

This magic has remained with me. In Connecticut, my Decembers, though much less dramatic in my adult years, often led me to reflect on the things that bring me awe. This usually took on the form of slow-paced walks in night parks, and, if I was lucky, sometimes those paths had freshly felled snow. In California, my Decembers have been quite different. Of course, there is no longer the prospect of snow being in the forecast (I'm thankful), but I have maintained a tradition that connects me to the days of my youth.

Lights, laser displays, and decorations embellish the Old West style buildings, and the "theater" happens around and sometimes above the crowd gathered in the street. All of this is done under the watchful eye of a giant presiding tree fully adorned in all manner of Christmas lights. Though I have never seen a Santa-suited host offering countdowns in Old Sac, that sense of magic is present all the same.

Though I am a long way, both in time and space, from being part of that awe-filled night-clad congregation on Constitution Plaza in Hartford, my mind was transported back to that sense

of awe as I hung out with my teenaged daughter. On the "Friday after" we went to Old Sac to get some latenight Hot Cocoa. As we drove around the cobbled streets, we turned a corner and suddenly, the giant Christmas tree came into full view. In a momentary lapse of the prescribed "cool" that teenagers everywhere have vowed to maintain especially when spending time in the public with their parents, she, with a gaping mouth and an audible gasp, pointed out that the tree was lit! In acknowledgment, I smiled slightly, but on the inside, the smile was much bigger.

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Charles Dickens once wrote,

"Happy, happy Christmas, that can win us back to the delusions of our childhood days, recall to the old man the pleasures of his youth, and transport the traveler back to his own fireside and quiet home!"

Somehow, Dicken's quote rings truer and truer each December. My hope is that this month will offer us many opportunities to experience the magic in life, and even when things appear to be the darkest or the coldest, I pray that a sense of child-like wonder and awe will illumine and guide us to our own places of warmth, comfort, and home.
