**Premium List Rules: Open Division** 

- 1. The Dawson County Agricultural Society, Inc. will not under any circumstances be liable for personal injury or damage of any kind or for damages of any property whatsoever, no matter how caused.
- 2. Open Entries are to be entered from 6:00-8:00 p.m. on Tuesday, July 17 or from 8:00 a.m. until 1:00 p.m. on Wednesday, July 18, 2018. All exhibits will be released after 8:00 p.m. on Saturday, July 21, 2018 or you may pick up on Sunday, July 22 from 9:00-10:00 a.m.
- 3. Unlawful picketing or demonstrations will be handled as per Nebraska Statue 28-1317, and no leaflets or materials shall be handed out from any location other than commercial display space that has been rented prior to the beginning of the Fair, unless it has been approved prior to the Fair by the Dawson County Ag Society, Inc.
- 4. Premium money for all classes will be mailed after Fair. All checks will be void if not cashed before 90 days.
- 5. The Board prefers competent out-of-county judges in all departments. Only if Judges away from this area cannot be found, will local judges be used.
- 6. The Danish system of judging will be used in all departments. All entries will be grouped as  $1^{st}$ ,  $2^{nd}$  or  $3^{rd}$ . Premiums will be paid for  $1^{st}$ ,  $2^{nd}$  or  $3^{rd}$  in all classes. There will be no specifications as to the number or percentage of entries in each group. All could be  $1^{st}$  or all could be  $3^{rd}$ .

- 7. Any exhibit that has been exhibited and judges at any other 4-H or County Fair cannot be judged and no premiums will be paid.
- 8. Premiums will be awarded in all divisions.
- 9. Open Divisions having youth division will be the floral, art department, the crafts and hobby department, quilt and the homemaking department. Youth division in these departments will be high school (spring graduates) age and below. Exhibitors will have to choose which age group (adult or senior.) You cannot enter in both age groups in the same department.
- 10. No exhibitor can be present when the judges are judging if you have an exhibit entered in that department.
- 11. The premium committee will establish premium amounts, rules and regulations of each department with input from various organizations involved in the fair. They will be approved by the Dawson County Agricultural Society Board of Directors in a regular meeting and will be followed for each ensuing fair unless changes by the Dawson County agricultural Society Board
