



"When I dare to be powerful—to use my strength in the service of my vision then it becomes less and less important whether I am afraid.'

The above quote, which I still feature in the signature line of my personal email, was delivered by the great Audre Lorde. This New York born writer explored the intersections of identity and described herself as "black, lesbian, mother, warrior, poet." The cogent power of her arguments, the courage of her convictions, and her natural charisma beautifully conspired to form in her, a force of nature that fiercely pushed back against the injustices of racism, sexism, classism, heterosexism, homopho-

bia. The vibrant spirit of Lorde, one who dared to be pow-Audre Lorde erful, is evident in Rev. Kristin Stoneking. She is an elder in the California -Nevada Annual Conference and is presently serving Epworth United Methodist Church in Berkeley. Before that appointment, Stoneking was the execu tive director of the Fellowship of Reconciliation, the nation's oldest interfaith peace and justice organization.

I met Kristin when she served as the executive director and pastor of the ecumenical campus ministry at UC Davis, the Cal Aggie Christian Association. I did my seminary field internship at that campus ministry's Multifaith Living Community, which is an intentional living community for students of diverse backgrounds. This innovative model of housing and ministry was founded by Kristin in the wake of the tragedy of 9/11.

I am proud to say that Kristin is a mentor, a colleague, and a friend. She is also one of the main reasons that I decided to become a Methodist minister. I saw in Kristin the "Lorde-ian" fearlessness that allowed her to marshal her strength in service of a transformative vision. I also witnessed how she was able to make an impact on the campus and beyond despite the pushback she got for being a gay woman. Kristin exemplifies a commitment to justice and has been involved in the struggle for full inclusion within our own denomination.

June is the month in which we celebrate LGBTO Pride. Last year, First UMC Roseville participated in Pride events in concert with other regional Methodist churches in the greater Sacramento area. This month we recall the Pulse massacre in Florida, which reminds us of the threat that many in the LGBTQ community still face. It is also the month in which we remember the Stonewall Uprising, which reminds us of the spirit of resistance which instigated a movement of change against discrimination and harm.

The full inclusion of the LGBTQ community is significant because it points to the Kingdom of God that Jesus preached; the realization of the gospel of liberation and love that out-pictures as a community of justice and grace for all people regardless of race, class, sexual orientation, or gender identity or performance. In this month of Pride, I celebrate my friend Rev Kristin Stoneking, and others within the LGBTQ community, who have shined as exemplars of God's beauty and strength. Further, with all the forces of division seeking to separate us in these trying times, it is good to once again remember the words of Audre Lorde: "In our work and in our living, we must recognize that difference is a reason for celebration and growth, rather than a reason for destruction."

This month, let us not only continue to grow in our commitment to create a world that is fully inclusive, but let us also remember that our diversity is always a "reason for celebration." Blessings, Pastor Mahsea





How has the church been meaningful to me?

As a young teenager, I attended an active youth group in a local church which nourished my spiritual life, as well as developing longtime Christian friends.

I attended day camps and overnight church camps throughout high school and early college, and also serving as a camp counselor.

At age 16 I participated in a weeklong mission trip to Berea, KY, where we were helping the local churchgoers to do repairs on the church.

I do know that all of these events shaped me to be a lifelong Christian.

Introduced to the United Methodist Church in my 40s, I discovered that my values, my spirituality, and my soul perfectly aligned with the United Methodist Church beliefs. I had come home to stay.

How can the church be more relevant today?

Pentecost is known as the birth of the church, when the Holy Spirit came down and filled the apostles with a spirit unknown to them. Now, along with a terrifying global pandemic, our country is in the midst of ongoing racism, discrimination, poverty,

hunger, economic upheaval, injustice, and political unrest. We are faced with a new normal that we've never known before. Could this be a time for a rebirth of the church?

We now have the opportunity to look at church differently. Do we want go back to the way it was? Or do we, creatively, bring our church into this new era where our gifts, time, and talents work toward the glory of God both inside and outside the walls of the church? Is this the time for churches to be stronger advocates for those facing injustice? We have been forced to "do church" outside the walls, and yet our ministry continues. We know that our church is not only the building. Our church is a community of those who love God, love each other, and have a strong desire to minister to others. This, now, is the time for our rebirth.




wisdom and knowledge,
