Nobody wanted to leave early from the 4th Friday community fair this month. Instead of the usual monthly event, where the kids play games and do a craft project while parents talk to local service resource people, September was different! First, there was all that food given away! Along with the Placer Food Security Coalition, 4th Friday made September "Food Security Month." So in addition to resource information, the fair dispensed 15 cartons of donated fresh produce and 3 tables-full of "pantry" foods to attendees. A craft table offered supplies and instruction for planting vegetable seeds to supplement family diets.

It was also Latin Heritage Month. Students of all ages from the Paloma de Gavilanes School of Latin Dance performed -- in those gorgeous costumes, expressing both humorous and romantic stories. The diversity of local Latin culture was emphasized with tables about Columbia, Peru and Mexico.

The most serious area of the fiesta was the vaccination table, as it has been since the beginning of the pandemic. Shots were offered for both flu and coronavirus this month.

Guests enjoyed tacos prepared by Chido's, a local company, along with our blended smoothies.

First United Methodist was the first church in Roseville over 100 year ago! With the Health Education Council organizing vaccines and boosters, Child Advocates and Prosper Placer arranging crafts and games, the Latino Leadership Council planning and publicizing each months' fair, and Placer People of Faith Together heading the meetings the fairs have been a regular event for nearly a year. Inspiration arrived as we not only surveyed the pristine ball park, but heard a myriad of stories, shared frank conversations about the many challenges we face, and reveled in each other's successes. More, our idea of community ex-

panded as our individual regions become sites of mutual concern and aspiration as we developed true stakes in each other's flourishing. It did not hurt that I had a seemingly unlimited access to Dunkin Donuts coffee.


