

Scrap Zig Zag Block

This is the perfect block to learn hand piecing. It breaks down into 4 simple units that eases students into learning Mickey's roundabout technique which results in sharp points and tight fabric intersections.



New Exhibition at Tennessee State Museum Explores the Art and Story in Tennessee Quilts

If you're taking a trip down south and you find yourself anywhere near Nashville, Tennessee, be sure to stop at the new Tennessee State Museum for their latest exhibit, "Between the Layers: Art and Story in Tennessee Quilts". This exhibit is Tennessee State Museum's first new exhibition since the museum's grand opening in October, 2018.

Running through July 7, 2019, "Between the Layers..." features quilts selected from the Museum's vast collection of quilts from across more than two centuries and all three grand divisions of the state. The quilts on display highlight Tennessee's quilt artistry and the stories embedded in those quilts - private stories, economic or political stories, stories of changing tastes, and stories and emotions created by the quilts themselves.

The Tennessee State Museum is located on the corner of Rosa L. Parks Blvd. and Jefferson Street at Bicentennial Capitol Mall State Park. The Museum is free and open to the public Tuesdays, Wednesdays, Fridays and Saturdays from 10 a.m. - 5 p.m., Thursdays from 10 a.m. - 8 p.m. and Sundays from 1 p.m. - 5 p.m. For more information on exhibitions and events, please visit tnmuseum.org.

THE HENRY FORD FIELD TRIP

Seven CAMEO members and guests went to the Benson Ford Research Center at The Henry Ford on March 20 to learn about its quilt collection from the curator of Domestic Life, Jeanine Head Miller. The meeting took place under high security precautions, but we were treated to views of 16 quilts in their collection which number over 340. There were four quilts brought out for us to view at elbow level. There was no seating, so we stood and looked at the quilts up close! Then we were treated to the view of the shelved collection of Susana McCord, a quilter in Ohio in the 1880s.

One of the four quilts selected was from Alabama. The curator has developed a special bond with the people in the community of Alabama and she purchased one quilt. It is considered exemplary of the quilts we know as "Gee's Bend" quilts. Susana Allen Hunter's family was interviewed to understand the quilts she made and the life of this Alabama woman.

Another quilt was created for the bicentennial celebration and depicted many familiar scenes of the American Revolution. The first quilt was selected for its intricate geometric pattern as well as its precise hand piecing and quilting. The fourth quilt was an appliqued quilt with squares of different flowers, but all the squares used the same fabrics, with no two the same pattern.

All together, the field trip was very educational and the curator said that she had not done such a presentation before. It is my hope that in the future, this will be a field trip combined with a lunch at the cafeteria next door for more CAMEO members to enjoy!



Making the Triangle in a Square

1. Fold the 5" Background fabric strip in half right sides together. This step is essential for mirror image pieces. Layer cut (128) 2½" x 5" rectangles.




2. Layer cut pieces on one diagonal. Sort the triangles so they are right sides up.





3. Using the Triangle Ruler, cut (64) triangles from the 4" Medium fabric strips and (64) triangles from the 4" Dark fabric strips.



Accurately lining up the top of the Triangle Ruler with the strip is most critical.




4. Lay out the large Triangle with the base at the bottom. Position the Background triangles on both sides of the large Triangle. Make sure all fabrics are turned right side up.



5. Set the right stack aside.

6. Flip the large Triangle right sides together over the Background triangle. The left fabric extends beyond the large Triangle to create a tip at the flat top of the Triangle.

CAMEO Board Meeting March 28, 2019 Minutes

Meeting was held at the home of Linda Draudt. President Sharon Cratsenburg called the meeting to order at 7:00pm. All Board Members were present; Kathy Debien, Jan Recinos, Lynda Draudt, Ann Bonnelli, Kathy Wilson, Judy Murray, Darlene Baer, Pat Baldauf, Cheryl Cawley and Barbara Lusk.

February minutes were corrected to read, "Meeting was held at First Congregational Church of Royal Oak" and they were approved, signed, dated and placed on file.

President. Sharon Cratsenburg has received two free tickets to the Michigan International Women's Show in Novi on May 2-5, which she will give to the raffle table, she also has discounted tickets for anyone who might like to attend. Laurie Johnson, on speaker phone, discussed the pros and cons of the boost feature on Facebook. It costs \$1 per day, it draws attention to our activities as well as promoting other Guilds activities. It was concluded that it might be worthwhile to use it in September when our new program is out and when we are promoting the Quilt Show but not year-round. It was also suggested that we have a workshop on it and Facebook in September. Cameo was featured in a Detroit News article, March 22 and as a result Sharon had received several calls. Nominations for Board will be sought soon. Most of the current Board is eligible for re-election.

