
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

The patterns for these two blocks are included in this newsletter. (Thank you, Judy Murray) If you lost track of the blocks we have presented this year, they are as follows:

September Jacob's Ladder (aka Underground Railroad Block)
October Monkey Wrench (aka Churn Dash) & Bear's Paw
November Basket & Log Cabin
January ShooFly & Bowtie
February Cross Roads, Drunkard's Path, Carpenter Wheel & Wagon Wheel
March Flying Geese & Birds in the Air
April Sailboat & North Star

Quilt Repair - It Really Is A Thing

Several years ago, I was asked to repair a quilt which had a few holes in it, nothing too serious. It was a wellloved quilt and the owner wanted to preserve it because it was made by her grandmother. The pattern was similar to a traditional patchwork quilt. I appliqued patches of fabric over the torn parts of the guilt and then guilted them down. It was lovely, the customer was very pleased.

Fast forward to a year or two ago when I started getting calls to repair more quilts, but these were far more damaged and in need of a lot more work. So many of these quilts had areas where the fabric was missing or hard to recognize and also very difficult to repair...but, where there's a will, I will find it. Once again, these had been well-loved quilts but in most cases the owner had prolonged the repair.

Our own CAMEO Quilt Guild member, Maggie Smith has referred many customers to me for guilt repairs. And yes, they have all been difficult. Often, customers would tell me they were still using the quilt although it needed to be repaired.

So now to do the repair work, I take lots of photos of the damage, lots of close-ups, too. I have my notebook handy to write down all of the work that needs to be done, such as replacing different fabrics, appliqueing over worn blocks, putting on a new binding, etc. Once all of the problem areas have been identified, my goal is to look into my stash of fabrics used for repair and get to work. The fabrics that I use for repair are part of my collection, fabrics that I've saved for just that, repairing quilts. I've used reproduction fabrics, men's shirts and also vintage kinds of fabric like those from the 60's. You might be asking yourself, why men's shirts? Because it was popular back then to make quilts from old clothing and that included men's shirts.

Quilt repair work is very time consuming and very tedious. One has to love old quilts and has an interest in saving and preserving these quilts, many of which were made by our grandmothers and beyond. While some may not agree, an old family guilt is worth the time it takes to repair, and the end result is saving a family heirloom and being able to pass down to our loved ones.

My next quilt repair is definitely a challenge. It is a crazy quilt, thought to be over a hundred years old. I'm up for the challenge.



The Benefits of Starching Fabric Before Cutting

If you starch the wrong side of your fabric then let it dry before ironing you will enjoy these benefits:

- 1. Fabric is VERY easy to work with, no flopping around and often you can sew perfectly without pins.
- 2. Fabric barely frays on the edges saving you time from cleaning up all the frays before quilting.
- 3. Very easy to press your seams and it is much easier to press seams open.
- 4. Fabric shrinks a little when starching; it is similar to pre-washing your fabric. But keep this in mind when purchasing your fabric. It only shrinks in one direction which I think is the width of the fabric. When I starch a layer cake square it will be 10" square before, and 10" by 9.5" after usually. Some brands of fabric shrink more than others.

I had seen this practice on YouTube with the Fat Quarter Shop and Lisa Bongeen of Primitive Gatherings but I was still hesitant to try it until Laurie Johnson gave me a couple of squares to sew together, and right away I could see the difference! Thank you, Laurie, my piecing has improved dramatically since she shared those squares with me a few years ago. The price of Niagara Spray starch has almost doubled since the pandemic. I was getting irritated by it, then someone mentioned Stayflo in a hand sprayer. Well I thought a big sprayer would be better and it's great! I don't get a sore finger or sore elbow using the large one gallon sprayer I purchased at Home Depot for \$11 and I have saved a lot of money on starch. I usually dilute the Stayflo to one part starch and 2 parts water, if you do that you can starch about 15 yards for \$3.66 (if you used Niagara cans you pay about \$10). Here's my sprayer:

p.s. Don't tell anyone, we don't want a run on Stayflo, iust kiddina!

Editor's Note: I usually spray (if I'm ambitious) 2 light coats on each side of the fabric, ironing each coat. It should feel like paper when you are done. (The starch washes out). This greatly helps with bias edges, as there is less stretch in your fabric. Spray only what you will be using in your project; starched fabric stored for a long time can cause silverfish to form. LJ

Use and Storage of Homemade Spray Starch

Use as you would any store-bought starch. Follow the recommendations on your iron for heating. Clean your iron regularly. Starch can build up after a while. Store in a cool, dry place for a few months or in your refrigerator. Discard if you notice any discoloration.

Cornstarch is the one that comes up most frequently when looking for recipes for homemade spray starches.

I decided that I could figure out how to make liquid starch for clothes without these undesirable ingredients and started digging...

