Letter from Pastor Kris

And the star-spangled banner in triumph shall wave
O'er the land of the free and the home of the brave!

At the writing of The Star Spangled Banner in September of 1814, the very young United States was in the second year of a two and a half year war with then world superpower, Great Britain (it was the war of 1812). Francis Scott Key had gone on board a British navy vessel to discuss the release of a beloved town physician. While on board he became privy to a particular British attack on Fort McHenry in Baltimore and, consequently, was held captive until this attack had been carried out. It was while being held captive on this British vessel that Key wrote what more than a century later would become our national anthem, The Star Spangled Banner.

There was still six months of war to be fought, yet in this fourth verse of The Star Spangled Banner, Key recognizes and names God's activity in the midst of the chaos around him; Key has the boldness to call his country a "heaven rescued land" and to call for "praise (to) the Power that hath made and preserved us a nation." In the midst of war, in the midst of havoc and chaos, Key is bold to say that God is still at work here and that it is He who guards and protects us by calling up and empowering brave men and women to take up a cause which is far higher than any one person or life.

It is interesting how even in times of deepest darkness and turmoil that previous generations were able to maintain hope and to see the light of God shining forth. Interestingly, the psalms of lament also have this characteristic to them, by the end of most such psalms the lamenter comes around not necessarily to a point of praise and thanksgiving, but to remembering the faithfulness of God and speaking it into the darkness... keeping an eye ever focused on the Light regardless of how small or dim that light may at times seem to be, "Why are you downcast, O my soul? Why so disturbed within me? Put your hope in God, for I will yet praise Him, my Savior and my God" (Psalm 42:11)

I wonder in these times where there seems to be such an increase in domestic and global turmoil if our generation will, like generations before us, be bold to stand up and say that God is still with us, that He is still acting, that He is still our hope and our stay. I wonder if we have faith enough to continue to turn to God for every need and to be sustained by hope in Him – hope that those things that humanity intends for evil, God has the power to turn around for good (Gen. 50:20a).

I pray that this 4th of July we will be bold enough to sing and to proclaim this fourth verse of The Star Spangled Banner. I pray that this 4th of July we will be bold enough to pray and to sing the Doxology and to truly believe it, "Praise God from whom all blessings flow!..." We are indeed a blessed nation, may God continue to preserve and protect us in it. A happy and safe 4th of July to you all.



Open Hearth Trip to Hollywood Academy Museum of Motion Pictures


Thursday, July 24th, 9am-9pn

Christian Education Hour is on summer break till September 7th






