




MARY MCLEOD BETHUNE

Mary McLeod Bethune was not only an educator, but a major human rights leader in the early twentieth century. In 1931, she led the formation of Bethune-Cookman College, was the only black woman present at the founding of the United Nations in 1945 and advised five U.S. presi-

As a committed Methodist, Bethune was a delegate to four Methodist General Conferences, and her life and accomplishments has been an inspiration across generations. Below is a prayer from Mary McLeod Bethune.

The tasks performed today with forgiveness for all our errors, we dedicate, dear Lord, to Thee. Grant us strength and courage and faith and humility sufficient for the tasks assigned to us. 



BOOK REVIEW

GLORY HAPPENING: FINDING THE DIVINE IN EVERYDAY PLACES

I picked up Glory Happening because it was one of the selections in the UMW 2020 Reading Program, under the Nurturing for Community category. What I found was a series of fifty short meditations/essays on the ways we can find God in the seemingly mundane pieces of life. Watering a patio garden, playing rummy tournaments with family, and the devotion of a family dog all serve as stepping stones to the Divine.

The book is divided into eight parts: Creation, Light, Weight, Voice, Fire, Honor, Worship, and Kingdom. Each meditation is followed by a prayer. This is not the sort of book to sit and in one or two sittings. It would be an excellent addition to a daily devotion time, or something to keep on hand and dip into when you need a little touch of God's presence in the humdrum of day-to-day life. Kristi Kinzel

FIRST CHURCH ROSEVILLE HISTORICAL GLEANINGS

Friday May 9, 1913,
The following notices were placed in the
Roseville Register.

L.L. King has kindly donated a plot of ground in Cherry Glen on which to build a Mission Chapel for M.E church. On the evening of the 21st from 7 to 10 o'clock p.m. a Penny social will be held on Mrs. R.M. Hatch's grounds, 208 Earl Ave. The proceeds will go toward the building for the new Mission Chapel.

A cordial invitation is extended to the mother and fathers to attend Mother's day to be held at the M. E. church on Sunday, May 18th, at 11 o'clock A.M. A good program by the children will be rendered.

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Did you know about this chapel? It was built in 1914 for a second house of worship for the

Methodists living on the other side of the tracks who frequently had trouble getting to church because of the trains. It was commonly referred to as Cherry Glen Mission and stood at the corner of Bonita and Clinton Streets until it was sold to another church and continued as a house of worship until 1944.

UMCOR

In response to the devastating global effects of World War II, the 1940 United Methodist Church's General Conference established a relief agency called United Methodist Committee on Relief (UMCOR). This agency was created to respond to the needs of human anguish by working globally to alleviate suffering and advance hope and healing.

In recent years, UMCOR distributed \$31, 529,968 in grants. North America: \$14,648,191, South America: \$5,919,190, Europe: \$116,731, Middle East: \$961,778, Asia: \$1,939,555 and Africa: \$7,948,523. These monies are used for food, hygiene supplies, shelter and other basic needs to ease human suffering.

When a natural or human-caused disaster strikes inside or outside the U.S. your gift helps UMCOR stay until recovery is complete which establishes hope. UMCOR works with local Annual Conference disaster response ministries to provide financial and physical support. Outside the U.S. UMCOR serves as the primary channel for United Methodist assistance. 

This February, as we prepare to celebrate Black History Month, I was reflecting on Martin Luther King Jr.'s holiday, and how I was able to join my family in helping serve Monday's lunch in Backman's Hall. Service is not only a vital part of First Church, Roseville's life of faith, it is also a pillar of King Day. In fact the holiday is alternatively called the National Day of Service. A favorite song of Martin Luther King Jr.'s was, "If I Can Help Somebody", and his life was an embodiment of that song's exhortation. This is a legacy that lives on today. A "living history" that can inform our present actions is what led to, in part, the creation of Black History Month.

Just to give a little historical context. Black History Month was seeded close to 100 years ago with people like Carter G. Woodson and before him, W. E. B. Du Bois. Efforts were made that led to what was then called Negro History Week, and it was celebrated during a week in February 1926. It was

designed to coincide with the birthdays of both Abraham Lincoln and Frederick Douglass. Over the next 50 years, the celebration became more popularized and in 1976, the nation's bicentennial, President Gerald R. Ford urged Americans to "seize the opportunity to honor the too-often neglected accomplishments of black Americans in every area of endeavor throughout our history." Today, Black History Month continues to be a vital tradition that contributes to a holistic understanding of our shared American history.

This month, as we continue to observe the season of Epiphany, let us shine the light on how God is revealed through the diversity of our human experiences and histories. In doing so, I believe that we will be better equipped to realize the vision of the Beloved Community; a transformed world that includes all people and reflects God's ultimate justice and joy.
