As we move into 2021, we gratefully begin looking forward to the upcoming year and the new possibilities that it presents. Though this is traditionally a time of setting new resolutions for the future, I believe that it should be informed by honest reflections about the year that has passed. Understandably, I imagine that “looking back” is something that not too many people are clamoring to do.

There is no doubt that 2020 was filled with many challenges that did not expire when the calendars on our walls were replaced. The problems that we faced did not magically dissipate when the fireworks burst within the new January sky, or when the first kisses were kissed, or when the illumined ball began its *countdowned*-drop in Times Square, or when millions of people, some holding toasting flutes filled with bubbly, joyfully hummed through the melody of the song, “Auld Lang Syne” (humming because how many of us truly know all the lyrics of that timeless song inspired by a Scots-language poem).



Our time of resolution-making need not be accompanied by a full remembrance of “old long since” or the olden days of the past. In fact, as I thought about the experience of Christmas just last week, I was filled with all the needed hope to begin imagining something new for 2021. During the Christmas season, the Evans’ household was brimming with cheer, and not just because we were wearing matching elf pajamas. We had a wonderful time connecting with family, and it truly felt like we were wrapped in a comforter-like cocoon of love. We laughed while drinking hot chocolate, eating stovetop-popped popcorn, and enjoying holiday themed films.



Of note, we watched a Disney-Pixar movie entitled, *Soul*. Though funny and witty, it beautifully explored the big questions of meaning and purpose while alluding to the “spark” within our soul that makes living come “alive.” In between sips of hot chocolate, and under the glow of the animated movie, I thought of the first line of the ancient Chinese Proverb that was quoted in the beginning, “If there is light in the soul, there will be beauty in the person.”

The juxtaposition of the words “light” and “soul” is also meaningful because we are moving into the season of *epiphany*. Epiphany means *appearance* or *manifestation*. The UMC Discipleship resources rightly likens the popular usage of *epiphany* to words such as *eureka* or *aha!* It is akin to turning on a light bulb to reveal something that was once hidden from view. It is a season of welcoming in the light especially after a time of darkness.

So, what does this all mean? I guess, in this season of epiphany, it is my prayer that we will continue to do the soul-work of appreciating the profound gift of being “alive” in this moment, despite the difficulties that may continue to arise. Further, whatever it is that we may feel invited to “live-into” more deeply as our resolutions, I pray that it will be a light to those around us, especially as we celebrate the *Light* of Christ shining to all the world; a *Light* that looks and feels like beauty, harmony, order, and peace.

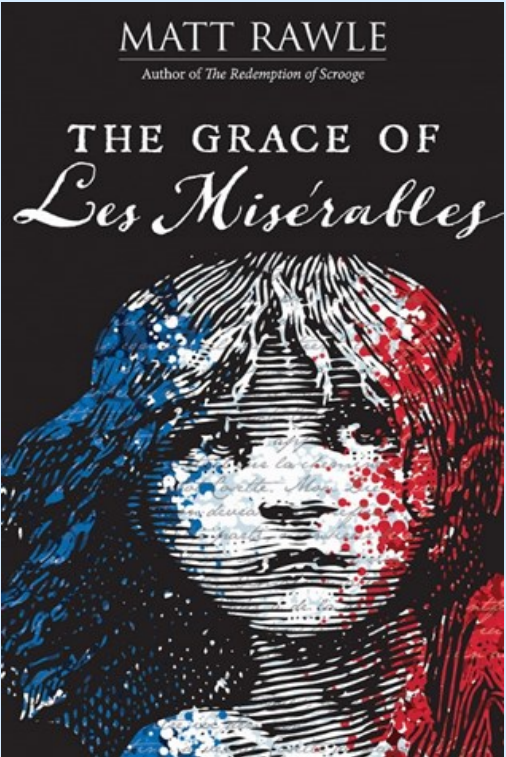


Greetings First United Methodist Church of Roseville!

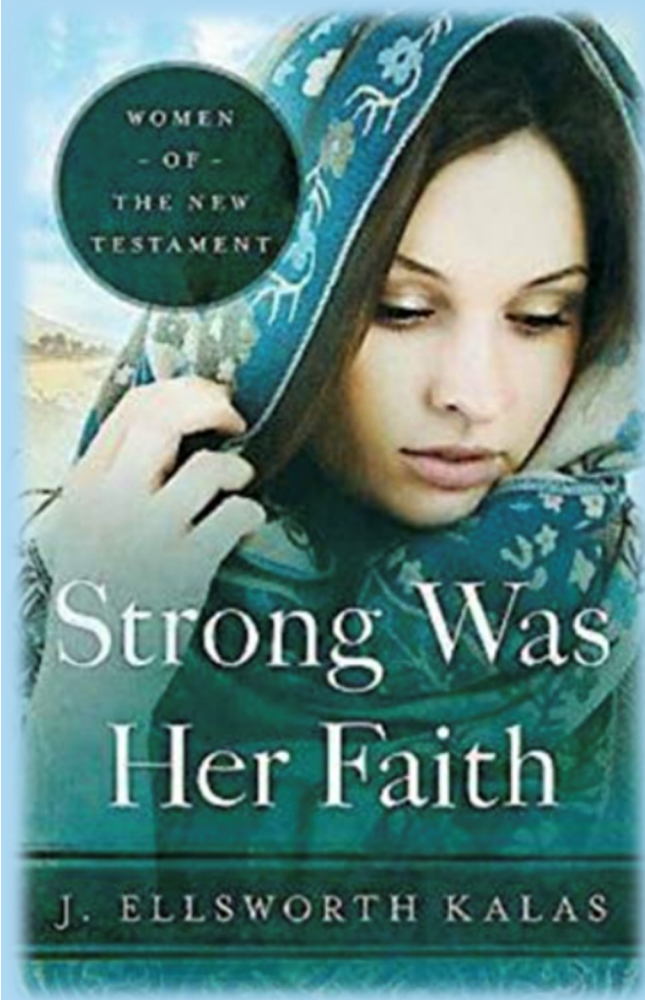


This Lent Ponder the Themes of
