
We can use all QUALITY, GENTLY USED, AND CLEAN items.


A Word from the Pastor

As many may already know, Dave and I are in the process of moving from our two-story plus basement house on a hill to a one-story house with no basement on a flat lot. We have owned this house since 1975, keeping it for our ultimate "retirement" home. Although neither of us are planning to retire, we are ready to give up stairs and hills! In the process of moving, we have discovered a number of boxes that were packed up twenty years ago to leave the house to which we are returning, and haven't been opened since. Of course, we are also moving many things which we have accumulated in the past twenty years. What's also amazing is that, with all that "stuff," we are still buying some new things to complete the move. We must decide what to take, and what is no longer needed.

I wonder if that isn't an analogy for our faith lives. As little children, many of us accumulated wonderful Bible stories that we continue to treasure. Through the years, we may have picked up additional stories and sayings. But it's likely that we also picked up some assumptions and interpretations that no longer serve a purpose. For example, slave owners used Bible passages to justify slavery. Ironically, slaves

used some of the same passages to seek freedom. For many years, churches used Paul's words to the church at Corinth to prevent women from being leaders in the church. Some of the things we thought the Bible "said" are ancient interpretations rather than faithful biblical texts. And some of those understandings prevent us from being the people God intends us to be.

A popular method for decluttering our lives suggests that we rid ourselves of things that no longer give us joy. We're challenged to set nostalgia aside and rediscover our own style. As followers of Jesus, those may also be good guidelines for decluttering our faith lives. Most of us don't use dial telephones just because they were the first phones we learned to use. We seldom put grandma's crocheted doilies on dressers or tables unless it's a "retro" room. We



can use new methods to make the good news of Jesus relevant to new generations of people. Rediscovering our own style may prevent us from following trends that are not who we are or what we are about. Being real brought the Velveteen Rabbit to life, and being who we truly are will create genuine worship and authentic relationships. We need make no apologies for being people who love singing hymns in four-part harmony, and enjoy the glorious sounds of the organ.

One of the challenges of moving, once we've decided what to take and what to leave behind, is figuring out where everything goes. Logic dictates that some items must be placed in specific locations for best results. Kitchen utensils belong in the kitchen, not the bedroom. But aesthetics, beauty, also plays a part in good design. We position our most treasured possessions where they are best displayed. For disciples, nothing is of greater treasure than our Lord Jesus. When Christ is central, in our thoughts, in our decisions, in our prayers, in our actions, everything else will be more radiant. And the home in which we live will be filled with peace and joy.
