Pentecost Sunday May 19, 2024

When the day of Pentecost had come, they were all together in one place. Letter from Pastor Kris

"Now faith is the assurance of things **hoped for**, the conviction of things not seen."
- Hebrews 11:1

The concept of hope is something that seems to make its way around to me more and more of late. It most recently came around again in an ad I saw on tv... the driving line of which is, "Don't underestimate the power of hope." I am also regularly hearing statistics and references to statistics concerning people's outlook for the future and mental health especially among the younger generations and, frankly, it's depressing.

I was reminded of a quote in a book I just started called *The Amazing Power of God Stories* written by the founder of Church Doctor Ministries, Kent Hunter; the quote is this, "Man can live about forty days without food, about three days without water, about eight minutes without air...but only for one second without hope." The quote may be somewhat hyperbolic, but I don't think it's too far off and, when you look at the mental health of a nation that increasingly identifies as "nones" (that is, not religious), it's no wonder that the mental health of our nation and especially our youth is so anemic. Faith is about hope; where there's an absence of faith, it naturally follows that there will also be an absence of hope. Or when faith is in the wrong thing(s), what hope one does have will prove to be a false hope and thus fail.

This got me to thinking: perhaps hope is the key to evangelism. I don't know about you, but I have tended to think about evangelism in terms of Jesus appearing with Cleopas and the other disciple on the road to Emmaus opening the Scriptures and "beginning with Moses and all the prophets (i.e. the Old Testament), interpreted... all the Scriptures concerning himself" (Luke 24:27). As I think about it, though, that would actually be more along the lines of what now tends to be called discipleship... that is: after someone has initially heard the Good News of God in Christ, growing them in Christian faith. Perhaps the work of evangelism is much simpler than that. I wonder if it would be more helpful to think about evangelism along the lines of what Peter writes in his first epistle, "always being prepared to make a defense to anyone who asks you for a reason for the hope that is in you..." (1 Ptr. 3:15). And maybe we really don't need to worry so much about the defense part but just be ready to share the reason for our hope... And actually the word that gets translated as "reason" is the same word used in John 1 when John tells us that "In the beginning was the Word... and the Word became flesh and dwelt among us." It's the word logos/Word. And the word defense can also be translated as an answer or a reply. In fact, it might be better to translate this passage, "always be prepared to give an answer/reply to anyone who asks you for the logos/ Word of hope that is in you." I don't know about you, I feel like this removes a lot of pressure to have to be able to back up and defend every teaching and doctrine of Christian faith and brings this to a very do-able level: when somebody asks you where you find hope, you are ready and able to say, "Here's where I find my hope."

And what is this word of hope that is in us? Well, at the end of the day that word is Christ Jesus himself and alone: he is the *logos*/Word of our hope. But we can say a little more than that because we actually rehearse this little reply every time we gather for worship, "I believe in God the Father almighty... and in Jesus Christ his only Son... and in the Holy Spirit." It is summed up very simply in the Creed. In fact this is why we have creeds: simple summaries that bear witness to the faith and hope that is in us.

I believe in God the Father, etc.: I am purposefully made, I am not an accident. In the words of the Psalmist, "I praise you for I am fearfully and wonderfully made" (Ps.139:14). As creator of the world, I don't only believe that he made me but that he made everyone and therefore I will treat you and every person with dignity and respect because you also are his creation, fearfully and wonderfully made.

I believe in Jesus Christ, etc.: I am a fallen and broken creature (this by the way is why we need hope in the first place), but God loved me so much that he came to earth in the person of Jesus Christ who died to forgive my brokenness and make me whole and he was raised from the dead to give me the hope of eternal life. And he didn't do this only for me but also for you, "For God so loved the world that he gave his only son..." (etc.).

I believe in the Holy Spirit, etc.: I have come to this faith and hope because the Holy Spirit has given it to me as a gift through the preaching of this word. And I am sustained in this faith and hope through the fellowship I share with others who have also been given this same faith and hope. In fact, without that fellowship and hearing, I would not and could not believe it or hold to it because I am too broken of a person, I have committed too grievous of sins, and the world around me — beautiful as it is — is also too broken and full of death and disappointments. But I hear this word and share in this fellowship and this faith and hope is kindled anew and I find strength to meet the challenges of the day, of the week, of life itself.

Our world is in such desperate need of something to hope in, can you share the hope that is in you? I know what some of you will say, "So many people find our message foolish and even ridiculous." Perhaps we can swallow our pride a little bit though and acknowledge the foolishness of our message. St. Paul himself did in his first letter to the Corinthians, "For Jews demand signs and Greeks desire wisdom, but we proclaim Christ crucified, a stumbling block to Jews and **foolishness** to Gentiles, but," he writes, "to those who are the called, both Jews and Greeks, Christ the power of God and the wisdom of God. For God's foolishness is wiser than human wisdom, and God's weakness is stronger than human strength." (1 Cor. 1:22-25).

Who knows, maybe I'm off here. But maybe I'm not. All I know is that our society cannot continue on the trajectory it's currently on and we have the one thing that's actually big enough, strong enough, powerful enough to turn it all around. The creation is eagerly waiting for us and the hope we have to share, dear church; will you reveal yourself and fulfill her longing?

Test me on this,' says the LORD Almighty, 'and see if I will not throw open the floodgates of heaven and pour out so much blessing that there will not be room enough to store it'" (NIV). "Test me on this," says the Lord. Go ahead, He's asking you test Him! Take this challenge. May our storehouses be filled for those in great need in the days ahead. May our Bibles be our constant guide in the days ahead. May God bless you and keep you in His grace.





Grace Care Center




