- or a composite of all four seasons - in one quilt.**

[You may make more than one mini quilt.]

- The completed size is to be no larger than 24" x 24" (no "row by row's", please).
- The guild will not be contributing fabric for this challenge, so please use your own.
- It is "maker's choice": you may use piecing, applique' (or a combination) and add embroidery and embellishments.
- The finished quilt should be completely quilted, bound and labelled. [It may be quilted by another person.]
- Your quilt can be pictorial or you may incorporate traditional quilt blocks which pertain to the subject or design a completely new block! [For example: autumn could incorporate Flying Geese blocks; spring could have some Pinwheel blocks.]
- Use your own original design or layout - using someone else's pattern defeats the purpose of a "challenge" and stunts your growth as a quilter.
- The deadline for completion of "My Michigan Season" is the May CAMEO Quilt Guild meeting.
- Quilts will be judged by the guild membership on execution of the concept. Winners will be announced at the June pot luck dinner.

Here are some ideas to jump start your creativity:

- Look through old family photographs.
- Read quotes about the seasons. Take a look at novels with Michigan place settings - try Judith Guest or Ernest Hemingway's Nick Adams stories.
- Check out our state bird, state tree, state flower, etc.
- Consider seasonal activities you enjoy.
- Start with "thumbnail" sketches or doodles before you commit to fabric. Refine and elaborate your sketch until you have something you'd like to sew.

Have fun! We've given you lots of choices in technique so you may make your Challenge Quilt as personal as you like.



Book Review - Nancy Bekofske
Japanese Contemporary Quilts and Quilters: The Story of an American Import by Teresa Duryea Wong shows how the American quilt revival sparked a revolution in Japanese fabric arts, and presents contemporary Japanese Quilt Artists who transformed the quilt world.

American quilters well know that quilts from Japan display remarkable technical and creative skills. Wong explains the rigorous and exacting Iemoto system of education. Students learn in a classroom setting under a master teacher. A long term commitment is required as students master the craft, progressing from basic to instructor level. Emphasis is on hand workmanship, a highly valued skill with a long tradition in Japan.

The result of this traditional form of apprenticeship is evident by the many awards taken by Japanese quilters at international venues.

Alternately, some quilt instructors, not certified in the Iemoto system, teach in the 'American' way, allowing students to work at their own pace, acting as a mentor. Long-arm quilting is more prevalent in these schools.

Part One of the book covers:

- *Japan's Quilting History: A Heavy Dose of American Influence*, including the Whitney Museum pivotal quilt show in 1971 to the American television show "Little House on the Prairie" which showed quilt-making and quilts
- *Learning to Quilt in Japan: Two Schools of Thought*, the Iemoto system and quilters like Noriko Endo who are 'outsider' artists
- *1990: The Year of the Quilt*, the year of Quilt Nihon and the first All-Japanese quilt show
- *Japan's Gross National Cool and the J-Quilt*

Part Two presents eight contemporary Japanese quilters representing various styles:

- Yoko Saito and her *Japanese Taupe color theory*
- Yoshiko Katagiri who uses kimono silks in her appliqué quilts; see her quilts at *Quilt Inspiration*
- Noriko Endo who uses 'confetti' fabric scraps to make amazing quilts
- Chiaki Dosho whose fiber art pushes the boundary of 'quilt'
- Yoshiko Kurihara, anime artist turned quilter uses the iconography of Harlequin clowns
- Keiko Goke whose colorful interpretations of traditional blocks are delightfully 'off kilter.' See her DoubleWedding Ring

The book is oversized with 200 full color photographs on every page. It is an elegant book, down to the type font and layout.

Altogether, it is an informative and inspirational book that quilters and art lovers will enjoy.

What's a CAMEO member to do,...?

Dollar stores are a good source of items for a bag. Haven House distributes the bags to the children and women residents who have left abusive homes with not much more than the clothes on their backs. If you won't be bringing a filled bag, bring in items or your empty completed bag and the Charity Committee will fill it.

