



### **2013/2014 CAMEO Challenge** - Carole Gilbert, Pat

The Challenge Committee is delighted that so many of you have signed up to do the Challenge this year! Below is a reminder of the guidelines for the 2014 Challenge.

The theme of this challenge is 'ONLY SOLIDS'. This project requires that you use only solid colored fabrics to make your quilt. That means no tone-on-tone, no marbles, no shaded fabric, no prints of any kind. Just PLAIN SOLID colored fabrics and plain white, beige or other for the background. (Think Amish quilts!) You can use a dark background if you wish. The backing should also be solid colors, though you can piece the back if you wish.

The size of the quilt should be lap size, no bigger than 56 x 72. You just might need a throw for those cool spring nights or maybe you need a gift for a friend. You can use any technique—piecing, paper piecing, appliqué, strips, squares, rectangles...whatever lights your fancy. This quilt should be your very own— It should be pieced, appliquéd, AND quilted by you.

The 2014 Challenge Committee hopes that this information piques your curiosity and that you will have lots of fun hauling out fabric from your stash or going shopping, arranging and re-arranging fabric into a great quilt. You have until June to complete your quilt.

# CAMEO Corner Why is a quilt show necessary to the function of a guild?

Simply put, a quilt show provides the funds to maintain a guild. Even if a charitable organization is a non-profit entity, it takes money to carry out its Purpose as outlined in

its bylaws. It takes money to "promote and preserve the art of quilting, patchwork, applique and related fiber arts". Money is needed to "sponsor workshops, lectures, and displays". Rental fees just to meet or for workshops must be paid. Guest speakers are expensive. A quilt show takes a lot of work by the members but it pays off in providing the funds with which to continue to meet the guild's Purpose. Shows educate the public about quilting, stimulate an interest in quilting, and can bring in new members to the guild. Yearly costs far out pace the income generated by the membership dues alone. Another source of income is needed.



#### MAKING A PRESSING SURFACE

Never underestimate the value of good pressing in your quilt-making. If you cut and sew accurately but don't take time to press correctly, your patchwork can end up just as off-kilter as it would if you had gone awry in the cutting or stitching. Your pressing board surface plays a big role in how the finished piece looks.

Although there are pressing boards available for purchase, why not make your own? It is inexpensive to make, and it is sturdier than what can be purchased in the store. Sharon Schamber has an excellent video on this subject. Go to YouTube, type in "Pressing Surface," and look for "Sharon Schamber's Perfect Pressing Board." There you will find step-by-step directions. The video is only 8.5 minutes long, and you'll see how simple it is to craft this well-made board. Here is the supply list:

- OSB board cut to size
- 100% cotton canvas
- 100% cotton batting
- · Fusible felt for back of pressing board
- · Spray adhesive
- Scissors
- Spray bottle of water

OSB board can be purchased at Home Depot. It comes in sheets. A 2 foot X 4 foot piece, 7/16" thick, costs \$6.15. Home Depot will cut the board free of charge to your specifications.

One of the sizes I have made is 12 X 12. It fits easily inside those 13 X 13 plastic cases found at JoAnn's; great for carrying to quilting classes. Also, I cover the canvas with fabric. After the cover has seen its better days, I simply rip it off, cut another scrap of fabric, and staple it down. Voila! A fresh, new pressing board, and the canvas always stays in place.



#### Free Quilt Rack - Rosemary Spatafora

I have recently come into possession of a gently used Q-Snap quilting frame. Since I already have a Q-Snap quilting frame I am happy to give this frame to anyone who would like it. This is an easily assembled frame made from white PVC pipes. It stands 31 1/2" - standard table height.

Linda Draudt, Membership V.P.: 59 members present tonight, 11 guests and 1 new member.

Susan Van Eck, Treasurer: October financial report- Income was \$\$872.68, expenses were \$1,373.27.

The financial report was accepted as given, it will be signed, dated, and placed on file.

Lucy Lesperance, Sit and Stitch Committee chairman reiterated our guest speaker, Debbie Grifka's, comment that "little stitch groups are the grass roots of a quilting community." Lucy urged members to get involved in a small group, she mentioned there is a booklet available from her or the guild library if not sure about what to do, and to "just do it".

Carol Gilbert: as Challenge Committee chairman- announced that tonight is the last night to sign up to join in the challenge for this year; the challenge is to make any type of quilt as long as it is made up entirely of solids, is quilted by the piecer herself, and is no larger than 56" X 72". The completed Challenge quilts are due in June. As Retreat Committee Co-chairman - the retreat will be on May 2, 3 and 4. The cost will be \$100.00. March 20 is the final date to pay for attending. Payments will begin being collected in February.

Chuck Blanchard, President's Quilt committee chairman - while Sharon "had to leave the room", Chuck described the President's quilt project for this year.

Barbara Lusk, Round Robin Chairman, announced that the Round Robin will restart in January, interested members should bring in their starting block along with a 12" square of muslin in a brown paper bag with their name on the bag.

Sharon Cratsenburg reminded members to sign up tonight to bring a dish for the potluck portion of the December 19 meeting and announced that the November Board Meeting would be on November 26 at the home of Lynda Draudt.

Call to order at 7:15 P.M.

Minutes approved as printed in the newsletter.

President Sharon Cratsenburg:

Request approved by Don Kelly from the Clawson United Methodist Church for lockable doors to be added by CAMEO to the shelves in the storage room at the back of the meeting hall. Cost will be priced out before work is to begin. Also, all of the CAMEO items in the storage area will be cleaned up and organized before the doors are added.

