Greetings All,

It is hard to believe that we are now entering the holiday season. It almost seems like the seasons are sneaking up on us. And as the days grow shorter and the season seems to pull us in a hundred different directions, it may be easy to find ourselves going down dark paths of depression and despair. That's when we need to refocus our hope on the joyous birth, life and teachings of our Lord, Jesus.


There are some scholars that dispute the date of Jesus birth. According to the History Channel's website, "The Bible doesn't mention his exact birthday, and the Nativity story contains conflicting clues. For instance, the presence of shepherds and their sheep suggest a spring birth. When church officials settled on December 25 at the end of the third century, they likely wanted the date to co-incide with existing pagan festivals honoring Saturn (the Roman god of agriculture) and Mithra (the Persian god of light). That way, it became easier to convince Rome's pagan subjects to accept Christianity as the empire's official religion."

It's too bad that there are some who get so tied up in discussions about details such as this one that we forget what is really important. It's not important to get the date correct; instead, it is important to get Jesus correct and to let Jesus fully into our hearts while giving him our lives and all that is bringing us down. Not only is Jesus one of the endless number of gifts God has given us, when we are truly able to remember the joy that his birth represents, we can find joy in the darkest of times. As 2 Corinthians 4:16-18 and as Eugene Peterson translated it so well, "So we're not giving up. How could we! Even though on the outside it often looks like things are falling apart on us, on the inside, where God is making new life, not a day goes by without his unfolding grace. These hard times are small potatoes compared to the coming good times, the lavish celebration prepared for us. There's far more here than meets the eye. The things we see now are here today, gone tomorrow. But the things we can't see now will last forever." (MSG) Although it is often easier said than done, we must not give in to the down-times, we must instead hold on tight to the hope that Jesus has given us through his birth, life, death and resurrection. And, as we enter a new year in the church calendar with the beginning of Advent and as the daylight gets shorter, remember that the light of Christ will forever shine bright.

Remembering what Advent is all about should help us to better focus on the light of Christ. According to the Book of Common Worship, ""Advent" means coming or arrival. This word has a double significance, as in Advent we celebrate Christ's coming into the world and look with longing for his coming again. The season of Advent begins with an emphasis on final things (eschatology). We watch and pray with expectant hope for the establishment of God's justice and the return of the Prince of Peace. As the weeks of Advent progress, the focus shifts to thanks and praise for the birth of the one who has already come—Jesus Christ our Savior.

The origin of the season of Advent is uncertain. It may have been patterned after the season of Lent as a period of penitence before Christmas, or as a time of preparation for baptism at Epiphany. The duration of Advent was, in some times and places, as long as six or seven weeks." Our season of Advent four weeks, ending on Christmas Eve with the lighting of the Christ Candle. Regardless of when or why we started celebrating Advent, it is truly a time of hope, peace, joy and love as we look forward with great anticipation to Christ's full reign over all of God's creation. As I continue to get settled in being your new pastor, I look forward to continuing to know each of you better and to you all continuing to get to know me better. I am excited about what God has in store for each of the churches and New Hope Parish as a whole. As long as we keep focused on God and God's path and sharing God's Good News through word and deed, the future is bright. As always, if you've any ideas for me or for the rest of our church family, please don't hesitate to let me know. For hundreds of years, Christians have used an Advent wreath to inspire their hopes for the coming

of Christ. By lighting candles and reading Bible verses, we are reminded about the meaning of Christ's birth and become more excited about his coming in the past, in the future, and in our own lives.

Made from evergreens, the circular wreaths symbolize eternal life and the endless nature of God's love. During each Sunday of the Advent season, we focus on one of the four virtues Jesus brings us: Hope, Peace, Love and Joy. The Christ candle is lit on Christmas Eve reminding Christians that Jesus is the light of the world.