You can: Still sign up for the Hexie workshop on Saturday, Nov. 21; contact Linda Watkins ASAP, there are just a few openings. If you use your \$10 voucher the cost of the workshop will be \$5!

You can: Start buying baby related items for the church's layette program. Think about all the little everyday things a new baby needs. The church makes up layette kits from your donations and distributes them to needy moms on Mother's Day in May, so your contribution is due no later than the April General Meeting on April 21, 2016. Buy a little each time you shop.

You can: Still get your \$10.00 voucher from CAMEO and your member directory at the Membership Table if you haven't picked them up in Sept. or Oct. They will be at November General Meeting on Nov. 19

You can: Plan ahead by signing up for Joe Cunningham's April 16th workshop. Save, then use your \$10 voucher for it. With his history of quilting background and achievements, we are very lucky to get him. The workshop will be offered to members of other guilds, so contact Linda Watkins to secure your spot before the workshop fills. Each of us can learn a lot from him.

You can: Work on and donate any charity items you want ALL year long (except for the HAVEN House bags and the church's Layette Program which have definite due dates). The Charity Committee provides kits to make items. There are eight months left to our guild year, plenty of time to make at least one item for charity. Our charitable contributions help the guild to maintain its tax free entity.

You can: Mark your calendar for Charity Day on Saturday, Feb. 20. Plan to be there for the whole day devoted to making charity items; this year the Alzheimer's "Fidget" quilts and grief envelopes will be made that day or you can work on any charity item you choose.

You can: Read the handout supplied by the Challenge Committee this year at the Oct. Meeting. If you weren't there, be sure to get one in November. Start those creative juices going to make a mini-quilt following the theme and directions listed on the handout. Completely finished mini-quilt is due at the May meeting, the members present that night will vote on the best execution of the challenge theme and the winner will be announced at the June meeting.

You can: Register for the Retreat ASAP and arrange a payment plan or pay for all of it at once. Contact Pat Baldauf.

You can: Find and Read the article in this newsletter about the Quilting with Confidence classes offered this guild year.

Charity Committee -

Welcome to CAMEO Quilters guild from the charity committee. Part of our obligation to hold non-profit status for the guild is to provide charitable donations. Each year in September the committee chooses charities to contribute to. Ideas from the members are appreciated. These ideas were brought to the guild at the October meeting and went to a vote by the membership. As part of your member obligation every member should participate in at least one charity project. The only cost involved is that of your time. The charity committee provides the material, batting, and even quilting your objects are done by several of our long arm quilters. We have lots of kits available at the back of the hall during our meetings. If you wish to make a project with your own materials that is appreciated too.

Below are the charities for the 2015-2016 CAMEO Guild year:

Clawson United Methodist Church- Layette program held by the church supports needy mothers. crib quilts, diapers, items of baby clothing for newborns and babies, and toiletries are some of the items that are needed. The items can be brought in to any meeting but our last collection time is at the April meeting. The items are given to the church and delivered in early May.

We would also like to give to the church mittens and hats. Patterns are available from the charity committee. They can be made out of old sweatshirt material. If there is an interest we would like to hold a day to sew these. Please let Willie Pfeiffer know if you are interested. If possible we would hold a sewing day before the weather gets too cold.

Miracle Quilts: This charity was founded by Carole Carroll in 2009. Their mission is to create patriotic quilts to present to our wounded troops at Walter Reed Hospital in Washington D.C., for our Michigan VA hospitals and for our homeless vets and for Troops currently serving our great country!! Kits are available from the charity table to make these patriotic quilts. Quilts have even be donated by the guild for children of soldiers as a way to comfort them in the loss of a parent or while a parent is away on active duty. Quilts are made all year and can be done throughout the summer to be given to Carole Carroll by the end of the guild year in June.

