The lectionary readings for September include a focus on the letter written by "James, a slave of God and of the Lord Jesus Christ." Scholars believe the letter was written early in the first century, when the church was predominantly Jewish, and had little formal structure. It seems to be written to encourage Jewish Christians outside of Palestine who were suffering trials and troubles. This particular letter follows the pattern of wisdom literature, such as Proverbs and Ecclesiastes in the Hebrew Bible. The letter's primary themes are endorsing values that are contrary to the world's, and expressing faith through actions consistent with God's values. Because the letter was written during a time when almost everyone believed Jesus' second coming in glory was imminent, it might be called a strategy for living in the waiting time.

James provides some excellent practical advice for living a happy life that treats others with dignity and respect. Any community that follows James' advice, by showing no favoritism, providing for the needs of all people, refusing to speak in ways that cause harm, and refusing to judge one another, will be a place of peace. Like Proverbs and Ecclesiastes, James provides practical rules that could apply to virtually any community, not just religious communities. James insists that by following these practices we are aligning ourselves with God and Jesus Christ. Where James falls a bit short, however, is in distinguishing between "good people" and "good disciples of Jesus Christ."

Jesus' life, teachings and ministries call us to be something more than "good people" who follow practices that lead to a happy, compatible life. During September, the gospel stories include scolding those who place the rules of humans above the commands of God, two healing stories that are challenging, and two predictions of his own death. His teachings insist that those who follow him must take up crosses, become slaves to others for Jesus' sake, welcome children and give thirsty people cups of water. To believe in Jesus is to move beyond wisdom and good manners into self-sacrifice and a life at odds with the ways of the world. James is not wrong in his advice and support for those attempting to live a life of faith. Faith that doesn't change our behaviors and relationships with others in positive ways is no faith at all. But we must be prepared to go further than wisdom, perhaps even into the foolishness of believing that only by sacrificing our lives will we find life.

Although the calendar year begins in January, for many of us, the "new year" starts in September, when students and staff return to school, when crops are harvested and preparations begin for the winter season, when church calendars resume activities from which we rested in the summer. As we enter this new year, let's be intent on discovering what it takes to be "followers of Jesus" while we live as "good people" following the teachings and wisdom offered by James.
