Among many things, May is a time when the Star Wars franchise is celebrated. "May the fourth be with you" is a phrase you might hear on the fourth day of the month recalling a famous greeting/blessing that uses the word "Force." Though May is the month for the duet days of "M"; Mother's Day and Memorial Day, I chose to highlight the above quote by another "M", the (M)aster Jedi named Obi-Wan Kenobi. The quote, given at a time of great challenge, encapsulates the heart and meta-massage of the whole franchise, to sustain your faith that "a new hope will emerge." It is this spiritual belief, embodied by a ragtag alliance of insurgents, that powered a rebellion that eventually overcame a galactic empire.

When I mention Kenobi, most people immediately think of the great English

actor, Sir Alec Guinness, whose sublime portrayal of the character featured prominently in the original Star Wars film in 1977. Through his lips, we were introduced to "The Force" as "...an energy field created by all living things. It surrounds us and penetrates us. It binds the galaxy together."

Near the end of the movie, there was a defiant grace that adorned Kenobi's visage even in the final moments of his material life. Facing Darth Vader in a duel to the death, this wizened Jedi turned to the imposing Sith Lord with his billowing black cape and a menacing red-glowing lightsaber and said, "If you strike me down, I shall become more powerful than you can possibly imagine." Giving up his life, he transcended into a Force-held ethereal existence where he was able to guide the young Luke Skywalker to fulfill his destiny and ultimately save the galaxy.

Trust me, volumes of books have been written on the spirituality of Star Wars. It generously borrows religious themes and centers them "a long

time ago, in a galaxy far, far away." I mostly love it because it is a great story that has continued to evolve since it made its debut when I was but 2 years old. Now, almost 45 years later, I find myself enthralled with a different story—the story of what First Church of Roseville is now becoming 140 years after its birth.

First Church is a story of how God's grace has girded up generations of those seeking to do good in the midst of a changing world. It is a story of a how faith has been forged through the fire of devotional dedication. It is a story of a people doing their best to live the gospel message of Love knowing that God's Love is the most powerful thing in the universe. We are a community committed to offering hope whether it be at worship services on Sundays, the meal ministry on Mondays, the support groups on Tuesdays, or the communal celebration which is our 4TH Fridays at First Church.

Though (to my chagrin) we are not lightsaber wielding space wizards, I find great joy in knowing that we are continuing to write new chapters in the on-going story of God's "new hope" that ever emerges and never ends.

And like Han Solo and Chewbacca in the cockpit of the Millennial Falcon, I truly believe that we are on the verge of entering hyperspace and creating new stories at light-

new stories at lightspeed—stories of hope
that will be like the celebratory songs that filled
the skies over the Forest
Moon of Endor. In the end,
Love wins, and this is
what keeps me inspired
throughout the month of

May and beyond. I now leave with the immortal words once said by Obi-Wan Kenobi:

"May the Force be with you, always."

## **MEMORIAL DAY** HISTORICAL GLEANINGS

May 16, 1908 By request memorial services will be held at the M.E. Church, Sunday May 24th. All veterans of the Civil War are cordially invited to be present. Rev. Colin Anderson will preach at 11 a.m.

May 30, 1908 The Memorial services at the M.E. Church last Sunday did not attract any more attention than the ordinary services. We suppose the G.A.R. veterans of the section are all dead.

• M.E. is Methodist Episcopal, the name of First Church Roseville in 1908

The Grand Army of the Republic (GAR) was a fraternal organization composed of veterans of the Union Army (United States Army, Union Navy (U.S. Navy), and the Marines who served in the American Civil War. It was founded in 1866 in Springfield, Illinois, and grew to include hundreds of "posts" (local community units) across the nation (predominantly in

the North, but also a few in the South and West). It was dissolved in 1956 at the death of its last member, Albert Woolson (1850— 1956) of Duluth, Minnesota.

Linking men through their experience of the war, the G.A.R. became among the first organized advocacy groups in American politics, supporting voting rights for black veterans, promoting patriotic education, helping to make Memorial Day a national holiday, lobbying the United States Congress to establish regular veterans' pensions, and supporting Republican political candidates. Its peak membership, at 410,000, was in 1890, a high point of various Civil War commemorative and monument dedication ceremonies. It was succeeded by the Sons of Union Veterans of the Civil War (SUVCW), composed of male descendants of Union Army and Union Navy veterans.

## Caster Morning and the Counting of the Judas Bags

At the Worship Service on the first Sunday after Ash Wednesday, the children passed out small denim bags to the members in the congregation as Don Harris invited members to fill the "Judas Bags" with coins to help feed those in need in our neighborhood.

During the Lenten season many bags were returned with coins in them or so we thought. During the Easter service the children rolled in a small wagon with the Judas Bags that had been returned before Easter, collected the ones that were brought in that morning and received a blessing from Pastor Evans.



After the Easter Service the children emptied the contents of the Judas Bags into a large tub in Backman Hall much to the delight of the onlookers. The children's eyes lit up as they saw large dollar coins, \$2.00 dollar bills and folding money. The tub weighed about 38 pounds, had 71 Judas bags, and contained 4,531 items as follows: two checks totaling \$80.00, nine \$20.00 bills, one \$10.00 bill, one \$5.00 bill, five \$2.00 bills, eight \$1.00 bills, 32 dollar coins, 3 half dollars, 1,456 quarters, 850 dimes,

1,060 nickels, 1,104 pennies, one Mexican 50 centavos, one Canadian nickel and one coin looking charm with a hole in it and inscribed, "A sister is God's way of making sure we never walk alone". No attempt was made to determine the worth nor the cash value of these last three items. The other items totaled \$813.54. This money will be used to help the poor in
