### Keynote Speaker -- Danelle Crawford McKinney

Danelle is the first Dakota Sisseton-Wahpeton Dakota Oyate [pronounced oh-YAH-tay] woman ordained in the Presbyterian Church, (USA). Growing up in the non-geographic Presbytery of Dakota, her Native American culture plays an integral role in current social issues facing many American Indigenous people, in particularly Native American Christian young people. Danelle and her husband Ron have spent many years learning cultural traditions, values and customs in order to "bridge the language gap" between what they call mainstream Christianity and Native American spirituality. Danelle is currently working as a Student Rights Specialist at Haskell Indian Nations University and lives with her husband in Lawrence, KS.



**DIRECTIONS:** First Presbyterian is bounded by Walnut and Chestnut Streets on the north and south, US73/K7/K92 on the east and 5th Street on the west. There is on-street parking on Walnut, Chestnut and 5th Street. Parking is also available by the County Courthouse in the south lot at the northeast corner of 4th and Walnut across from the church. Handicapped parking is available in the church lot.

From the south on US73/K7 turn left at Spruce (K92) and right on 5th street. To access the church parking lot, take the one-way alley between the Methodist Church and the Carnegie Building. Traveling from the north turn right on Walnut then left on 5th and left into the alley.

Dear Friends,

In the midst of the warm temperatures last week, I opened our front door early in the morning and was stunned to hear a multitude of birds singing at sunrise. I had not heard that incredible music for what seemed like an eternity. The hymn, "Morning Has Broken," by Eleanor Farjeon, immediately came into my mind. 
Easter isn't just a Sunday — it's a *season*. One day out of 365 is hardly sufficient to celebrate the great mystery of our faith — that Jesus Christ is risen from the dead. Accordingly, the season of Easter lasts seven weeks (a "week of weeks"), spanning the 50 days from the Sunday of the Resurrection to Pentecost Sunday and encompassing the festival of the Ascension of the Lord.

The Season of Easter is intended to be a joyful time for celebrating the presence of the risen Christ in the church. We move from 40 days of prayer to 50 days of play! In 325 CE, the Council of Nicaea decreed that fasting and kneeling were to be forbidden during the 50 days of Easter. *Easter* is about new life, new beginning, new joy! We are to do something with our lives that is as unexpected as an



empty tomb. We are to take hold of our days and let the Spirit move within us with a dance of life. We are to live, laugh, dance, play.

Of course, Easter really isn't just a *season* either. In the fullest sense, Easter is a new way of life — in which we are "dead to sin and alive to God in Christ Jesus" (Rom. 6:11), called to "walk in newness of life" (Rom. 6:4). Every year, for fifty days, the church celebrates and rehearses this new way of life in the Season of Easter. *Presbyterian Mission Agency*


By his passion and death and everything which he did and endured for our sake by his coming in the flesh, our Lord reconciled all the faithful to the heavenly Father, made explation for sins, disarmed death, overcame damnation and hell, and by his resurrection from the dead brought

again and restored life and immortality. For he is our righteousness, life and resurrection, in a word, the fullness and perfection of all the faithful, salvation and all sufficiency. Second Helvetic Confession, 5.076

In the death of Jesus Christ God's way in the world seemed finally defeated. But death was no match for God. The resurrection of Jesus was God's victory over death.

Death often seems to prove that life is not worth living, that our best efforts and deepest affections go for nothing. We do not yet see the end of death. But Christ has been raised from the dead, transformed and yet the same person.

In his resurrection is the promise of ours. We are convinced that the life God wills for each of us is stronger than the death that destroys



us. The glory of that life exceeds our imagination but we know we shall be with Christ. So, we treat death as a broken power. Its ultimate defeat is certain. In the face of death, we grieve. Yet in hope we celebrate life. No life ends so tragically that its meaning and value are destroyed. Nothing, not even death, can separate us from the love of God in Jesus Christ our Lord.