Memorial envelopes: These are fabric and cotton made envelopes with a tie in place of a manila type envelope, given to Henry Ford Hospital for families that have suffered a loss of a newborn baby. The envelop holds papers given to the family with the loss of their child in hopes it brings some conform to them. These envelopes are to be brought back to the committee by May in order to be given to the hospital by the end of our guild year.

ConKerr Cancer: This organization which is now called Ryan's Case for Smiles accepts donations of pillowcases for children hospitalized, giving them an emotional boost and reminding them they are not defined by their illnesses. Kits are

available from the charity table and are due back by the June meeting.

MORC- Macomb Oakland Regional Center: The Macomb-Oakland Regional Center Inc. (MORC) is the premier resource for providing services and supports for individuals with developmental disabilities in southeast Michigan. The guild provides small lap quilts which are used by wheelchair bound workers to help keep them warm. Kits are available at the charity table and can be brought back any time.

Alzheimer quilts- These quilts are sometimes called fidget quilts made from textured fabric and given to Alzheimer patients. They can be soothing to the person. Patterns and kits will be shared at charity day. If you have any textured fabric (corduroy, silk, wool, etc) you would like to donate please bring to charity day in February.

HAVEN bags - These bags are given to women and children staying at HAVEN which is a shelter for battered women and children. Toiletries, small toys, hats, gloves, books, cards are some ideas of things that can be used to fill the bags. These bags are due at the November guild meeting.

We hope this gives you a better idea of the charities that the members of CAMEO Quilters Guild support. We do provide fabric and batting made up into simple kits for these projects. Many donations have been given to the guild from outside sources and by our members. Please join us on charity day to sew projects for any of the above charities. Watch upcoming newsletters for more info on charity day but in the meantime stop by the charity table at the next meeting and help fulfill your obligation to the guild.

Grand Rapids Art Prize 2015 - Carol Fetsco

There were 1,550 entries in every media this year in the Art Prize held in Grand Rapids. The winner, who received 422,763 votes from the viewers of the entries was "Northwoods Awakenings" by Ann Lovelace of Frankfort, MI. It was a massive four part QUILT! Ann and her husband created a hybrid art form called Photofiber. The resulting work begins as a photograph and blends in quilting elements along its length until it becomes an entirely quilted textile work at its opposite end.

Ann won the \$200,000 grand prize. It was the second time in two years that she won. Her previous winning entry was "Sleeping Bear Dunes Lakeshore and it, too, was a massive four part quilt.

Again, this year there were rumblings following the announcement of the winner; the feeling seemed to be that "a quilt is not art". That's not what the majority of the viewers thought.

“Quilting with Confidence Classes!”

CAMEO will be offering Quilting with Confidence classes again this year.

The ten sessions will be held starting in January and are FREE to CAMEO members.

The classes will be held at Joann’s Fabrics at Madison Place on John R. in Madison Heights south of 14 Mile Road. The session leaders are Carol Fetsco, Linda Watkins, Maggie Smith, and Rosemary Spatafora.

Attendees will be making 12 blocks involving different techniques with increasing degrees of difficulty.

Following the making of the blocks will be lessons on sashings, borders, sandwiching, pinning, quilting, and binding.

The end result will be a sampler style lap quilt and a folder chock full of information you can use whenever you make a quilt.

If you are interested in joining a sit and stitch group, helping to make a raffle quilt, or in making a group quilt, but don’t feel like your work is “good enough”, then this class is for you. You WILL become more confident with your quilting.

Because of the small class area, we are limited to only 15 attendees. We are asking that if you sign up to attend you make every effort to attend each of the ten sessions.

The sessions are always on Tuesday at 7PM and the dates are: Jan. 5 & 19; Feb. 9 & 23; Mar. 8 & 22; Apr. 12 & 26; May 10 & 24. Check your calendar to keep those dates open and fill out the registration form in this newsletter.



Meeting took place at the Clawson United Methodist Church, 205 N. Main, Clawson, MI 48017

Called to order - 7:00 p.m.
