


While the earth remains, seedtime and harvest,

Eventually all things merge into one, and a river runs through it. The river was cut by the world's great flood, and runs over rocks from the basement of time. On some of the rocks are timeless raindrops. Under the rocks are the words, and some of the words are theirs. I am haunted by waters.

The beautiful quote written by Norman Maclean in his semi-autobiographical novel, *A River Runs Through it*, is probably better known for being the final narrated words by Robert Redford in a film by the same name released 16 years later in 1992. Redford directed this movie adaptation and it featured, among others, a young Brad Pitt in one of his first big budget leading roles. It is a stunning movie about relationships, namely between a Presbyterian minister and his two sons who chose divergent paths. It takes place in Missoula, Montana and many of its scenes are set by (and within) a picturesque river. The dialogue often spotlights the life lessons learned when flyfishing waist high in the flowing waters—it's truly poetic. As someone who has never gone fishing before, I cannot picture myself joining the ranks of proud anglers skillfully casting their lines from long rods while dressed in rubber waders. However, as I now read the quote from the original source, it resonates a deeper truth within me as I think about my relationships with rivers.


As I look at my life, there has always been the presence of rivers. Its waters have witnessed different iterations of my journey and has gathered my tears, my prayers, and smiles throughout my years. When I flew to visit family back East, the first thing I did after embracing my parents was pilgrimage to the banks of the Connecticut River that overlooked the Hartford skyline. Though I do not picture myself visiting a bait and tackle store any time soon, I definitely get the meditative draw of the river.

The highlight of my trip last month was driving up to Western Massachusetts with my mother to Sugarloaf Mountain. This state park in Deerfield has some of the best views of the Connecticut River as it winds southward through farmland on its way to Long Island Sound. From the high vista point, I recalled the opening lines of a poem entitled "Connecticut River" By Lydia H. Sigourney (1791–1865)

FAIR RIVER! Not unknown to classic song;
 Which still in varying beauty roll's along,
 Where first thy infant is faintly seen,
 A line of silver 'mid a fringe of green;

It was the pursuit of this imagery that inspired me to take this day trip up North as a gift to myself just two days after celebrating my birthday. In silence, I pondered how life is like a river, a "line of silver" that it moves along its current in one direction. In this "march of time," years once perceived as long periods of possibility, seem to compress and begin to pass like eyeblinks. While leaning against the railing I finally muttered to myself a poorly paraphrased version of the wisdom of the great 11th century Persian philosopher, Omar Khayyam, who wrote:

*"The Moving Finger writes; and, having writ,
 Moves on: nor all thy Piety nor Wit
 Shall lure it back to cancel half a Line,
 Nor all thy Tears wash out a Word of it."*



My recent trips to the river have reinforced in me the determination to make every moment count. I am encouraged to take inventory on what matters and prioritize my attention to those things because the "Moving Finger" writes on and Life is not promised. At some point, I may learn how to flyfish, but until then, with gratitude in my heart and the voices of poets in my mind, I'll treasure my quiet moments by the river's side, honoring each day as a gift.



This window was in memory of youth counselors and was donated by Morris and Marge Schlesinger