SPRAY STARCH - WATER AND CORNSTARCH, HEATED

I knew there had to be a way to keep the starch suspended without adding chemicals. I decided to add heat:

Mix together 2-½ cups of tap water and 1-½ tbsp cornstarch in a saucepan (make sure there are no lumps).

Bring the mixture to a boil for 1 minute then cool to room temperature.

Fill a glass spray bottle.

The heated starch stays suspended and works perfectly: no shaking, no clogging, and nicely starched clothes!

RICE STARCH

Step 1

Boil water on your stove, using 5 to 6 cups of water for every cup of rice you plan to make. Add the rice when the water boils.

Step 2

Continue boiling the rice until it is tender. This will take about 15 minutes. When the rice is done, strain it and save the cooking water.

Step 3

Cool the rice water. Strain it through a piece of flannel into a spray bottle and use it as ironing starch.

GLUE STARCH

Step 1

In a spray bottle, combine 1 tablespoon of all-purpose white glue and 2 cups of water.

Step 2

Screw the cap onto your spray bottle and use your starch.

VINEGAR STARCH

This is very similar to the basic cornstarch recipe, but adding vinegar to the mix cuts down on the possibility of mold.

2 cups water

1 tablespoon cornstarch

1 tablespoon white vinegar

Mix water and cornstarch in pan on heat. Bring to a boil, then remove from heat. Add white (only white) vinegar. Cool before putting into spray bottle.

PROS: cheap, easy and disinfects

CONS: stinky

FLOUR STARCH

Step 1

In a small bowl, mix together 1/2 cup of cold water and 1 tablespoon of flour. Use a whisk or your fingers to smooth out the mixture and get rid of any lumps.

Step 2

Bring 1/2 cup of water to a boil in a small pot. Add the flour and water mixture to the boiling water, stirring constantly as you do so.

Step 3

Continue boiling and stirring the mixture until it thickens slightly. When it has, remove the pan from heat and allow it to cool.

Step 4

Strain the cooled flour water into a spray bottle and use it as laundry starch.

VODKA STARCH

Here's a recipe for spray starch using inexpensive vodka which is supposed to produce a light crisp finish. Apparently, the potatoes used to make vodka make an effective starch.

1/3 cup vodka

2/3 cup distilled water

funnell

spray bottle

Using a funnel, mix your ingredients in a spray bottle. Shake the bottle before each use.

PROS: Light, crisp finish

CONS: The "maid" drank all the vodka

POTATO STARCH

Wash and peel one potato, eliminating any discoloration. Grate into a bowl. Pour 1 quart of water over the grated potato. Stir. Pour cloudy water through a strainer into a bowl. Wait 45 minutes. Pour the clear water off the top leaving the starch behind. Pour the starch into a saucepan. Add 1/4 cup cold water to make a paste. Pour in 2 cups boiling water, stirring constantly. Pour misture into a spray bottle. Add 1 cup cold water for a medium-weight starch.

PROS: You probably have one potato handy

CONS: This amount of effort should be saved for making cinnamon rolls.

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SAIL BOAT BLOCK

Cut for Background (sky):

2 - 4" squares (for ½ square triangles) 3 - 3 ½" squares 2 - 3 ½" x 6 ½" rectangles

Cut for sail: 2 - 4" squares (for ½ square triangles)

Cut for boat: 1 - 3 1/2" x 12 1/2" rectangle


Cut for water 1 - 3 ½" x 12 ½" rectangle

Making the Sailboat

Place 2 sky squares with 2 sail squares, right sides together. Draw diagonal line on wrong side of sky fabric and sew ¼" on both sides of the line. Cut on diagonal line. Press seams toward the dark.



Sew 1 half square triangles sail to the sky 3 ½" square. Sew two ½ half square triangles together. Sew rows together as shown on the right.



Sew 3 $\frac{1}{2}$ " x 6 $\frac{1}{2}$ " rectangles on both sides of sails.


For Boat:

Draw a diagonal line on the wrong side of two sky squares. Place one square on each end of boat fabric.

Sew on diagonal line, Trim 1/4" away from sewn line. Press seams toward sky.



Lay out sail, Boat and Water. Sew together, press seams toward water.



NORTH STAR BLOCK

This block consist of 1) 31/2" square for the center.

- 4) 21/2" x 31/2" flying geese and 4) 2" squares for corners to make small star points and
- 4) 3½" x 6½" flying geese and 4) 3½" squares for corners to make the large star points,


Cut: 1 - 3 1/2" square for the center

Using your favorite method make 4 - 21/2' X 3½" flying geese using center fabric for the sky and background for the geese. (directions for one method were printed in the Silhouette in March) Cut 2 - squares of background for corners

Cut 4) 3 $\frac{1}{2}$ " squares from background fabric (can be a different background from small star) Using your favorite method make 4 - 3 $\frac{1}{2}$ " x 6 $\frac{1}{2}$ " flying geese using background fabric for geese and another fabric for the geese.


