

The winning orchid of First Division was Dendrobium Aridana Blue grown by Michael Gray.



SEED CAPSULE MATURITY

Estimating the ripening time of a seed capsule is a difficult task. Many an amateur and professional hybridizers have had the disappointment of finding the seed capsule of that desired cross split and its contents scattered to the wind.

There are many factors that come into play regarding the ripening of a seed capsule e.g. time of the year, weather conditions during maturation of the capsule, the fertility of a cross etc.

After fertilization, seed development can be gauged by the swelling and ripening of the developing seed capsule which may take a few weeks or occasionally as long as a year or more, depending on the genus. As a seed capsule ripens it changes colour from green to yellow or brown then splits to release the seed into the air. It is recommended that when the seed capsule begins to yellow at one end, it is ripe for harvesting and sending to the seed bank.

If you are unsure of how much time is left before the capsule will split, try tying tissue paper or an empty tea bag over the capsule a few weeks beforehand and examine it from day to day.

Below is a list of the expected time for ripening of seed capsules. This is an *approximate guide only* and may be of assistance to new growers.

Orchid Culture Notes for June

June marks the beginning of winter yet by month end we have our days lengthening out again. June typically sees the first of the frosts in Adelaide. The air tends to be a bit drier at times, and calm clear nights provide the perfect conditions for frost to settle. Fortunately severe frosts in suburbia are rare and most shade houses do provide sufficient protection. By July and August the wind picks up and rain tends to keep frost away, not saying we don't get them. On the subject of cover we should all have at least some additional protection for our more tender orchids. Rain, hail, the wind and just the plain cold all have a detrimental effect on our plants. The colder it is the drier our plants must be to cope. It is best to water only when it is fine and preferably mid morning on a rising temperature with the plan to have all the plants leaves dry by nightfall. Plants in shade houses generally get enough moisture with the natural rainfall anyway. Cover can be as easy as a sheet of plastic or solaweave over a section of your enclosure or placing plants under a sheltered veranda. Use clear plastic as light levels must be as high as possible this time of year. If you are starting to build a new enclosure try to have the minimum amount of shade possible. You can always add shade but you cannot take it away if your roof cover is too shady to start with. Ensure all pots are secured to cope with the winds of winter. Move smaller plants and seedlings to a protected area if you can. Seedlings especially cannot handle the extreme conditions as well as mature plants. The same applies to recently divided plants.

Watering will now be quite infrequent. Cymbidiums, Zygopetalums and Sarcochilus are happy enough to receive normal winter rain. If you grow them under cover then water when they need it. Keep up a regular feeding programme to your Sarcochilus as this their growing season and shortly spikes will show. Also feed up your Zygopetalums as well using a fertiliser with a higher nitrogen component. With many finishing flowering we need to build up those new growths for next season. Many of my orchids are now resting. In particular it's my Cattleyas, Laelias and Ocidiums. There are orchids within this group that will continue to grow through winter as well and these are treated accordingly. I separate them from the resting ones.

Terrestrials are mostly in full growth now and the numbers of flowering plants will begin to increase on the show bench towards the end of the month. Keep an eye out for fungal diseases, caterpillars and water dripping from above eroding your pots. 50% shade is OK to grow most terrestrials but if you have any Diuris then try and give them some full sun. They will reward you for it.

Winter usually means standard shaped Paphiopedilums will start flowering. This is a critical time watering wise as any water that lodges near the embryo flower can cause the whole flower to collapse and rot and that's it until next year. It is wise to give them cover and water by standing the pot in water and let the pot soak it up. That or water the pot, not the plants leaves.

In winter only feed those orchids that appear in active growth. Developing leaves and green root tips are always good indicators of a plant still on the move. When you do feed keep in mind their metabolism has slowed down with the cold and they won't take up as much as they do in the warmer months.

Make it a habit to inspect at least a third of your pots every month. That way they all get picked up at least three times a year. You can then inspect the plant more carefully. Check the undersides of leaves that may harbour a small colony of soft scale or mealy bugs. Feel the weight of the pot. Is it light?

