

Letter from Pastor Kris

The bells of Christmas chime once more. The Heav'nly Guest is at the door. He comes to humble dwellings still with new year gifts of peace, good will.

Okay, okay, the Heav'nly guest is no longer "at the door," he has indeed already entered; Advent is (in a manner of speaking) "behind us" and the Babe of Bethlehem is born. But I like the way in which this hymn writer has connected the Advent of Christ with the New Year and so between that and the fact that there are twelve days of Christmas (Epiphany being January 6) means it's still Christmas time as most of you are reading this, I trust you'll indulge me in the use of a Christmas hymn even though December 25 is in the rear-view mirror.

This old Danish hymn has a special place in my heart. I remember not only singing this hymn in church each year at Christmas, but also I remember being at my paternal grandmother's house, candles lit on the tree (yes, I said candles... real candles, not the battery operated type, clipped *on* the tree and lit), dancing around the tree with my dad, grandma, and aunt singing this hymn in Danish, "Det kimmer nu til Julefest..."

(Scene Change) Part of the bedtime routine in our house includes Jenn saying the bedtime prayer, "Now I lay me down to sleep...", singing the Lord's Prayer to a kid-friendly tune, followed by, "You Are my Sunshine"... this is an unchanging liturgy. On my part, I select two to three verses of a hymn which changes with the changing seasons of the church year (by the way: they get very excited when they hear their hymn sung in church).

This Advent/Christmas season "The Bells of Christmas" is Alyssa's bedtime hymn. This has afforded me an opportunity to reflect on this hymn and, in doing so, I had an epiphany (not to prematurely throw ourselves forward into the next season of the church year). I've always associated the "New Year gifts" of this hymn with the flip of the calendar (ex. 2024 moving into 2025) which may well be what the hymn writer intended by this line. My epiphany was this: when the angels brought their tidings of peace and goodwill to the shepherds that first Christmas night, their tidings weren't about the "New Year" per se* but the new age/eon/time ushered in with the birth of Christ and hence the beginning of the age/eon/time of the gospel and the "end of (the age/eon/ time of) the Law for all who believe" (Rom.10:4). Even as we flip the calendar from December to January - the old year to the new year - the birth of Christ means the end of the age of the Law's condemnation and the beginning of the Gospel's age of peace with God through Jesus Christ. This is the new year/new age/new eon greeting proclaimed by the holy angels in Luke 2 and gifts which come with the Babe of Bethlehem.

As we once again close out and say goodbye to an old year, may we step into the new year with the all the grace and peace of our Lord, Jesus Christ. May 2025 be for you a year of grace and peace: *Anno Domini* (the year of the Lord [and his gospel reign]). And not just in 2025, but may you always be knowing God *for you* and not against you. Then the peace and good will proclaimed by the angels which the Christ Child actually gifts you and Christmas bells themselves harken us back to, will be yours.



TWELFTH NIGHT CELEBRATION


January 5th, 7pm in the Sanctuary

Limbo Young Adult Life group meets Mondays at 6:30 p.m. at the Smee's home.




