to quote Dennis Bull and the following are Pastor's answers
to the questions of his choice.

Were you always a cat person?

Re-opening The Doors

Melanie Kincheloe, a long term member of First Church Roseville and the daughter of Connie Witherow, our Administration Assistant, moved to Northern California about two years ago. A trained Lay Minister and United Methodist Volunteer in Mission Team Leader, Melanie is dedicated to doing the Lord's work. Through her volunteer work in the area, Melanie became familiar with the indigenous people, living on The Yurok Reservation. The Yurok Indian Reservation is a Native American reservation for the Yurok people located in parts of Del Norte and Humboldt counties, California, on a 44-mile stretch of the Klamath River. It is one of a very few tribes who have never been removed from their ancestral lands in California.

Melanie came across The UMC Church of the Redwoods which has been closed for the past five years. Six months ago, with the permission of Blake Busick, our District

Superintendent, Melanie opened the doors to the church. Last week many of you received an email requesting donations to help pay an overdue property tax bill of \$3000. Because of your generosity, the bill is being paid as I write this article.

In order to re-establish the church, Melanie has created a non-profit organization, known as Klamath Community Church. She is raising money through this non-profit to donate to the project.

Melanie's focus is all about nurturing the community. The area is a food desert, and already property next to the church has been donated for use as a community garden. The church is open for a lunchtime gathering on Sundays and a gathering time on Wednesdays. Many locals are stepping up to offer classes in native crafts, as well as child daycare, NA and AA meetings.

The church has also become involved with the Klamath Dam Removal Project. On March 10, 2023, the Klamath River Renewal Corporation officially broke ground on removal activities for the Klamath River dams. Removal of the four Klamath River dams will be the largest dam removal project in the history of the United States and the largest salmon restoration project ever. It will also begin to restore justice to the Tribes and indigenous peoples who have lived along the Klamath River since time immemorial.





Inc. do not sell from this store alcoholic beverages of any kind. We feel that this request is reasonable and that your organization would be reasonable in granting it. It can come as no surprise to you that we should make such a request. It has been a clear policy of our denomination since its inception to take a firm stand against the sale of alcoholic beverages. But, furthermore, our community here in Roseville is well supplied with such outlets. The licenses for the sale of such beverages, is far above the number which the law allows. Furthermore, within 600 feet of the entrance to our building there are already ten places where alcoholic beverages are sold. I may say here, that since my pastorate began in August of 1951 none of these licenses have been granted, to my knowledge. Your new store entrance is within 300 feet of our sanctuary entrance. This church's cornerstone has the date of 1882. The street we both front on is named for this church. But its history goes back twenty years before that to the Civil War period when preaching first began here by our ministers. Besides official action taken by our church prior to your construction, I may say that the sentiment of not only our people supports this statement but also that of other neighboring churches and citizens of the community. We greatly trust that you will respect our request.
