

I have worked with UMCOR for many years. I served with the Desert Southwest Conference as a missionary for Border Ministries. Part of my Job entailed distributing 10,000 UMCOR blankets and Health kits along the border every winter. In 2016 I asked UMCOR for a grant to fund a shelter in our church for Asylum seekers, To date, UMCOR has funded that shelter with \$140,000, I was also the Conference Coordinator for the Imagine No Malaria campaign. In addition, I consulted with CalPac and CalNevada in their fundraising campaigns. Many of the funds raised in the Imagine No Malaria campaign were put to use by UMCOR in Sub-Saharan Africa. The Co-author of the article below, Ashley Gish was a colleague of mine for many years. Check out her update on Imagine No Malaria.

Since 2010, the people of The United Methodist Church through its Imagine No Malaria initiative have focused on reducing malaria deaths in Sub-Saharan Africa. In the process, the denomination has learned that "our God is able, more than able to do more than we can ask or imagine."

Together, we have:

Provided more than 4 million life-saving bed nets, Insecticide-treated bed nets remains the most effective way to prevent malaria. Since The United Methodist Church began its effort, which has included bed net distributions, global mortality rates have fallen by an estimated 60 percent.

Renovated 61 healthcare facilities, Improved medical clinics and hospitals in Africa result in better diagnosis, case management and access to medication.

Treated more than 2.7 million people with malaria Treatment works. Because of the global effort to fight malaria, an estimated 6.8 million deaths have been averted since 2001, according to the World Health Organization's 2017 World Malaria Report.

Protected more than 175,000 structures with indoor residual spraying (IRS)IRS is the application of longacting chemical insecticides to the walls and roofs of house and domestic animal shelters, a top malaria intervention recommend by the World Health Organization.

Trained thousands of community health workers and volunteers. Through education outreach, a grass-roots network has been established with health workers and volunteers who deliver and install bed nets and teach people how to properly use and care for the nets. In addition to aiding with malaria prevention, these workers often assist in other health-related capacities that serve as a vital connection for communities.



UMCOR's History



1950s

MCOR helps to resettle refugees in more than five different countries and distributes \$80,000 per year for refugee-assistance programs.





1980s

UMCOR brings relief aid to Ethiopia and 25 other African nations suffering from famine and drought.



1940s

Founded by Bishop Herbert Welch, the Methodist Committee for Overseas Relief (MCOR) begins its work by responding to suffering after the onset of World War II.



1960s

MCOR addresses the root causes of hunger and poverty and works with communities in need to achieve self-sustaining livelihood opportunities.

1970s

1971 famine in Bangladesh causes bishops to appeal for \$1 million in relief efforts. The goal is met the following year.

MCOR's name changes to the United Methodist Committee on Relief (UMCOR) and is at work in 62 countries on five continents.



1990s

UMCOR Sager Brown Depot opens for volunteers to help assemble relief supply kits.





UMCOR responds to disasters caused by Hurricane Katrina, Hurricane Rita, and Indian Ocean earthquake and tsunami.

UMCOR opens offices in the DRC, Sudan, Philippines,
Afghanistan, and Indonesia.



TODAY

UMCOR responds to ongoing crises to different programs addressing famine, refugee resettlement, and drought in the Horn of Africa.

<u>UMCOR's Vision and Mission are as follows:</u>

Vision: As the humanitarian relief and development arm of The United Methodist Church, UMCOR strengthens and transforms people and communities.

Mission: Compelled by Christ to be a voice of conscience on behalf of the people called Methodist, UMCOR works globally to alleviate human suffering and advance hope and healing.

UMCOR's work can be categorized into three major areas:

- 1) Humanitarian Relief / Disaster Response
- 2) Sustainable Development
- 3) Global Health (in collaboration with Global Ministries)

UMCOR'S MANDATE (From the Book of Discipline 2016)

¶ 1330.1. General Provisions—

Purpose—The United Methodist Committee on Relief ("UMCOR") exists to assist United Methodists and churches to become involved globally in direct ministry to persons in need through programs of relief, rehabilitation, and service, including issues of displaced persons, hunger and poverty, disaster response, and disaster risk reduction; and to assist organizations, institutions, and programs related to annual conferences and other units of The United Methodist Church in their involvement in direct service to such persons in need.