To construct block: Sew a square to both ends of a small flying geese for the top row, and repeat for the bottom row. Press seams toward square...





Sew a flying geese to both sides of the center square press seams toward center square.


Sew one row to the top and bottom of this unit and one to the bottom of this unit. Be sure points of geese are facing the square.




Repeat steps above by sewing a square to both end of a large flying gees for the top row and repeat for the bottom row. Press seams toward square.

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Sew a flying geese to both sides of the square unit completed earlier. Press toward the square.



Sew one row to the top and one to the bottom of his unit.

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CAMEO QUILTERS GUILD BOARD MEETING

(Zoom) March 27, 2024

President Barb Lusk started the meeting at 7:02pm. All Board members were present.

April 2024 Guild meeting: Speaker Denise Olsen from Parma, MI. "My Journey as a Quilt Pattern Maker".

Cost: \$216.26 total; \$100 for lecture and \$116.26 for mileage. No overnight housing.

Denise has published 21 quilt patterns from her company "Far Flung Quilts" mostly sold at Marshall House Quilt Shop.

March National Sewing Day: 16 participants.

Quilt Show: Sharon Cratsenburg. Maggie Smith supplied a map of the prospective Lutheran church's layout. Board has concerns about size and lighting. Barb Lusk proposed that committee members see the site in person after the April Retreat. Right now, the space from this church would be free and there is ample parking. We may have to postpone the quilt show to the Spring of 2025. Secretary from the Troy United Methodist Church (where Great Lakes had its show) contacted Sharon. Price is negotiable; approximatley \$700-\$800 rental. No decision until the Lutheran church site is seen.

Raffle Quilt for Quilt Show - Jean Schlegelmann to organize a committee. (Kit donated to guild from Pat Baldauf is not available per Rosemary Spatafora.) Jean wants something bright and cheery.

Charity Paper Bag Challenge: Jean Schlegelmann, Linda Wallace are handling this. Judging to be done at May meeting using our racks and Barb's sheets. Barb Lusk is donating free edge-to-edge quilting of a quilt top up to twin size as a prize. Winner to supply backing and batting. Reminder to be in the Silhouette; Jean to write article.

Charity Underground Railroad Sew Along: Jean Schlegelmann, Linda Wallace hope to have finished quilts displayed at the quilt show. Deadline for completion is September 2024 for Show 'N Tell at Guild meeting. No prizes offered. Judy Murray is working on the diagrams for the last 2 blocks which will appear in the April 2024 *Silhouette*. Jean to write article including a listing of all the blocks by month and send to Laurie Johnson for the *Silhouette*.

Royal Oak Library display is still scheduled for October 2024; handled by Rosemary Spatafora.

Nominations & Elections: Louise McCormick-Glazer and Theresa Neilsen are collecting nominations. Sharon Cratsenburg will help Louise with this at the Spring Retreat.

Barb Lusk will run for President again. Cheryl Cawley will run for VP Facilitator. Lynda Draudt and Janeen Sharpe will not run for a Board position again. Sharon Cratsenburg will be organizing the Quilt Show. Bonnie Heintzel is term-limited for Membership but can run for another position. Laurie Johnson will serve as Recording Secretary only if no one else wants the position.

ZOOM: No volunteers to take over this responsibility during meetings. Barb Lusk will contact Clawson High School to get a current sophomore or junior to perform this job as a community service project. Our equipment also needs to be checked; Barb volunteered to get someone to do that. It was suggested that we ask Jan Recinos to rejoin the guild to take over Zoom. Barb will talk to her at Retreat. Possibly trade membership dues for Zoom duty?

Spring 2024 Retreat: Sharon Cratsenburg. 29 people signed up; there should be enough 8 foot tables for each person.

Board agreed with Sharon's suggestion that one additional ironing board be left at Bear Lake, leaving three at the church for workshops. All the irons need to be checked to see that they work.

Bonnie Heintzel to bring the nametags (and blanks for guests) to the retreat.

Louise McCormick-Glazer contacted the The Pincushion Quilt Hop in Imlay City. The shop does not offer discounts for retreat attendees but is donating a doorprize. Sharon Cratsenberg volunteered to pick this up. Article emailed for the Silhouette.

Membership: Bonny Heinzel. Bonny will take photos of newer members for the photo directory. Member roster completed as of January 2024 (without photos). Laurie to email to the guild. (done 3/27/24).

Membership form needs two additions: "Former/Current occupation" and "No Refunds on membership dues."

Scheduling for 2024-25: Cheryl Cawley has Linda Theofold under contract for May 2025 "On My Way to Baltimore." She needs to get Janet Steele and Teri Bartalan (Quilts of Valor lecture) to confirm.

It was suggested that we offer more Saturday sewing days to guild members. We currently pay \$175 rent for a Saturday session but do not want to charge guild members for a sewing day (if at all possible). We may need to move funds out of the money market account so we have more cash flow.
