I begin with a Mary Oliver poem because my soul always sighs in satisfaction when I hear her words. Further, as someone usually adverse to singing, her admonition to sing recklessly during inappropriate times makes me laugh. It has been a little over 2 years since she died, but like her, I do believe in kindness, and a little mischief.

March happens to be Women's History Month. This is time when the contribution of women in our society is highlighted and celebrated. In the rhythms of our own community, this month seems right on time as we have just spent the last few weeks spotlighting women in the Bible who may have gone under the radar.

One may be familiar with the story of Peter miraculously escaping prison in the 12th chapter in the book of Acts. To give context, this was a very perilous time in the life of the early church. King Herod was capturing, torturing, and executing the adherents to this nascent Jesus movement. In fact, James, the leader of the Jerusalem church, was just killed at the same time Peter was imprisoned. Despite the risks,

Mary the mother of John Mark, secretly opened her home for Christians to shelter-in, gather, organize, and pray. So, after Peter's angel-aided escape into the night, he went to the only place in town that he knew he can find safe refuge, Mary's house. If not for her courage, the history of the early church would have been quite different.

In like manner, we are familiar with the voting rights marches in Selma, Alabama, and the events at the Edmund Pettus Bridge in 1965. These watershed moments made leaders like John Lewis a household name. However, it is possible that none of this would have happened if it not for an extraordinary woman named Richie Jean Jackson who was willing to open her home like Mary once did thousands of years ago. Despite the risks, Jackson provided her kitchen for food, her spare bedrooms for lodging, and her living room for conferencing with everyone from local activists to President Johnson. Jackson's Selma home became the de-facto headquarters for Martin Luther King Jr and his lieutenants like Lewis, and it was there that they sheltered-in, gathered, organized, and prayed. If not for her courage, the history of the Civil Rights movement would have been quite different.



In March, we rightly honor everyone from Dorothy Day to Condoleezza Rice, from Sally Ride to Dolores Huerta, from Mary Mcleod Bethune to Sandra Day O'Conner. It is my hope that we find inspiration in these women's stories as we celebrate those with well-known names and those with names yet to be discovered. I conclude as I began, with a quote from the incomparable Mary Oliver, the one who encourages me in kindness, mischief, and song:

"Keep some room in your heart for the Unimaginable"

Martian Motivation



Honoring Women's History Month

In honor of Women's History Month, I'm sharing a portion from our recent book study, Strong Was Her Faith, by J. Ellsworth Kalas.

"It is sometimes said that men had written history, and therefore women haven't gotten their fair share of the pages. In spite of that, it's surprising how many notable women come to mind as one skips over the top of history. We immediately think of Deborah, an early judge of Israel; Cleopatra, one of the most powerful leaders of the ancient world during her time as queen of Egypt; Elizabeth I and Victoria, queens of England; Teresa of Avila, who established seventeen monastic houses and left us with devotional literature that is still sought out today; Frances Willard, a person of so many achievements in so many areas that when she died, flags were lowered in both Washington, D.C., and in Chicago her adopted city, and 30,000 people filed through Chicago's Willard Hall on a cold February day in order to pay honor at her death; and Marie Curie, who won Nobel Prizes in both physics and chemistry. One thinks too of Eleanor Roosevelt, whose work in drawing attention to the needs of the poor and of the racially segregated may have made as much of a long-range impact on history as the achievements of her president-husband, Franklin Delano Roosevelt, in leading America through depression and war. Most recently, Mother Teresa was perhaps the best-known personality in the world through some years of the late twentieth century."

When I think of the women who have earned a place in the history of our country, some names come immediately to mind; Harriet Tubman, Sojourner Truth, Susan B. Anthony, Elizabeth Cady Stanton, Shirley Chisholm, Nancy Pelosi, Geraldine Ferraro, Delores Huerta, Condoleezza Rice, Hillary Clinton and our current Vice-President, Kamala Harris.

But we can say, without hesitation, that no woman is better known throughout the world than Mary, the mother of Jesus. "Millions of people recite her name in prayer each day. Thousands of institutions, throughout the world, carry her name, institutions as diverse as elementary schools, colleges and universities, hospitals, homes for orphans and the aged, and of course churches. Some of the poorest and most depressed persons in the world think of her as their closest friend; they somehow find particular strength and comfort in approaching God under the embrace of her name."

I don't believe that any of these women set out with the goal to become famous. They shared their God-given gifts and talents with the world by living into their passions. They were mindful and intentional, and relentless in their pursuits. They remind me of the women in our church! Celebrate Women's History Month by remembering that we, all people, are making history everyday.