Despite your best intentions regarding watering the fact is that big cymbidium next to it has hogged all the water and hardly any has reached the one you are holding. Occasionally a grower will forget about a plant for ages and then just before a show see it poking its head up and take it in. Of course it wins the show which goes to prove that maybe some plants will only grow good if you forget about them. We all tend to over care for our plants. I've seen a Dendrobium speciosum growing on rocks in full sun most of the day with not a tree within 100 yards. And the rocks were hot to touch and that was April so what extremes does this plant experience in midsummer! It was perfectly healthy with no signs of scorching.

Flowering wise will see more and more cymbidiums gracing the show bench. Continue to train your spikes and leave any manipulation of the spikes to the warmer part of the day when they are supple. Several adjustments may be required before they are ready to show. Native epiphytes will still mostly be showing growth nodes with some having small spikes poking through. Some cover is good for natives as the immature new spikes are very prone to rotting off or experiencing bud drop if kept wet. The cover will also stop them getting too waterlogged when the rains set in.

Be vigilant with the blue snail pellets from now. Any plant in spike should have a few sprinkled on the surface as a precaution. Also watch out for little green looper caterpillars on those orchids with broad and soft leaves and my favourite woolly bears will soon be on the march. The initial hatch can see up to 50 of the little buggers chewing away at a new growth or spike. One day is all they need. The onset of the cold will drive rats and mice into the protection of our orchid houses. Look out for signs of chewed canes, spikes and the odd dropping. If you had issues with them last year, don't wait till they cause damage this year. Get them before they get the plants.

Winter time is now the time to start weeding pots. Oxalis once established is very hard to pull out yet very easy at the 2 leaf stage. Thistles and milkweed are a little easier. Thistles attract aphids and we don't need that. That's it for June. Basically reduce watering, increase light and provide cover and keep warm!!

COMPANION PLANTS FOR CYMBIDIUMS by Brian Milligan

After a few years, new orchid growers generally begin to seek other genera to broaden the variety and flowering season of their collections. There are many possibilities, especially if the cymbidiums are being grown in a shadehouse fitted with a fibreglass or polycarbonate roof, which protects the plants from mild frosts and allows control over the amount of water that the plants receive, regardless of weather. Those with a shadehouse without a solid roof can still provide their plants with protection from frost and frequent rain by fitting a temporary cover of plastic sheeting, such as Solarweave®, in winter.

If you simply intend to fill in the spaces between your cymbidium pots with companion plants, think again. Cramming the plants together causes overshading of one plant by its neighbours, and the resulting reduction in air movement produces ideal conditions for the development and spread of spider mite (red spider) and scale infestations. If you cannot insert a pot (of the same size) between each of your cymbidium pots, then you don't need any companion plants, you need another shadehouse!

Zygopetalums are often the first choice. These South American species and their hybrids have mature plants of similar size to cymbidiums and often flower twice each year, once in autumn and then again in spring. The flowers are usually characterised by attractive purple or purplish blue labellums and a delightful fragrance. Mostly the petals and sepals (collectively known as tepals) are green with brown bars but there are albino forms where the darker colouration is reduced or absent. Zygopetalums most commonly grown are the species *Zygopetalum maculatum* (Syn. *Z. intermedium*) and hybrids such as *Z.* B.G. White, *Z.* John Banks, *Z.* Titanic, *Z.* Blue Eyes, and the intergeneric hybrid *Zygopabstia* Elfin Jade. Sometimes the foliage of zygopetalum plants suffer from unsightly spotting, which is generally attributed to cold, wet conditions during winter. By providing better air circulation and ensuring that the foliage is dry by nightfall, this spotting can be reduced.

Pleiones may also be grown with cymbidiums, although their pots will have to be moved to a sheltered spot during the dormant season (winter) and ensuing flowering season (early spring). Pleione bulbs are best kept dry during winter and the flowers last much longer if kept dry when watering the plants in spring. But for the rest of the year they may be grown as companion plants for cymbidiums. Various cultivars of *Pleione formosana* with mauve, pink and white flowers are readily available and hybrids such as *Pln*. Versailles, *Pln*. Tongariro, *Pln*. Alishan etc. with pink, even purplish, flowers sometimes appear on the sales bench at flowering time. Hybrids with yellow flowers (e.g. *Pln*. Shantung) are still expensive.

Lycaste hybrids, particularly those bred from *Lycaste skinneri*, also grow and flower well together with cymbidiums, and benefit from a similar routine of watering and fertilising (frequent in summer, much less in winter). Well-grown hybrids may have plants as large as or larger than those of standard cymbidiums.





