



CONTACT TINA RINK IF YOU HAVE ANY QUESTIONS

Making the Block Center and Cornerstones

- 1. With right sides together, pair the Medium 4-1/2" squares with the Dark 4-1/2" squares. Draw a diagonal line on the wrong side.
- 2. Sew 1/4" from both sides of the drawn line. Set the seams.
- 3. Cut on both diagonals. Press seams towards the Dark.
- 4. Sort and stack the identical pieces into four equal parts.
- 5. With right sides together, sew pairs so the seams lock.
- 6. At the center seam, clip the connecting thread. Remove the two or three straight stitches at the center on both sides with a stiletto or seam ripper.
- 7. Open the center seams and push flat to form a four-patch.
- 8. Press seams so they rotate in the same direction around the block.
- 9. Square patches to 3-1/4". Set (20) patches aside for the Cornerstones.

CAMEO Board Meeting Minutes February 28, 2019 Clawson United Methodist Church

Meeting was held at First United Methodist Church. President Sharon Cratsenburg called the meeting to order at 7:15pm. Present were Jan Recinos, Lynda Draudt, Cheryl Cawley, Pat Baldauf, Barb Lusk, Kathy Debien, Darlene Baer and Judy Murray.

Quilt Show: Pat Baldauf shared a sample of the fabrics and a photo of one of the Raffle Quilts being made. The 1930s Raffle Quilt photo was also shared. Sharon Cratsenburg reported that the Quilt Show dates will be May 28 for set-up, and May 29 and May 30, 2020 for show days. To be held at Madison Place. No decisions yet on the type of displays.

Retreat: Pat Baldauf reported that all is under control, 41 participants are going (as of this date). We can arrive after 2:00pm Thursday and leave around 3:00pm on Sunday. Wine is allowed.

VP Membership: Lynda Draudt stated that we have 53 members.

VP Facilities: Cheryl Cawley reported that the make-up workshop with Lori Miller will be held on National Quilting Day, March 23. There was a discussion about separating the two groups. We will try room dividers.

VP Scheduler: Jan Recinos reported that 12 people signed up for the Henry Ford Field Trip. A May 2020 workshop may be a problem as it falls on Memorial Day weekend during the quilt show activities.

Jan suggested we pay \$30 to boost our image on Facebook. Darlene so moved, Lynda seconded, motion passed. "Meet-Ups" site was also discussed. Jan is to contact Laurie Johnson & Janeen Sharpe regarding the boost to Facebook. If all three are in agreement, then they can proceed to upgrade.

Treasurer: Pat Baldauf gave the financial report. Barb Lusk, assitant treasurer, reported that all was in order.

Members-at-Large: Darlene Baer wanted to say that the Charity Day committee worked very well together and the day was a success. Approximately 65 receiving blankets, 24 grieving envelopes and 70 pillowcases were finished. Kathy Wilson sent a message that Door Proze participation was low. T-shirt/memory quilting business for sale. Established in 2008, we create over 200 quilts each year producing \$39,000-\$57,000 (high and low in the last 4 years) in sales per year. This is a business that can be operated from your home or small studio. If you are creative and have basic sewing skills (straight stitching and zigzag) you can learn this business. The operation of the long arm quilter is easy to learn.

We have developed a very exact system for creating these quilts. We follow the same procedure from preparing the clothing then cutting and design. No matter the size of the quilt the system is the same. This is how we can produce over 200 high quality quilts very efficiently. We have been featured on local tv stations and local publications. A good portion of the business is returning clients and referrals. Equipment, our method and client base and facebook page all included. Asking \$50,000. Local Gee's Bend Quilt Collection

In February at Madonna University, a local quilt collector, Jan Dollard, exhibited her collection of quilts from Gee's Bend, Alabama [pronounced: Jees Bend]. Several CAM-EO members went to the exhibit and Henya Rachmiel's photos are included here. Gee's Bend is called an isolated community and their oral history recalls times back to the slave ships which brought their ancestors to this Alabama River region and the Pettway Plantation. The quilts in the collection have been purchased by Ms. Dollard since the 1980s on regular trips to visit the quilters over the last 35 years. The president of the university invited her to hang them in the library building. Most were hand quilted and were pieced from upcycled cloth or purchased cloth. A selection of mini quilts was also included.

Ms. Dollard's quilts were an interesting choice of art to exhibit for African American History Month, but didn't seem to attract the attention of the students going to the library on the Sunday we were there. I think the value of that exhibit was to remind those who don't make goods for their homes, that there are people who still do. I hope our own quilting raises awareness of those around us, who see what we do, of the social aspects of quiltmaking beyond just its use as crafting bedding. Quilting circles have historically been a place where women have gathered to share the stories of their lives while also creating household necessities and the joy of that social activity seems to be getting lost these days.