VP Membership. Lynda Draudt discussed plans for a New Members Tea and whether to have it as we only had two new members. There was discussion about having a Tea in September featuring New Members and Founding Members with their First Quilts. Decided in the interim to send out welcome letters to all who joined and to all guests inviting them to join.

Cheryl Cawley. Lori Miller rescheduled workshop went well. There was no difficulty or conflict with those participating in National Quilting Day. Still need to promote Mickey DePre's workshops April 27, there are only 4 registrations.

VP Scheduler. Jan Recinos the third Thursday, May 21 2020 leads into Memorial Weekend, we will need to change dates to accommodate a workshop. April program is planned to be on embellishments and Detroit Modern Quilt Guild would like to co-sponsor the workshop.

The Field Trip to Henry Ford Museum took place March 20 and participants were delighted with the event and the knowledge of the curator. Ten people had signed up for the event but only 5 members and 2 guests showed up. It had discussed that at least 15 Guild members needed to sign up for the Guild to underwrite the \$200 cost. Board Members were split in their opinions, some felt we should do more fun things and it was open to all members, others that it was too costly for so few members to have gone. It was determined that in future all excursions should be treated like workshops and be mostly self-funded.

Donna Brokenshire had made some suggestions for 25th Anniversary activities; to make some quilts with cameos, to organize a Shop Hop, to design and make a Block of the Month Sampler Quilt, to have a Founders Meeting & Trunk Show in May 2020.

Retreat. Pat Baldauf reported that there are 43 people signed up for the Retreat at Colombiere, April 11-14. Everything is in one building, albeit on several floors, there is good lighting and excellent parking. The facility costs take up most of the fees paid so, there will be few if any extras, last years evaluations indicated that the Members did not think these things were necessary.

Members-at-Large

Judy Murray. \$40 raised this month at the Library Book sell-off. Unfortunately some people are placing bids but then forgetting to pay for it and pick it up.

Some Board Members would like to meet at one centrally located venue rather than rotate Members homes. Judy checked her church and the fee would be \$50 per month. Barbara Lusk will check with her church.

Sharon has received an offer of interior design fabric samples. She will put it in the Newsletter for anyone interested to pursue.





Chicago International Quilt Show

The Chicago Show at the Stephens Convention Center was massive. There were 500 quilts and a multitude of vendors in the Stephens Convention Center located near O'Hare airport. There were quilts from Australia to Japan, from Texas to Michigan. Edita Sytar had a section to herself of blue quilts. There was a challenge of quilts to take on ecological challenges. There was a section of quilts dealing with political issues. The title of the show was a "Celebration of Color" so the galleries were arranged into rainbow quilts, quilts of a particular artist in a certain color, BOM quilts or samplers with different color ways and several Baltimore Album quilts. Several of the quilts were featured in the Quilting Arts Magazine April/May issue. As always for a quilt show, the offerings were varied and similar. The lighting of the venue left several quilts in the dark, but I went with a quilting friend and a newcomer, so in the long run, I think quilting was appreciated by all those in attendance.

At the March trunk show, presenter Jan Jacobs told of her philosophy of quilt collecting and preservation. She had many examples of quilts she has acquired over the years and of her philosophy about collecting and displaying quilts. Jan has come by quilts from barns, garage sales and other sources. She collects to preserve the beauty and show the history of the mostly womanly art of creating quilts. Some of her prizes were stored in shabby circumstances, but with her care, the pieces can be shown to be examples of techniques and patterns which we can learn from.


In her opinion, our own quilts should be displayed, but with a caution to the damage which can be caused by direct natural light and the manner in which they are displayed. Refolding displayed quilts will keep them from acquiring permanent creases. She recommends using fabric (sheets) between wood and cardboard to prevent discoloration. She advocates aeration of storage used for quilts, to prevent bugs and mold or mildew from deteriorating quilts.

This speaker told a cautionary tale about the need to tell our heirs the value of their heirlooms. We need to label quilts and talk about them as well. The next generation will not necessarily discern the value of the gifts they are given or left in estates. So, be sure to label and talk about about your creations!
