Letter from Pastor Kris

"We will tell to the coming generation the glorious deeds of the Lord, and his might, and the wonders that he has done." – Psalm 78:4b

As August draws to a close a new year of small group and educational ministries begins again for us here at Grace. You've heard us announce the various opportunities to grow deeper in our relationships with Christ and with one another as we delve into the scriptures and grow more and more together in faith to which we've been called.

Sunday Mornings

- **-Team 784** with Pastor Carleton has become a much loved class offering an overview of the biblical narrative from creation to the early church. Each year different parts of the most important events and periods are covered. This class is for anyone from 3rd grade to 90+.
- **-Kingdom Kids** with Pastor Kris is a new class being offered on account of the growing number of younger children in the congregation. This class will also cover the big stories of the Bible but is aimed at children up to 2nd grade, their parents, and anyone who would like to be a kid again and be energized from the excess energy and life these little ones have to offer.

Why Intergenerational Ministries?

- 1. It's biblical. In Deuteronomy 6:4-9 God commands the whole of Israel not just the priests to teach His word to the children and talk about his word at home and on the way and when lying down and rising up, etc. Then, in Matthew 19 (cf. Mark 10, Luke18), as Jesus was talking to his disciples people started bringing their children to him, and the disciples (aka the adults) spoke sternly to the people; but Jesus said to them, "Let the little children come to me, and do not stop them; for it is to such as these that the kingdom of heaven belongs." And again St. Paul writes, "There is **one** body and **one** Spirit, just as you were called to the **one** hope of your calling, **one** Lord, **one** faith, **one** baptism, **one** God and Father <u>of all</u>, who is <u>above all</u> and <u>through all</u> and <u>in all</u>" (Eph.4:4-6).
- 2. Galatians 1:2 and 1 Peter 2:17 refers to the church as "the family of God." What kind of family are we if everyone stays in their own generational corners and doesn't interact with each other? Think about what we miss out on: children are deprived of the wisdom and stories of grandparents as well as the direction and encouragement of parents; grandparents miss seeing the resourcefulness of parents as well as the energy and youthfulness of children. It's amazing to watch the transformation that happens to the residents at an assisted living home when you bring in a group of kids to sing Christmas carols. Every generation has something unique to offer the others, intergenerational ministries offer a forum for such an exchange of gifts.
- 3. Those kids who feel not only seen, but actually known in a congregation are the kids who are most likely to stick with church for the long-haul. Intergenerational ministry is an investment into the long-term health and vitality of the faith we're passing along to our kids. Think about who the most important influences have been in your faith life: a pastor, sure; parents, that's of utmost importance; a Sunday School teacher, definitely; the adult who otherwise had no formal responsibilities toward you, but made you feel important by greeting you by name every Sunday, absolutely.

A Snapshot of the NALC National Gathering & Sneak Peek of the Upcoming LCMC Gathering

August 6-8 I traveled to Pittsburgh for the bi-annual in-person gathering of the North American Lutheran Church (NALC)¹ which met under the theme of Hebrews 12: 1-2. It was a great time as the NALC celebrated its 15th anniversary as a church body and the 10th anniversary of its seminary, which is housed at Trinity Anglican Seminary in Ambridge, PA, just twenty to thirty minutes west of Pittsburgh. The gathering was a refreshing time of worship, devotions, catching up with long-time colleagues/friends and making new friends (I very much enjoyed meeting and getting acquainted with the senior pastor at Christ Lutheran, Santa Clarita which is the closest LCMC/NALC congregation to us).

The business side of the gathering had two primary focuses before the delegates at this year's gathering. One of those focuses is on where the NALC is heading and how to get there; to this end the NALC unveiled its new website with a host of available resources on such topics as discipleship, stewardship, leadership training, and tools for equipping church councils (I look forward to making good use of this page). Additionally, a lot of time and focus is being given to new and emerging models in church planting. As a side note, since Grace joined the NALC in May, 40 additional congregations have joined the NALC, the most recent of which is Westchester Lutheran Church and School located just blocks away from LAX. The second area of focus for the business side of the gathering was more structural, working through the "growing pains" of a growing church body. This included some re-organizing of the constitution, adding an article that more clearly defines the relationship of our seminary to the NALC and giving the seminary clearer guidelines for its work, the addition of an indemnification article, and lastly the creation of bylaws.




