Linda Sarsour was co-organizer of the Women's March in Washington, D.C. In this book, she shares how growing up Palestinian Muslim American, feminist, and empowered moved her to become a globally recognized activist on behalf of marginalized communities across the country.

Her memoir shares her life of being born in America to a Palestinian mother and father and living in a Brooklyn, N.Y. neighborhood and attending public schools. She speaks of the ways we become who we in relationship to others.

She says "it's up to us to resemble people of all faiths and to stand against hate whether it is leveled at your child or mine. We need to do right for <u>ALL</u>our children." Linda Sarsour writes clearly as she recounts the stories of people for whom she advocates and supports because it is what she was born to do. We are not born to be bystanders.

FAIRVIEW UNITED WOMEN IN FAITH ASSEMBLY OF HYGIENE KITS TUESDAY AUGUST 26, 2025

The Fairview United Women in Faith are planning to assembly the Hygiene Kits on Tuesday, August 26, 2025 at 1 p.m. The sign-up chart will continue to be on the wall outside the Welcome Center through Sunday, August 10th. Items may be brought to the church and placed in the Library until time to assemble the kits on August 26th. The Hygiene Kits will be delivered to Normandy United Methodist Church during the last week in September. From Normandy, the kits will be picked up and taken to a distribution center that will ensure that the kits are sent to communities that have experienced floods, hurricanes, or tornado, fires or other kinds of disasters. The kits will help people who have lost everything in times of tragedy.

Some items are still needed for the kits to be complete: 30 travel sized shampoos and deodorants and body lotions are still needed. UNITED WOMEN IN FAITH WILL FILL BABY BASKETS FOR WESLEY DAYTON BABY READY/INFANT MORTALITY (BRIM) PROGRAM

The Baby Ready/Infant Mortality (BRIM) Program of Wesley Dayton was organized in 2016. BRIM serves expectant mothers and families with children under age one. Family Support Specialists offer individualized Mental Health & Trauma Informed care, advocacy, safe-sleep training, practical guidance, emotional support and referrals to appropriate resources. Between July 2024 and June 2025, BRIM enrolled 116 new families and 72 babies were welcomed!!

Fairview United Women in Faith will collect items for 2 baby baskets that will be contributed to Wesley Dayton for mothers enrolled in the BRIM program. One basket will be for a girl and one basket for a boy.

The items needed for the baskets are:

- 1 pack of Sleepers (2-3 per pack)
- 1 pack of onesies (3-5 per pack)
- 1 outfit (often sold as a unit, usually with pants, shirt (dress) and onesie)
- 1 pack of hats (0-3 months, 3-5 per pack)
- 1 pack of socks (4-8 pair per pack)
- 1 pack of diapers Size 1 (soft sided pack with about 62 diapers)
- 1 pack of baby wipes (about 56 wipes)
- 1 pack of baby towels (about 3)
- 1 pack of baby wash cloths (3-12 per pack)
- 1 pack of burp cloths (3-4 per pack)
- 1 pack of bibs (newborn (little) 3-4 per pack)
- 1 large blanket (handmade is welcome)
- 1 pack of receiving blankets (4-5 per pack)
- 1 rattle/small hand toy
- 1 small or medium baby-safe stuffed animal
- 1 Mother's Gift A \$15 Walmart Gift Card
- 1 Large plastic Laundry Basket into which everything is placed

A Literacy Kit of 3 "First Books" will be added to each baby basket. The Literacy Kits have been donated for 2025.)







COMMUNITY GEM: Dayton man has served immigrant community for 40+ years

A Dayton attorney has been offering free legal advice and help to immigrants for more than 40 years. David Larson, 80, has worked on over 500 immigration cases since 1980. He's worked to serve the immigrant community with law firm Larson & Lyons, located at 1121 E. Third St. "David's heart is for the people," said Sharlyn Radcliffe, who nominated Larson as a Dayton Daily News Community Gem. Larson said he wanted to get involved in local government after he served in the Peace Corps. Stationed in Turkey as a volunteer for two years at the time of the Vietnam War, he described his experience as and "awakened educational a thirst knowledge about people and other cultures."

His time with the Peace Corps contributed to his future ventures into immigration law. He graduated from the Ohio State University Michael E. Moritz College of Law with a law degree in 1979. His first legal job was for a law clinic that was started by one of his high school classmates where he gained background in law and adapted to his career 10 and 15 years after. "I went to work there and I took every kind of case that lawyers take in Dayton Ohio," Larson said. "Divorce, drunk driving, child support, bankruptcy [and] wills." He said asylum case for a woman who had been physically abused during the Rwanda genocide was one of his most memorable. "I represented her in immigration court on her asylum claim and it was granted the judgement," Larson said. "That was very exciting for me that I was able to help someone stay here." Larson was an adjunct law professor at the University of Dayton and he said he always enjoyed working students at the school. This year, Larson received the American Immigration Lawyers Association Pro Bono Champions Award. The Ohio chapter recognized him for outstanding dedication and tireless efforts in providing pro bono legal services to the immigrant community for the past 40 years. "That was fun and I got a lot of compliments about it," Larson said. "It is gratifying to someone, 80 years old, that you've done good things." Sharlyn and Steve Radcliffe said they have trusted him with their legal business affairs for decades. Steve Radcliffe said if confidence was needed, Larson kept it. "David is a man of honor. We trust him completely and his work speaks for him, but he will not speak for himself," Sharlyn Radcliffe said. "The community needs to know that we have such a somebody who's devoted, especially now at this moment in America." The Radcliffe's met Larson and his wife, Roberta Longfellow, at Grace United Methodist Church in Dayton nearly 50 years ago and remained friends since. Larson has been involved in organizations such as Welcome Dayton, a program that supports the integration of immigrants into the Dayton community, and the Human Relations Council working to influence and ensure a culture of fair treatment in the city.

Over 40 years ago, a Sunday School Class for adults with special needs was commissioned here at Fairview Church. Named the Faith Class, its mission continues to be to "glorify God by sharing the love of Jesus Christ with those who have special needs while supporting and encouraging their families through participation in the whole church."

The Faith Class meets every Sunday from 10 to 10:45 AM to learn about our Christian faith through stories, songs, crafts, and prayer. Following Sunday School, members join the entire congregation for worship. Members of the Faith Class represent several Christian denominations, and others have no prior religious affiliation. All are welcome.

In addition to nourishing the relationships and the spiritual growth of our Faith Class members, the church encourages their participation in weekly worship services. The worship service is held in the sanctuary 11 AM – 12 Noon. Every week, members of the Faith Class ring the church bell to call people to worship service, and several members have served as the acolyte, lighting and extinguishing the altar candles. The Faith Class also participates in activities beyond regular Sunday School class. Seasonal parties and social events take place at the church or in the community.
