

Bridges: Part 1

"I will always remember—when the stars fell down around me and Lifted me up above the George Washington Bridge."

—Faith Ringgold—

Faith Ringgold is an American painter, writer, mixed media sculptor, narrative quilter, performance artist, and activist who was born in Harlem, NY in 1930. Over the last month I have been discovering her work and came

across the quote that I highlighted in the introduction. There is something about her words that viscerally taps into that part of me that still lights up whenever I think about crossing the George Washington Bridge. Ironically, this famous suspension bridge was completed 91 years ago when Faith Ringgold was but an infant with its anchoring cables boring into the borough that Faith called home.



My experience with this venerable structure was formed as I spent the first part of my life traveling up and down Interstate 95 between Connecticut and Maryland. Nothing topped the anticipatory feeling when nearing the bridge from the New York side. There is a brief underground highway section that transverses a slender part of Manhattan Island between the Harlem and Hudson rivers. Near the end of this shadowed journey, there is something absolutely magical when emerging from the dark, and having my pupil adjusting eyes take in the luminous majesty of the crisscrossing steel that make



up the exposed truss work of the bridges' towers. Like ancient Rhodes, cars traveled between its colossal metal legs which appeared like pillars that extended into the heavens. To this day, whether washed by sunlight, or blanketed by the night sky, the George Washington Bridge is cathedral-like, evoking the feelings of being lifted amongst floating stars.

Because our family often traveled during the holidays, one of the enduring features in my memory of the GWB is seeing a gigantic flag suspended from its massive girders. Since the late 1940's, the bridge has flown the world's largest free-flying American flag, measuring at 90 feet long, 60 feet wide. It is unfurled on national holidays like Memorial Day and especially on Independence Day. Because of this, I have often juxtaposed the magic of crossing the George Washington Bridge with the promise of this country as symbolized by the flag.





As we approach the Fourth of July holiday, I am reminded of the Declaration of Independence. I am moved by its words from the introduction when it reads, "When in the Course of human events..." to its inspired preamble:

We hold these truths to be self-evident, that all men are created equal, that they are endowed by their Creator with certain unalienable Rights, that among these are Life, Liberty and the pursuit of Happiness (Continued Page 2)

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These noble aspirations, encoded in the bones of this country's founding documents, has not always been true for everyone. That is why I marry the "Declaration" with the preamble of the Constitution that says, "We the People of the United States, in Order to form a more perfect Union..." This wording of "more perfect" means that the work of forming this nation is ongoing and ever-perfecting. This also means that it is our responsibility to keep struggling to ensure that this nation fulfills its noble promise for all its people. To me, this is not just a matter of my civic duty, this is a matter of faith. We are undoubtedly called to continue to grow in what it means to be Christ-like or disciples of love. In like manner, I believe that we are also called to work for the realization of a world that reflects God's hope for our society; a world defined by love and liberation, justice and joy. In practice, this faith commission is actualized in the places we live, our homes, communities, and indeed, our country.

My eyes still sparkle whenever I see pictures of the George Washington Bridge. It reminds me of the magic and promise of this country, and the work we are stilled called to do. It remains on my bucket list to walk across the GWB as I have the Golden Gate and Brooklyn bridges. Further, as I think about this present moment in our country's history, I find myself drawing on metaphors about bridges. From Isaac Newton to Martin Luther King Jr, many have expressed the notion that it is much better to build bridges than walls. I think that that is good advice for understanding and reconciliation especially at a time when there is so much division. Maybe this idea is best epitomized by the fictional character King T'Challa from Wakanda who once said, "...in times of crisis, the wise build bridges, while the foolish build barriers. We must find a way to look after one another as if we were one single tribe."



Ironically enough, on the verge of celebrating Independence, Day, I'll let a king have the final word. Happy July,



When I Am Among the Trees