I suspend many different orchids in pot hangers from the roof of my cymbidium shadehouse but you must consider the consequences for the plants below. If plants can be hung above the walkways they can do little harm beyond the occasional bumped head (if hung too low). But when hung above the cymbidiums they may unduly shade the plants below, damage tall flowering spikes and perhaps transfer fungal infections via water dripping on the plants below.

Orchids that do well for me suspended below the shadehouse roof include Stanhopea nigroviolacea, Laelia anceps, Laelia gouldiana, Maxillaria porphyrostele, Arpophyllum spicatum and many oncidiums. Last but not least are a large number of Australian native dendrobiums, which seem to grow so much better when their pots are suspended rather than placed on a bench. So go ahead and expand your orchid collection – it's the best way to broaden the appeal of our great hobby.

THE LOST CATTLEYA by Brian Milligan

[Editorial corrections made to update the article]

Do you grow Laeliocattleya Mini Purple, Sophrolaeliocattleya Hazel Boyd or Sophrolaelia Jinn? Not any more, I'm afraid. Look them up on the Royal Horticultural Society web site (www.rhs.org.uk/research/registration_orchids.asp) and you'll find that they have dis-appeared! Actually they're still there but listed elsewhere under new names, which can be difficult to find.

What has happened to Laeliocattleya (Lc.) Mini Purple, which was originally registered (in 1965) as the hybrid between Laelia pumila and Cattleya walkeriana? Well, a few years ago Laelia pumila, as well as all the other Brazilian "laelia" species, were transferred to the genus Sophronitis because DNA studies showed that they were much more closely related to existing Sophronitis species than to those Laelia species from Mexico. Subsequently the genus Sophronitis has been included as synonymous with the genus Cattleya. The above hybrid is therefore no longer a laeliocattleya but has become a cattleya, to be known henceforth as Cattleya (C.) Mini Purple. The same change applies to all other hybrids between cattleyas and Brazilian 'laelias'.

Before you race out to change all your labels from *Lc.* to *C.,* I should stress that not all *Laelia* species have been transferred to the genus *Cattleya* – only those from Brazil! Those laelias native to Mexico remain as such and therefore the hybrid between *Laelia anceps* (a Mexican species) and *Cattleya coccinea* retains its original name, namely, *Laeliocattleya* Camargo.

Other name changes have been made to accommodate the new genus Guarianthe, to which several "cattleya" species from Central America have been moved on the basis of other DNA studies. bowringiana Cattleya is now Guarianthe bowringiana, while the former Cattleya aurantiaca and Cattleya skinneri are now Guarianthe aurantiaca and *Guarianthe skinneri*, respectively. Intergeneric hybrids between Cattleya and Guarianthe have been given the new genus name Cattlianthe. As a consequence the old Cattleya Bactia becomes Cattlianthe Bactia (Guarianthe bowringiana Cattleya guttata).

So, what has happened to our old friend *Sophrolaeliocattleya* (*Sic*) Hazel Boyd? It's now listed as *Cattlianthe* Hazel Boyd. Similarly, *Sic*. Jewel Box has become *Cattlianthe* Jewel Box. Both are hybrids between species (or hybrids) containing *Guarianthe* and *Cattleya*, with *Sophronitis* now being a synonym of *Cattleya*.

A few other favourites with new names are *Cattlianthe* Chit Chat (formerly *Lc.* Chit Chat), *Cattlianthe* Trick or Treat (formerly *Lc.* Trick or Treat) and *Cattlianthe* Amaroo (formally *Lc.* Amaroo).

What about that colourful hybrid made from Laelia milleri and Sophronitis coccinea, and long known as Sophrolaelia (SI.) Jinn? The bright red Brazilian species, Laelia milleri, is now known as Cattlya milleri, and Sophronitis coccinea is now Cattleya coccinea and consequently SI. Jinn becomes Cattleya Jinn.

Although most older cattleya growers are likely to ignore these name changes, new growers will gradually adopt them, which unfortunately will require the judges to have both old and new names at their fingertips! It's enough to make me trade my cattleyas in on a few new cymbidiums! Heaven help us all if someone decides to split up the genus Cymbidium.