Pins - new price with white in place of gold is \$285.00; order approved by consensus.

Missing manuals - Theresa is going to write the replacement for the Publicity committee. No others are missing.

Information on website re the Bonner and Loessel programs needs to be added; Lori will send it to Janeen Sharpe.

Bylaw wording of Standing Rule #2 - discussion followed. It was decided by consensus to leave the wording as is since nothing regarding membership has been violated.

Lori Miller, Facilitator V.P.:

Workshop Report - There were 11 attendees at Debbie Grifka's workshop on November 23, 5 were non-members. CAMEO had to cover \$182.00 in expenses toward the cost of the workshop because it was not filled. Next workshop will be on January 18, 15 are signed up to attend with five openings left as of today; three more are needed to break even on the workshop before CAMEO has to make up the difference. It is hoped that CAMEO members will sign up for and attend at least one of the remaining workshops this guild year.

CAMEO owns only one ironing board and needs two, also, CAMEO does not own a cutting board. A suggestion was given to check Salvation Army stores for an ironing board. Carol F. and Sharon C. each said they would check and if available at a low cost, would buy an ironing board. Susan V.E. indicated that she would check with a friend who may have an ironing board to donate. Those who search for an ironing board will E-mail/call Lori M. to let her know what has been found. Sharon C. added that once CAMEO's items in the storage area at the hall can be locked, CAMEO would look into buying a cutting board. Jean S. offered to donate a new iron to the guild to be available for back up in case one of the two CAMEO irons breaks.

Talk digressed to the making of iron caddies; Susan and Linda W. will donate Insulbrite to Sharon C. and Lynda D. to make the caddies

Carol Herzberg, Programming V.P.: will contact Chuck Blanchard and Town Hall Quilters Guild about coordinating a guest speaker during the 2014-2015 guild year. Ideas suggested tonight and previous meetings are still pending. No guest speakers have been booked for 2014-2015 as of tonight.

Lynda Draudt, Membership V.P.: To date we have 71 Active members and 9 Associate members. There will be a new member tea in January. The cost for printing the 2014-2015 directory, as determined by the

Lamphere High School Printing Shop, will be checked for accuracy before the next board meeting.

Carol Fetsco, Recording Secretary: Reported on her three liaison committees, Audit, Retreat, and Sit and Stitch.

Sharon Bisoni, Corresponding Secretary: Reported that 55 calendars were sold at the General Membership Meeting on November 21, and at this point the printing costs are covered. Additional sales will be profit to the guild. A 2015 calendar is planned and work on it will start in the Spring. Discussion included a suggestion for a guild cookbook, perhaps a 20th anniversary edition.

Susan Van Eck, Treasurer: Quarterly Financial Report -Income since July 15, 2014 is \$5,756.70, expenses since July 15, 2014 totaled \$4,325.63; at this point the guild is up \$1,431.07.

Linda Watkins, Assistant Treasurer: Copy of "Ice Breakers" was used by Carol and returned; Linda can make the book available to anyone who would like to read it.

Theresa Nielsen, Liaison to Charity, Challenge, Nominations & Elections: Royal Oak Starr House display moved to February, theme is St. Valentine's Day but displayed quilts don't have to be on theme. Rosemary may be asking for mini quilts for a display at the Royal Oak Public Library, more to come on that. There were 68 Christmas bags taken to The Haven from CAMEO. An article from Charity needs to go into the newsletter with that information. Theresa needs to know the names of the contact person at each of the five charities supported this year as well as the Charity Committee member contact person to each of the five charities. Hospitality will place a reminder list in the newsletter for the potluck in December and add about serving utensils, place setting, and fat quarter wrapped quilt book.

Jean Schlegelmann, Liaison to Newsletter, National Quilting Day, Door Prizes: did not hear from any committees.

Jackie Speer, Liaison to Hospitality, Fat Quarter/Blockery, Publicity, Round Robin: no reports.

Lynda D. added that she will be sending an updated e-mail list of Standing and Special Committee membership.

Quilt Show recommendation from the Executive Board: Sharon reviewed the "pros" and the "cons" as turned in by members. The "cons" were much fewer in number and revolved around the same idea that a show is "too much work". Sharon requested a motion to continue our two year cycle and schedule a quilt show in the Spring of 2015. Susan moved to "recommend that the next quilt show be

scheduled in the Spring of 2015." Discussion followed. Alternatives to a show were mentioned,; spaghetti dinners, pancake breakfasts, in house raffles, and sales of CAMEO items, all of which are a lot of work, have to happen more frequently, and require money out of our own pockets, plus do not bring in as much money as a quilt show. A show brings in outside money and lives all parts of our state required Mission Statement. What followed was a discussion of ways to reduce the work burden on the members when preparing for a quilt show. Among them were fewer items for a boutique utilizing only volunteered consignment items, and then only items which have a good sales history. There would be no need for a committee to make up kits or make items for sale. Members would still be encouraged to enter at least one quilt and outside sources of quilts (quilt shop groups, small guilds that do not do shows, individual non-member quilters or quilt owners) would be tapped for entry, Spring of 2015 follows the two year cycle voted on by members after show #4 in 2011, schedule more open sew days rather than have workshops during the 2014-2015 guild year.

Vote on the motion: in favor 8, not in favor 2. Motion carried, the president will recommend to the membership during the December Business Meeting that the next CAMEO quilt show be scheduled for the Spring of 2015 and will request a motion to that effect.
